Question #7: OSPI and DOH guidance states that all students will be required to wear face coverings (cloth mask or face shields). How might our schools work with families to help students adjust to wearing a face covering while at school?

1	Families should start having their kids get used to wearing masks now rather than closer to the school year.
2	I'm not sure how especially young children will comply with this rule however it's also been shown by doctors that wearing the masks for long periods of time can cause health issues I'd it's own. It's not reasonable to expect children or teachers and staff for that matter, to wear face coverings for at least 8 hours a day. I would rather face the challenge of changing my work schedule and school my own child.
3	My son wears glasses and is very bothered by the filming up caused by breathing. He is distracted by this as we go to the store and make our way in our outings. I know this will cause irritation as he works throughout the day. This causes his to move the mask with his hands, which is counterproductive for the purpose of the mask. There needs to be understanding of him and other students making best efforts and working in a new environment.
4	face mask are not good to wear on many differant levels
5	I don't think it's a solution to the problem. All the face touching and adjusting face masks, taking them off and on, inside out, spreading more germs.
6	Don't enforce it. Give recommendations and guidance, but allow parents to be the final word on the subject.
7	Try to have them available just in case they do not currently have one.
8	I'm sure everyone will wear a mask but some might wear a dirty one/Probably every wash or clean. I would be safe if the school can provide the replacement and always have extra for those case and some might accidentally get it dirty. Always have to have all the supervision to constantly watch the student to not to pull in under the chin or let it hang on the one side of ear.
9	I think face shield would be better option since the mask get hot and the mask limits being able to see the reaction of others.
10	If parents are positive about it, whatever their personal feelings are, that can greatly help their children face new challenges. Unfortunately, this isn't work the school can do for them. In school, just being positive, reinforcing it regularly, until it becomes second nature. Face shields also seem to be a good option.

67	I would prefer my child not wear a face mask. I would prefer my child be able to breathe oxygen. Lack of oxygen leads to headaches and kills brain cells. This is the last thing these children need while their brains are still forming and they're trying to learn.

73	I am certain this will be a significant challenge for teachers, on many levels. As a pediatrician, I have observed children in my office over the past two months wearing masks, and have noted they are a constant source of distraction and lead to frequent face-touching. I fear they may actually become a vector for infectious spread, (not just COVID-19), and will certainly be a behavioral distraction. That said, I understand the guidelines are from the state and CKSD may not have much authority over this matter. Per OSPI, it appears face shields may be an alternative, and I suspect these might work better. I strongly feel, however, that face coverings should not be worn by children during exercise or physical exertion. Additionally, I have already had a number of families requesting medical exemptions from this requirement for their children. It is foreseeable that a sizable percentage of students may be excused from the face covering requirement by their physicians, creating a very unequal and even more difficult environment in the classroom. We must discuss this further.

189	Make it a requirement for all and no exceptions and consequences for not wearing it. Hold kids responsible
190	Provide face shields
191	I do not think they should be forced to wear them. It is ridiculous to think little kids can maintain that. We should be able to op out of it since we still have rights.
192	Explain to families the requirements to wear masks are just like the requirement for vaccinations to attend. If you can't meet the requirements choose one of the other options.
193	First day of school activity
194	We need to put steamers in each classroom so we can instantly sanitize surfaces and objects so masks aren't necessary and students can go without in classrooms to see faces and be seen.
195	Take breaks from wearing them.
196	My 6 year old can wear a mask just fine. People need to get over it and just do it. It's not the end of the world. I'm a MS teacher and I expect my students to do what is expected unless they have a health condition that prevents them from doing so. My children can do the same, especially if it means we can go back to in person school.
197	Is it possible to provide a space for mask breaks?
198	I think this is asking too much of teachers and staff.

199	Not concerned at his time.
200	My child is fine with it as long as he can breathe and can take a fresh breath once in awhile
201	This is going to be next to impossible
202	Face shields would be ideal over both options as smiles & expressions can be seen & wouldn't hinder the student fully engaging. Masks are understandably uncomfortable after hours & I feel will eventually cause discomfort, overheating, agitation & irritable students that will not be in the mindset nor attitude to learn. If PPE/ face shields are not available than yes masks must be worn if advisable to protect our community.
203	This is the biggest challenge. Trusting that kids will comply. Incentivize that the kids get a big pizza party or trip at the end of the year if compliance is 100%. Those who are caught not complying will be left behind. I'm happy to help with any fund raising for this.

304	Allow students to wear the clear face shields instead
305	Provide the option for students to purchase a face covering with the school name and or other personal and fun kinds to choose from
306	I'd be MORE than happy to make masks to supply my kid's school with, kids and faculty. I've been making masks that are comfortable for my own child and would love to help if I can.
307	Who is providing these for students who can't afford them?
308	Allow neck gaiters, allow custom patterns/designs/art. Don't be overly strict on the art (think boys' video games).
309	Practice face covering at home with possible online activity for students to do so.

337	Provide masks for families thst don't have the materials.
338	I don't believe requiring face masks will be beneficial to our students, particularly those in elementary school. The teachers already have their hands full, to have them enforce wearing masks on the students while simultaneously teaching is ridiculous. 354	The adjustment will be hard for some since they have been home most of the time and are not used to wearing mask. If there is some way for them to safely take breaks from wearing the mask during the day that might make it more tolerable, particularly in the beginning while they get use to wearing them. I would also like to point out that the requirements need to be clearly defined and articulated to both the students and the parents as well as the consequences of not following the requirements. And there should be serious penalties if they violate the requirements since this is a public health crisis not an academic issue. 420	I think the kids are going to need breaks from wearing the masks.
421	educate parents to take it seriously so as to set an example for their kids, I see 50% adult participation in public..
422	We have already made several face coverings for our family and friends. We can make additions for our children to ensure they have multiple masks to access if it allows for them to return to school.
423	For the school district to push back to OSPI and DOH not to require children to wear mask at all. Daycare and activity centers and open as usual with zero social distancing or mask required and have had no outbreaks in them or to there families. 667	Truthfully I have no idea how they are going to keep face masks on students. I really don't like the requirement at all.
668	School should provide face shields for all children. They can then choose to wear a mask or not along with their face shield. My daughters glasses will fog up if she has a mask on all day which defeats the purpose of learning of you can't see the board or your textbook.
669	Smaller class size, small break out sessions so kids can have regular and frequent mask breaks
670	Be consistent, some teachers staff will be lax some strict... needs to be the same accross the board!
671	Allow face shields and allow mask only when 6 feet cannot be maintained.
672	Ensure exceptions for students with disabilities to preserve their mental and social health.
673	Require and/or provide face shields, NOT masks for all children
674	Unsure
675	have masks available if the student is not able to get one from home. Give them a break and allow time without the mask
676	Scheduled breaks where they can go outside to take them off for a while.
677	I don't think there is a way to "help". Kids are kids and as a healthcare employee i find it challenging to wear the mask and not touch not readjust. Asking a 6 year old to do the same isn't right.
678	Maybe provide hand sanitizer and disposable masks every morning incase students forget or run out.

679	Strict enforcement to ensure they wear it. Will be challenging during lunch. Social distancing is critical too.
680	Everyone has to wear one, so shut up and deal with it.
681	not sure.
682	not sure.
683	I do not agree with the guidance, if it is still a factor then yes but if there has been no infections for a month then we should not have to wear them. It is very uncomfortable to wear them for extended periods of time, and all day in school will be an extended period. You could build barriers around on the desks so students do not have to wear the masks full time.
684	Allow breaks outdoors where they can take them off periodically. They are uncomfortable and can cause problems when worn all day (I am an RN so I am experiencing this myself).
685	Breaks for times where we wouldn't have to wear them or we can get fresh air
686	Nothing
687	This could be very hard. I have seen many people in our area say they will not wear masks and if parents won't then how do you expect their children to do so. People need to be educated more about how they help stop the spread. Make an educational video that each family has to view and accept the mask policy before coming back to school.
688	Many kids think it's cool/fun. Finding the right mask ahead of time (the blue surgical style are very easy to tolerate), offering support for plastic face shield alternative, places kids can go to safely 'unmask' if they need a break.
689	I am unsure of that, but my son is diagnosed with autism and sensory processing disorder. I worry about the distraction a facemask will be for him.
690	This needs to be looked at. Children should not have to wear masks all day.
691	My son is used to wearing a mask at his therapy appointments. My concern is him being influenced by the trouble makers at the school who will be defiant in wearing the mask and therefore influencing him not to wear his mask.
692	More outdoor time or learning when able to allow safe social distancing but provide children a break from masks.
693	Not necessary
694	Freyja is on the spectrum and hates being uncomfortable, but is a trooper about wearing one. She can only tolerate the mask at most for a couple hours. A hybrid school day, supplemented with online learning, would be the best solution for our family.
695	I worry about kids taking masks off and potentially contaminating their masks and surrounding area. A simple, easily understood instructional video that we can show our kids will be very helpful. It's important to emphasize proper masking use along with other recommended preventive measures such as hand washing, social distancing. Teachers can also demonstrate how to do proper masking in class.
696	Have specific times for masks to be removed for fresh air yet still observing social distancing.
697	Just enforce wearing of them. Provide the student with a mask if needed.

698	Help explain they are protecting their friends and teachers from COVID19 in addition to protecting their selves. Many people are misinformed or uneducated about why we need to wear masks and need to sanitize everything. And the school must enforce the mask requirement!!!

700	We are really hoping that a compromise can be reached between safety and having to wear the masks ALL day. Understand passing periods and such instances where they may not be as able to socially distance, but hopeful that classroom setups may be able to be implemented that allow them to not wear them while at their desks. Even if it means scheduling with split schedules and some days students work from home to allow others to have class time.

705	Kids are going to hate it no matter what. My kids already hate wearing them just to the grocery store for 10 minutes. Now making them wear them 7-8 hours a day is gonna be a challenge for many
706	Half day attendance, no lunch, MUCH greater times in between classes OR only teachers traveling to and from different classrooms, less requirements on the students for carrying supplies(an example is the unnecessary, mandatory binder with the math standards/rubrics).
707	I'm concerned about PE while wearing a mask and about my daughters speech suffering due to mask requirements.
708	Allow an opportunity for the kids to get some fresh air.
709	It will be an issue with mask...it will be a distraction...and I am sure it will take away from.whats really important (learning) teachers will be more focused on facemask.
710	Very short days. If my children have to wear face masks for a full day they won't be attending. I wear one when I go to the store, and get dizzy from that short amount of time with less oxygen. I don't think it's healthy to have a child wear a mask for 7 hours!
711	Let them know the rules and have the same rules in all the classrooms. Being consistent about enforcing face mask usage. Support for teachers if a student refuses or forgets to wear a mask.
712	Its going to be very hard to keep masks on children and it will be hard on the children constantly having the mask rule enforced. If masks are required, I dont want my kid there. I'd rather homeschool him. But the work needs to be the teachers/schools responsibility, not the parents like it was at the end of this year.
713	Have breaks were you can take off the mask.

714	We all teach through open communication and roll modeling.
715	Make it required, those who forget or cannot buy their own should get one provided by the school. Some cannot afford masks and that should be taken into consideration.
716	I hate face masks, I cannot breath in them. I believe trying to make the kids wear them isn't going to work they will constantly be touching them and taking them off their noses just like all the workers at all the stores when they are forced to wear them.
717	Lots of understanding. My daughter is going into 4th, she gets it. My son is going into kindergarten so I'm more concerned. We are doing a lot of practicing now. If the teachers are gentle, understanding and help them see how important it is, it will be ok.
718	Perhaps some webinars/seminars for those that have concerns. Make parents sign an acknowledgment that they the requirements. Provide masks/shields that can't afford them...
719	Not wearing them. Rebreathing of CO2 has longer effects to ones health as many doctors have stated across the nation.
720	Ensure that the families have access to coverings (not necessarily from the school) and understand how to care for them.
721	Provide the option of mask or shield.
722	Face shield preferred
723	For younger children make it fun somehow. Add patches to masks, make masks and color them with fabric pens. Make masks and send them to those in need in other countries.
724	Recognize that 100% compliance will be difficult and provide support for students who need more time to 'get onboard' rather than excessive punitive measures.
725	Keep the kids home
726	Have parents and children share experiences with masks that have worked for them, and have a variety of options available.
727	Unsure, but care needs to be giving for student with sensory or other issues who may not be able to wear a mask
728	Provide regular "mask-breaks" possibly outdoors. DO NOT PENALIZE kids when they have difficulty with masks.
729	I don't have any good ideas regarding compliance during the day, but I would want to make sure that all children have access to face masks. Perhaps the schools could do something to make sure every kid had a clean mask to wear each day. (Cloth ones that could be taken home at the end of the week to wash, for example. I don't see the need for disposable masks being wasted every day - and filling up landfills - if we can help kids properly maintain reusable fabric ones.)

735	How can they unless the ratio of staff to student is 3:1? I'm not sure how you can ensure they will. Adjustment to wearing it should happen at home prior to return.
736	Personally... In my household... this is a rule. You don't have an option. My kids should be used to it. Educate the reason behind it. Give ideas on how to make their own and different designs of cloth they can use. They like what they wear it'll happen. You'll need to continually remind and watch for those who forget. Until it is a norm for the students.
737	I don't see how K-3 will keep masks on. The focus will be more on masks and keeping them on than learning.
738	Teachers and staff need to understand that students will most likely need gentle reminders to not play with or touch masks/face shields. I foresee students being distracted by such items, and I'd hope that staff would understand that those things will be challenging for students, 5-7 years of age, to use responsibly.
739	Provide face masks Share obedience discipline guidelines. Allow a check card/paper for teacher to say that child did/did not wear his/her mask.
740	Need to take outside breaks often to breath in fresh air.
741	I have no idea how my incoming kinder student will actually wear a mask all day.
742	Make it a rewarding decision and help them understand the purpose of the guidance
743	I'm against it 100%
744	From the research I have done personally. I am not comfortable with my child wearing a face mask under any circumstance.
745	Our kids have been wearing them already but not for this amount of time school is in session. What about beating lunch at school? Kids will need to go outside and get fresh air and take off the mask.
746	Don't make them wear face coverings
747	Help find a suppliers of COMFORTABLE masks that families can purchase. Model and explain behavior.
748	Only way to adjust is to wear them frequently. My concern is how hard/difficult it is to breath in them.
749	My five year old will struggle immensely with this. I hope the school will be reasonable in their expectations.
750	Require it during transit... going from class to class, class to lunch, class to bathroom. Doesn't need to be required when kids are not mobile sitting at their desks. Or playing outside. Just keep up with cleaning surfaces and washing hands. This is what we do at work.
751	Allow breaks to go outside and get fresh air.
752	Students should not be required to wear a mask, only teachers and only if there is proof that masks work.

753	In our family we are already wearing them when necessary & it's not hard when kids are middle school age and above. I do however think there needs to be times where they get a break from it during the day. Maybe taking a short walk in gym or outside when possible, keeping everyone at a distance and allowing no facecoverings maybe teaching some deep breathing exercises in PE so they really feel like they are getting enough oxygen. I could see this making kids tired if they are breathing fully.
754	No recommendations
755	Higher more teacher, break up classrooms into smaller groups by highfeling more teachers. Then they won't need masks.
756	No face mask
757	I personally have no objection to my student wearing a face covering while at school. We live with a disabled immunocompromised person who we have tried really hard to protect from this virus. Only one person leaves the house for essentials and work. The rest of us stay home and only go out for medical appointments that can not be put off. People have their own opinions about wearing a mask but we see it as essential to do what we can to not only protect our loved ones but other people's loved ones also. Maybe offering times outside or set times where masks can be taken off for a minutes so kids can get a break from having to wear the mask through out the day. My child is a special needs child diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder. He is anxious already about going out and does not feel comfortable leaving the house since the schools shut down. I don't think he will have a problem wearing a face covering but he still fears being exposed to the virus. He's going to need a lot of reassurance and support for sure when and if schools reopen this fall.
758	I think this will be very very hard for my younger daughter it might be made better if days are shorter or if the are only in school part time.
759	provide masks for students so that they are uniform and consistent.
760	Hopefully students are already wearing masks when out in public.
761	Working in healthcare, I don't believe it is going to be a practical expectation of children. Only half of adults aren't wearing masks and some don't believe in them. It is going to be a stressful struggle for teacher and staff.
762	It will probably be easy at first as it's a new thing for kids and they may find it funny but I believe it will eventually not be easy to get the kids to keep the mask on as kids will get frustrated and even bored with them.
763	I think is face coverings are presented as helpful and not as a burden, students will adapt quickly. Children are flexible!
764	Students should always practice how to wear masks.
765	Controlling government that's forcing our children to wear masks for a virus that's a drop in the bucket compared to black death, small pox, Spanish flu ect. The only children who should be taking precautions are those with underlying health concerns. Every single covid 19 death in the US had at least one underlying health issue. Don't force healthy children to live in fear.
766	Reduce class size

767	It needs to be explained to the kids that they need to wear mask at all times.
768	If students see all of the adults around them wearing a face covering that would help greatly.
769	Knowing which type of face covering is best!
770	Make sure all families have access to masks
771	It is required. You wear the mask or do not participate. If students need a mask break they go outside in a "bubble."
772	There needs to be exemptions for special needs and disabled students. Or students suffering from anxiety. They should not be forced or shamed into wearing face coverings. I will not be bullied into forcing my special needs children to wear face masks. Period.
773	Have them make several of their own in class. Allow them to be personalized but within school guidelines.
774	Plan the school day to allow a 5-10 minute outside break, maybe 1-2 times per day-that is a very long day to wear a face covering, though necessary I agree. Once outside, students can get fresh air:)

There are also going to be major uproars from the students. They will not follow the mask guidance. Klahowya has a very strong and independent student body.
834	push back!! if students can maintain physical distancing in a classroom, do not force them to wear masks!
835	I dont know how small children will be able to follow this guideline properly for so many hours a day especially during lunch.
836	My son is severely autistic so wondering what you plan on doing about that... there is no way he can wear a mask
837	We are starting with him at home now when we go out.
838	I really don't have a solution.

839	I think it's unrealistic to expect the students to wear face masks all day long. It's really difficult to breath through them and all day long is too long
840	For high school, tell the students what is required and send home any students not complying.
841	We won't be attending if coverings are required. Maybe push back at the DOH. masks are not safe for kids
842	I do not want my child required to wear a mask during school. It isn't necessary and would be difficult to enforce.
843	Maybe provide masks for those students who are not able to get them.
844	By providing face coverings for students at school entrance.
845	Surgical mask is more comfortable than the cloth face mask. It will be nice if provided to students.
846	Requirements for students wearing a face mask should be explained clearly, and they should be provided by the school.

885	Don't require it. My child will not be wearing a mask.
886	Have staff wear them but not the kids. Preschool & elementary kids will not keep a mask on.
887	That will reduce effective interactions with all involved.

901	My child will be entering kindergarten. I am not sure how you are going to have 5 year olds keep masks in all day. My daughter is very willing to wear it, but after just a little bit of time, she is asking if she can take it off.
902	Let them decorate their masks or pick them out.
903	It's unrealistic to ask young children to wear a face mask daily/at school. It's unrealistic that they would keep them on or clean. My children do not agree to this.
904	Use face shields.. so that kids can see facial expressions
905	Videos that reflect proper wear and how it would look wearing one all day in the classroom
906	Mandate masks.
907	Studies show that masks are not effective, so I do not see the purpose in students wearing them the entire school day. This will distract them from learning, which is why they are attending school. How will this be enforced? With detentions or trips to the principal? The CKSD schools can work with families to help students by limiting the amount time students are in masks throughout the school day and increasing their ability to focus on learning and growing.
908	This will be very challenging and time consuming for schools. You will need to have a helper in each classroom to ensure students obey mask rules,etc.
909	Educate students and parents on the purpose and importance of face coverings.
910	Tell them and make it known everywhere
911	Not sure
912	Having a lot of outside time without masks.
913	It would be nice if the school or PTA could sell spirit masks and parents can have the option to buy extra for those who can't afford them.
914	Have a spot and time to let the kids out of the building to take breaks to take off masks.
915	There is no way to keep face coverings on little children. And Kids with a medical condition won't be able to have one... so whats the difference if you have face coverings or not?
916	Mine already do when we leave the house and WA is required now so I don't think it will be as much of an issue. You could start by sending instructional video ahead of returning to parents to show their children. Also when they are in class every morning as part of the routine to cover mask safety and wearing properly. It would only take a minute and would save time in the day not having to tell students individually. Helps ensure safety.
917	Provide one
918	I believe the school should provide a specific mask where everyone can breath and be fine wearing it. They're some masks makes it hard to breathe or it when your breathe there will be oxygen coming out of your mouth and could spread to others.
919	I'm not sure , I don't think a child should be force to wear a mask all day .

920	My kids (and I) hate wearing the masks, they are uncomfortable, hot and distracting. I think this is going to be a huge struggle for kidz. The "science" in requiring them is inconsistant in that they actually do anything.
921	Let them know that not only does protect you, you also protects others.
922	Students at my school should be able to adjust to wearing a face covering fairly quickly, so the schools don't need to work with them.
923	Have extra available if kids don't have or forget masks. They can be cloth and washed and reused to save money
924	Both my kids have asthma tell me how that will work with kids who struggle to breathe
925	Provide extras at school in case student loses their mask or it get something spilled on it during the day
926	Children with any special needs such as sensory processing disorder could have an extremely difficult time hearing a teacher who's wearing a mask, focusing on learning, and being understood while speaking. Children with anxiety and those who are slow to warm up would have more trouble because they can't see people's smiles. This is especially difficult for young children who don't feel safe with people they don't know well, and who are already easily misunderstood.
927	Having to wear face coverings for that long is very uncomfortable and will be a distraction for many students, and even more so for those who already struggle.
928	Face masks: necessary and helpful. I am not against them, however, I hate this the most for these kids. In a perfect world...
929	Masks fit for child sized faces may need to be made available at the doors, especially for our families who are unable to acquire an appropriate mask for children.
930	Lead by example. I have too many folks in my work day that don't believe in the COVID risks and feel that we all should just be exposed and as one co-worker put it, "Some will pass, and that's okay!" If the folks I leave my kids safety to refuse to adhere to OSPI or DOH mandates, now the exposure is to all.
931	No problem at all
932	Allow children to step back from others and take their mask off for a moment when they need it.
933	Give the students grace when they overheat and need to breathe for a minute or two. Wearing a face mask for 6 1/2 hours for our young elementary students is a long time. And will the school district be providing extra masks for students when they accidentally sneeze into their mask? You cannot expect the students to wear the mask they sneezed into. How will teachers be able to teach and talk through the mask? They will become face mask police instead of focusing on teaching their students.
934	Provide school branded masks and other fun designs. Make it a fun and fashionable thing that kids can get into.

935	Students should only have to wear masks when social distancing can not be maintained ie when walking through the halls. When they are seated in the class, let them be without masks. Also, if they are outside, masks should not be required.
936	It's a requirement and parents need to understand that regardless of their personal feelings. BE BLUNT and tell them the rules.
937	Get rid of them as soon as the State allows.
938	Supply extras for kids that forget one or can not afford to buy them.
939	I won't send my child back if this is required. It has been proven to limit oxygen levels if worn for long periods of yine
940	All school staff must set the expectation of having students wear masks by leading by example.
941	Create breaks throughout the day to take them off for fresh air!
942	Provide them and then require they are on
943	Provide masks for students
944	Make sure they keep them on. Provide face coverings on campus for those that are lost or damaged during the instructional schoolday.
945	I don't think this will be an issue for my kids. They don't mind the face masks.
946	I think that during physical activities this is dangerous and face masks should not be worn.
947	I think they probably already are wearing masks when in public, I think the kids are used to seeing them and wearing them by now
948	It will be difficult to participate in class wearing a face mask- quick instruction on how to project your voice through the face mask.
949	No idea. However, my kids do not like to wear face mask at all and I feel like wearing them will also impede the learning process.
950	Enforcement of one type of mask
951	Students SHOULD already be used to wearing face coverings, as they SHOULD have been doing it since day one, and it is now a govt requirement. There are no excuses. However, the school may need to work with the govt to ensure they have extra face masks at school for student use.
952	This is a hard one. Ensuring everyone is wearing them will be key. I have yet to find a mask that fits any of us right.
953	Provide the Dave shields if coverings remain mandatory
954	Offer areas and times each day outside where students know they can remove mask and take a break either individually or in groups while following social distancing guidelines
955	She will be hard-pressed to wear a mask for more than 10 min
956	My child is already use to wearing a cloth mask.
957	I have no idea ... :(

958	Training in how to wear a mask, educating about the risks of the virus and how it affects young people, education in social protections for vulnerable members of society. I also want the face covering requirement enforced so students wear it properly (over nose and mouth). I'm also concerned that children will bully about wearing a mask, and that they will weaponize sneezing and coughing as a form of bullying. Perhaps some education about societies where masks are common could be helpful.
959	Let the kids go outside when the weather permits and let them breathe! OSPI and DOH need to realize that wearing a mask is a personal decision. If you are sick stay home!! It is that easy!
960	Supply face masks that students keep at school
961	I don't know honestly. My son is autistic and wears glasses and getting him to wear a mask has been a nightmare.
962	Face covering for Students are not required. Students generally do not get sick. Care should be taken to protect those at home who are vulnerable, not the Students, from THIS virus.
963	I will provide my own children with masks.
964	I'm not sure, we already implement this in our home when going into public places.
965	Not sure. But I know they will a distraction I feel they are hazardous for children to where all day and will have issues in the future.
966	Provide face masks for all students, maybe even with the school logo on them, but have teachers facilitate some kind of reward program when students are wearing masks so that there's a reason other than safety to wear it. For The little kids, get customizable masks that they can draw on in class so that they can wear their art work
967	I dont know... let us have our own custom ones. Or provide some at school
968	Kick out students that fail to use PPE and follow rules
969	I am concerned that enforcement of masks will distract from learning environment. I would like to know the enforcement policy. If there are many exceptions, that is untenable. If a student has to challenged to don a mask often and the student requires extra discipline then that is not an environment I would like my student. If a student can't comply with a rule then let the family provide the discipline. My oldest child (graduated already) choose classes based on how much time he presumed the teacher would spend with classroom management rather than teaching. I was disappointed with the school system at that point.
970	If this is what we do, my kids are not going to attend.
971	Just sharing the expectations and the rules
972	No idea, face masks are annoying.
973	Make a decision early on which will be required & let families know so they can start practicing with their students before the start of school chaos.
974	Keeping the classroom cool since they will be over heated easily.
975	Offer mask if a student needs one. Allow for an area wear mask can be removed and work be done if needed due to physical or mental issues.
976	My child will not wear a mask. That's my decision. If a mask is required he will not attend school in person

977	Link studies showing the effectiveness. I'm not sending my children to school while mask order is in place!
978	Avoid the temptation to enforce the policy in a "one-size fits all" manner. Take a case-by-case approach. There will be as many different reasons for mask-wearing compliance/non-compliance as there are students.
979	Very concerned that students will not take wearing masks seriously and even more concerned there will not be a good way to enforce this.
980	Providing face coverings (?)
981	Unknown
982	Local sewing groups have been sewing masks for those who need it; request parents to provide masks for their children
983	have masks for students.all wear same ones
984	What face masks actually work?
985	Not an option in my mind.
986	I think this is a joke. I can't image elementary school kids wearing mask all day and running the risk of them passing out due to lack of oxygen. I have to wear a mask at work myself and there is no way I could do it all day. I have had headaches and been light headed. I wouldn't ask for our children to have to wear these all day.
987	At school no masks health checks at the door
988	Let the teachers explain the them how important it is, yet make them feel comfortable about it.
989	Kids are not going to wear masks, especially those whose parents don't believe they should.
990	Do not comply. This is not about safety, it is about control. Please stand up for our students!
991	Both my older 2 kids 6 & 10 are just fine wearing masks while shopping. It seems the school may need to provide Masks for some kids in the school.
992	Set guidelines so offensive masks cannot be worn.
993	Provide masks for students don't have them, have periods of time outside where a break can be taken from the mask.
994	Provide shields over face mask because facemask harbor germs and reintroduces the bacteria to your body.
995	I don't believe the scientific data supports cloth face coverings as being medically useful in a wide public use. Especially with small children who will fuss with them constantly. It is impossible to make kindergateners, for example, wear masks correctly for hours at a time, there by rendering them nothing more than an irritant. Much like gloves in food preparation, when worn incorrectly they serve no purpose, and 80 percent of people I see don't wear masks correctly. It's just medical theatrics to make people feel like efforts are being made to protect them.
996	Make sure there are procedures set up so every student can safely take off their masks for short periods throughout the day.
997	Make sure the kids wear them properly and allow breaks from the mask other than just when eating.

998	I encourage my family to where masks in public. Maybe selling/providing school themed masks.
999	not sure
1000	Provide mask breaks, don't require all day
1001	My student has add and a hard time focusing as it is. Mask will 100% be a huge problem because it will be very hard for my student to focus on anything besides the mask. I dont think masks should be worn in school. Proper washing hands and cleaning will do just fine.
1002	Tell them it's optional
1003	make face mask requirements while in school
1004	Not sure. I work in the hospital and have to wear one 8 hours per day. Its TOUGH. It is difficult to breathe, distracting and causes headaches and fatigue. I wont send my son if masks are manditory
1005	Provide a set of face mask to each student to personalize and wash either at home or school after each wear/day.
1006	I don't think it's healthy to have kids wear face coverings all day - we should move to a modified schedule with shorter hours, if that is what the state is requiring the kids to do.
1007	Practice wearing a face mask at home also to help students get used to it.
1008	Front loading expectations, educational material, all staff consistently setting the example.
1009	I think that wearing JUST a cloth mask is unacceptable. Kids are kids & this virus will quickly spread throughout the schools unless N95's are worn or something comparable & effective.
1010	This is ridiculous and the kids know it. It will not be worth your time to enforce it. I see this as the single biggest obstacle. Employees at stores and the hospital don't wear them correctly, kids certainly won't. This will be a massive distraction. I am disappointed this was mandated. And I do not have an answer for how to implement it.
1011	Let people where any type of cloth over their face (mask, bandana, etc.)
1012	Give expectations to families well before school starts that masks required. Monitor in halls to make sure kids are keeping them on.
1013	Make it mandatory...and don't allow for non-compliance...
1014	I am not sure what you can do to help. I have two high functioning autistic children who might be ok one day wearing a mask and only for a few hours...while other days it could very well be nothing but a joke to them to throw the mask across the room.
1015	Provide extra masks. Create a video to show students how to remove and keep mask clean when drinking from water bottle which also must continue to be monitored as a matter of health.
1016	I think it's rather impossible to have kindergarten wear face coverings for longer than an hour. I've tested at home with various masks. Therefore I will homeschool my Kindergartener this coming school year. I will allow my high school daughter to attend only if social distancing is done and more hand washing stations added.
1017	Set the example! Provide cloth masks for kids who don't show up with one. Separate / send to another classroom those who are not masking up!

1018	I don't understand how we can expect our kids to wear a mask for that long. When I must go grocery shopping and wear a mask for 30 min I get really hot. So, how does this work?
1019	I really don't know. This is one of my biggest concerns for my soon to be kindergarten student.
1020	Provide "outdoor classroom" time where learning in open spaces can be utilized and allow for mask breaks as often as instructors can incorporate. Certain discussions like classroom meetings or verbal presentations could be done in this way. Smaller contact groups will be important too and sanitized spaces when groups switch. What if larger groups met through zoom for discussion and had smaller clusters in person? Could small groups with same class schedules limit over exposure to too many classmates?
1021	I think it would be helpful if the kids have face shields that they can wear during the day but leave in the classroom and wear personal masks to and from school. This way they can breathe better and see faces/facial expressions.
1022	Understood. Communicating this NOW (and often through the summer), and providing resources to obtain them so that families are prepared for the fall.
1023	Provide face coverings for students; explicit instruction on WHY face coverings are important & HOW to wear them properly - share info, links; SEL school-home activities that promote positive behavior (e.g. students write letters and/or create posters w/ "Love is an action word" theme...share with family, posters on school walls, create digital slideshow, etc.); opportunity to purchase mask customized like school spirit gear & work w/ PTA to provide free customized masks for students who participate in FRL program (confidential transaction between principal/counselor & student)
1024	I strongly believe that fall covering during school will not work, especially if student need to discuss curriculum action items. For the younger kids, some may struggle with speech and a bigger distraction that may take away adequate learning time.
1025	We think that the expectation that students will wear face coverings at all times or at a level that will make them effective may be too high an expectation. Kids are kids and it is probably likely they will not be able to meet that needed requirement.
1026	If it is required, all students should wear mask, no exception. All families should support this decision.
1027	This is going to be a huge barrier for my son with sensory processing disorder. I understand medical exceptions can be made but this is a concern.
1028	Continue to encourage use and reinforce said usefulness
1029	To not have them wear them at all as it's not healthy for them to.
1030	If it is required my children won't attend
1031	Refuse to comply with the emperor's edicts.
1032	Allow them to wear whats most comfortable for them.
1033	Positive discussion from teacher when class resumes with proper technique and reasoning behind why we wear them.
1034	Teach/support good hygiene and habits, not touching face washing hands, etc.
1035	Make them cool - school colors & highlighting school activities - white for seniors - etc

1036	All kids have the same mask or face shield to avoid elitism.
1037	Shorten the amount of interaction time to avoid issues caused by prolonged face coverings.
1038	Families need access to the masks well before September so kids can practice wearing them and build their tolerance. There may be financial barriers to getting masks. Suggest partnering with the military or social clubs to make masks.
1039	It would be very uncomfortable
1040	I have no idea
1041	Allowing younger children to wear face shields and the other children wearing masks giving them breaks and letting them take them off
1042	I am not sure but I have purchased fabrics that with characters my children enjoy to encourage their use. That may be something that can be donated (I don't mind doing that) to help with other children being more likely to wear their masks.
1043	Wearing a mask all day is NOT healthy and should not be done!!
1044	Be flexible for those students who have issues wearing them.
1045	Don't be ridiculous, these are not helpful in protecting us from Covid and may very well put our kids at a greater risk for getting sick or developing new problems. Stand up and say No to masks!
1046	Mine has already been wearing one but I fear she will be resistant to it in the long term.
1047	Model and look for ways to fund face shields in primary grades and with students with special needs.
1048	My son is 10 and he panics when wearing a mask. Maybe finding a material or some type of mask that is comfortable for younger kids.
1049	Have the kids wear them during summer- gradually increasing time
1050	Modify the type used to allow proper breathing of children
1051	Perhaps start student at home a few weeks before. We always mask up in public and both girls are so used to it now at 3 and 5 years old.
1052	I'm actually against wearing of masks, so more information on the need for them in this age population would be useful
1053	Information about the purpose of masks and advice for helping find/make comfortable masks
1054	Practice with many different types to figure out which works best for your child. Opportunity for breaks with fresh air when needed. Have them practice wearing when in public and at home.
1055	Just get us to be comfortable wearing them, and don't make it a big deal, if you let us students do what we want with them, as long as we wear them, we shouldn't have any problems
1056	As of Friday masks will be mandatory in WA state so I think by the fall high school kids will be quite used to it.

1057	Recommend kids get practice before school starts. Also kids and adults are going to need to be gracious to one another, as it is not possible for kids, or even some adults, to be 100% in compliance 100% of the time. We are all going to have to do our best, be gentle with each other and ourselves
1058	I have a child with cerebral palsy and has oral defensiveness and will not allow a face cover.
1059	Masks aren't hard to wear. What kind of help would be needed?
1060	Allow face shields to those opposed. My kids can wear face masks to school. I have no issues with that.
1061	It would probably be best to avoid the conflict and support home school
1062	Terrible terrible idea. Many studies show cloth face masks do not prevent the spread of disease 100%, it's very little if anything. Children will be breathing in their own carbon dioxide for hours at school? They will touch their face to adjust the mask too. Not a suitable option for children with special needs or children who have speech difficulties. I would rather homeschool then subject my child to a face mask while in public school.
1063	Helping kids with glasses because they fog up all the time.
1064	I DO NOT THINK THAT STUDENTS SHOULD WEAR MASKS. THEY DO NOTHING!!!
1065	This is going to be very difficult for students, especially young students to keep masks on. I think of special needs students who will not wear them. If students have to wear masks to "safely" be at school then no one should be at school. Masks make it hard for students to learn and teachers to teach.
1066	Families should practice now - while school is out wearing masks with their students.
1067	Offering the possibility for students to remain in a classroom "bubble" where they can remove their masks within their classroom. Yet, when they leave the classroom they are expected to wear a face covering.
1068	To encourage families to have their children start wearing them now before school is in session.
1069	Require multiple masks so they can be changed out if soiled.
1070	Don't force me to do it allow them to have a personal responsibility for their health and safety. We are not raising idiots for raising confident kids we need to feel that they are allowed to take control of their lives in the manner they choose.
1071	Please provide the masks.
1072	1) Make sure that all families have face coverings. How will we ensure that low income families have access to an adequate supply of face masks 2) create opportunities for kids to take off face masks such as at recess 3) provide sanitation to ensure that children can safely take off face masks and put them back on.
1073	Provide face coverage options: shields or masks, so parents and kids can feel comfortable with their choice and also provide masks/face shields so families that can't afford masks don't have to worry about Providing them.
1074	Send out strong language regarding how effective they are and what are the exceptions?

1075	I don't know how this will be done. Even working with one on for a few hours at my job has proved difficult and I'm in excellent health.
1076	Allow them to take masks off while sitting at desks and any other opportunities.
1077	Provide a public campaign to de-politicize the need for masks. Portray mask wearing as responsible. Penalize and remove students who refuse to wear a mask.
1078	Idk make us do it
1079	For teachers and administrators to focus on children's best attempts, and not perfection, when wearing the mask, i.e. ensure students do not feel scared they'll get into trouble if they pull it off without thinking about it, or have trouble touching it. Also, I have a son with Autism. I am concerned he may get agitated wearing a mask for several hours and may act out, due to agitation. How will others know that this could be a struggle for him and to understand that in correcting him, it may make him feel singled out?
1080	My special needs child will not wear a mask
1081	That's a long time to be wearing a face mask.
1082	I don't foresee kids wearing face covering for a long period of time. They will get frustrated, distracted and not be able to focus.
1083	I don't believe our children should be required to wear them for 6 hours a day. I work and have to wear them for 8 hours and I have a hard time breathing. I will not force my child to wear one!
1084	Continued encouragement. I really don't know how to convince kids/teens to take it seriously
1085	I think it will be helpful to teach all children what the purpose of the mask is for and what is expected of them.
1086	Very frequent fresh air breaks outside.
1087	he has worn one while at Dr. appointment he did not like it but he can adjust to wearing it hard thing to adjust to our new way of life as a teen.
1088	Make sure supplies are available
1089	Providing empathy and support from teachers and staff. As an adult i struggle in public. They are hot, cumbersome and distracting, certainly will make learning challenging.
1090	Sending students home who refuse to wear them.
1091	I'm not sure how students will be able to effectively wear face masks during school hours as they are constantly touching their faces.
1092	Having consistent rules and consequences in the classroom with regards to misuse
1093	Educate students on the appropriate wearing of face coverings and strictly enforce it. Provide them to students that can't afford them.
1094	Give free masks to people that can not get them.
1095	Make sure the adults model the appropriate behaviors.
1096	Share easy to sew patterns for families who can, provide masks for families. Here is the kicker - so many people wear their masks with their nose out that makes it pointless. There has to be a protocol that they are used properly or why have them at all? This is an excellent mask pattern with child size patterns. https://www.craftpassion.com/face-mask-sewing-pattern/

1097	To make it not a requirement. At risk persons should take necessary precautions themselves. Life has risks so let the kids live and live normally. Do not impose your fear on my family.
1098	We've been having our kids start to wear masks so that they are comfortable when them when and where they are required.
1099	I have an autistic 13 year old and he will sporadically wear a face covering but really tries to resist wearing one.
1100	Masks should not be required
1101	If we are at our desks we should be allowed to take them off, in the hallways and before/after school should be when we are required to wear them.
1102	Give them a little break outside where they can pull down their mask and take in fresh air. Provide resources where affordable mask are available.
1103	That is a tough question. Maybe have the ability to wear face shields so it is easier to breathe & it allows our children to see & read facial expressions. Being able to see your friends & teacher smile is a big deal.
1104	Have them wear it whenever they go out during the summer as a precaution and to build the habit.
1105	We are currently wearing masks when we leave the home so we consider it practice for when school begins again. However I am concerned for long periods of time because kids will play with them. An option might be to have schedules that stagger the kids attendance for instruction so that there is a morning group, an afternoon group and alternating days (essentially students are split into 4 groups). This gives them less time with masks and more social distancing.
1106	Not logical to expect students to wear one all day. Also, if a student is carrying the virus with no symptoms and coughs or sneezes, the mask is then a contaminated item.

1116	I think this will be difficult for children to adhere to this adults can wear them because they can more responsible for them it will to much for the kids
1117	Educational training on infection prevention (masking, hand sanitizing/washing). Role modeling by faculty. The kids are smart, most if not all understand at this point.
1118	If children practice wearing them now, it shouldn't be a problem in the fall.
1119	Wearing a mask is easy but social distancing that many students is impossible.
1120	They should all be wearing face masks everywhere they go.. so in theory the kiddos might be used to them by school.. but the full school day might be hard.. I don't know
1121	Provide a "safe to remove covering" space. Concerns over physical exertion (PE) and face coverings limiting breathing. Disciplinary actions that might be applied for removing a mask. Negative interactions with adults and classmates because a child removes a mask due to comfort or sensory needs.

1128	Of it is required for them to wear masks at school I think they need to be providing a new disposable mask for the students and staff each day. If not you don't know if they are being washed and taken care of properly, to be working effectively.
1129	Ensure equal & consistent enforcement of this in a positive & supportive manner. Not allowing children to avoid wearing a mask because their parents complain about it.
1130	Adults set an example to students wearing their masks properly and without complaining. Making masks required but also fun and fashionable. Providing masks when the student doesn't come to school with one.
1131	my special needs child will not wear a mask
1132	This isn't going to work for the younger kids

1133	My son tends to lick the inside of the face mask, and it fogs up his glasses, so he can't see. He already has hearing impairment, so not sure if face mask for my son will work for optimal learning.
1134	There is no possible way an elementary school child will be able to go 6 hrs with a mask on their face. Unrealistic expectation.
1135	This is asinine to even remotely believe your going to keep kids under the age of 15 wearing masks full time. Plus it's ridiculously over rated to enforce wearing masks as the governor and everyone else is putting too much stock into face masks when heard immunity has been proven for tens of thousands years and now cause 1 virus now all of a sudden were supposed to ignore mother nature
1136	They should not be forced to wear face coverings.
1137	Instill a culture of social responsibility but with common sense. If practical, allow mask requirements be relaxed if distancing can be put in place (ie plexi separators, over 6ft distances, private work spaces and lots of surface cleaning). Wearing masks for hours is difficult as an adult, it will be hard for most teens but with positive reinforcement or incentives, it may be a way to start to get back to in-school lecture.

1144	Is this school supplied face mask or personal? Are they allowed time to have a "break" with out l.e recess or PE running around both times.
1145	Don't make them wear them. They are dangerous and if my child gets lightheaded, headaches, passes out, gets sick with lung, sinus or staph infections because of them, there will be legal issues and a lot of negative publicity. Fight for our kids like you fight for your pay raises. Why don't you picket and strike for our kids?
1146	I will homeschool if mask wearing will be enforced.
1147	Not commenting on this as I don't agree with it.
1148	it bothers me the school district didn't put this much thought into closing schools, if everyone is wearing masks and you make it cool and fun the kids will adapt. Trauma from school being closed will not be so easy to adjust to.
1149	provide workstation barriers to allow child to take off mask while in class. Only use mask between periods and bathroom breaks. students can sanitize desks before and after each class.
1150	What about the parents that can't afford it? Children lose stuff regularly. Its going to be expensive to keep up with face masks or sheilds.
1151	Allow them to have breaks from wearing them like at recess

1152	Come up with a better plan. Face coverings lower oxygen levels and can damage lungs, organs, and the brain.
1153	I do not think you can do this effectively, there has been months of practice and it is a challenge even for adults. Many do not work well for glasses wearers. It will interrupt the educational process by being the mask police, parents complaining so and so was not wearing a masks etc... There had been little information supporting the transmission in healthy children. It is ridiculous and a health hazard provide false sense of security, cleanliness issues, bacterial infections in the lungs, irritates teen acne. And against some religious beliefs. 1159	Some families may have difficulties providing that for their children. Will there be established criteria what qualifies as proper faces coverings...I've seen it all. Can the state provide at least one face covering per child at the beginning of school?
1160	I hate wearing a mask and rarely wore one unless it was mandatory. I can't imagine how my children will be able to learn with something so distracting and suffocating on their face all day.
1161	Be flexible as new info comes out and adapt to lastest info instead of sticking to rules that do not apply.
1162	Not sure? Parents are going to have to remind the kids how important it is.
1163	I sincerely doubt that my children (or others) will manage a face mask all day. I don't feel it is reasonable for young children to be expected to do this OR reasonable for teachers to manage reminding children. I think children should have flexibility and there should be a space where they can take a break. I realize this rule is being handed down from the state... I do not agree with it in a pediatric population.
1164	Assist the children in understanding the importance of face masks.

1165	Instruction and demonstration. Possibly some kind of reward system, or a game, or special hashtag for photos of students properly using masks.
1166	I do not support this guidance from OSPI and DOH. The OSPI and DOH guidance is too far-reaching and these protocols interfere with our district's ability to equip our students with the knowledge that they need to succeed in an ever-changing global environment. On this issue, I vehemently disagree with the approach and response that our state is moving forward with. For the emotional, social, physical and academic well-being of my children, I will not support the use of face coverings while at school.

1171	Provide disposable masks
1172	Just be there to support the children that are having a hard time with it.
1173	I do not want my child wearing a mask. I might consider homeschooling on my own.
1174	Not sure
1175	I feel that kids will not be able to follow proper face mask wearing (touching, adjusting, taking it off, etc). Also if there is any type of recess or PE how can we expect all kids to follow wearing the masks.
1176	How will you do this for asthma kids?
1177	I don't know.. I'm not going to force my child to feel as if they are suffocating so we will stay home if it's an issue.
1178	Provide some outdoor mask free time
1179	Stop making anyone wear something that does nothing to stop this disease!
1180	allow face shields as well for students who have issues with the masks
1181	It's hard to say. Our son is constantly pulling it off his nose. We don't expect teachers to be mask-police but we want him to wear it when expected.
1182	Give opportunities to go outside and be 6ft apart...how will this be enforced? Will kids find it a game to take their mask off ...all concerns
1183	My children will not be wearing masks.
1184	Encourage individuality.
1185	Provide time and space for kids to be mask free for short periods while still maintaining distance as safety allows.
1186	Providing extra for precaution
1187	Providing masks for students.
1188	Adjust to children's tolerances in wearing a mask or shield.
1189	face coverings should not be worn all day. kids should only be expected to wear them when 6 feet cannot be maintained.

1190	Allow time between classes where they can remove mask for several minutes several times a day.
1191	We will not send our 4 children if this is required
1192	Educate on the reasons why they need to wear a mask, promote it, encourage it.
1193	We are already wearing them in public places, but my child can't wear a mask for along period of time because of her asthma.
1194	Face masks should be avoided if at all possible. I do not agree with covering my child's face for over 30 hours per week.
1195	Have fun masks. Good luck !
1196	Getting used to them? Have a couple that can be switched out, fresh mask halfway through. I really don't know. Have outside breaks to breath some fresh air.
1197	Lots of extras will be important. I'm concerned for some kids with sensory issues this might not be a reasonable expectation.
1198	My child will not be in public school if they are forced to wear a face mask
1199	My kids are already wearing them. I think school themed masks would be awesome.
1200	Make it mandatory
1201	Get as many kids and staff with face shields as possible so everyone can see each other's face and speak/breathe as normally as possible.
1202	Provide a uniform mask that is mandatory.
1203	Have families sign an agreement to enforcement of mask-wearing OR agreement to support online-only instruction.
1204	Parents need to prepare students.
1205	Provide times when they can take them off.
1206	It's going to be tough to get all of the kids to keep the masks on their faces
1207	I don't know I'm worried about the Kindergarteners because they need to be social and need to be active I don't know how easily they will keep their masks on.
1208	No masks at all! I will not be sending my daughter back to school. We will be homeschooling
1209	Remind everybody that they have to wear a face covering.
1210	Dont
1211	Make sure it is enforced properly, no one is above the regulations just because its uncomfortable for them/some
1212	Identify kids with glasses and give masks or suggestions of masks that don't fog to provide the best visibility. Clearly plan and ensure mask hygiene, maintenance and care. Is the school providing the mask/shield or are parents providing this? Either needs clear expectations laid out to a parent up front.
1213	I'm relieved that face shields are being discussed. This is a great alternative to the mask from what I've read. Yes to face shields! In class reminders not to touch their faces and normalizing face shields wearing.
1214	Finding face coverings that fit children well is the biggest issue I've had.

1215	Having a time that they can take the mask off to get fresh air. For example, a child that have an asthma history will need a time to do this.
1216	Give them breaks from wearing them.
1217	My child will not. That is an unreasonable expectation and a waste of time. Teachers will spend much of instruction time correcting this. I also will NOT field calls from the school to complain when my child (elementary age especially) has had to be repeatedly reminded to put it on. It is NOT natural and NOT reasonable for kids to stay away from friends or cover their face all .
1218	I'm worried that the staff will not be able to inforce the kids to wear their mask.
1219	Follow CDC guidelines and when 6 feet away, give the option to remove masks (wearing a mask for a while causes difficult breathing). I believe that during lunches, students should be able to sit outside (front and back) to get fresh air.
1220	Help normalize it. Post pictures of students and teachers with face coverings. Encourage kids to personalize their masks. We just need to normalize it somehow.
1221	Be patient it's a big change
1222	Staff needs to be sensitive to the children's needs. If child needs a break from the mask it should be honored (Maybe designated separated spot).
1223	Specify which types of face masks work and are aloud
1224	Have simple surgical masks available. These are the most comfortable kind of mask.
1225	If masks are required, they should do online learning.
1226	I'm not sure, but I do know how impossible it's going to be for a five year old to keep a mask on for 6 hours.... let alone a teacher trying to teach and manage 25+ kids keeping masking on.
1227	Give classes to make them, and allow as a form of creative expression. Credit can be given to K-5 for Social Studies, and 6-12 for career or home economics.
1228	Enforce the rules consistently
1229	I work retail and face coverings are very uncomfortable. I don't see making them mandatory as being remotely practical. They also cause people to touch their faces more than they normally would. This is a bad idea especially since kids are very low risk for Covid. If people have high risk family members at home there should be a homeschool option for them. Make sick people wear face coverings but allow healthy people to opt out. We have a immune system for a reason and masks just hamper it.
1230	They won't. This is a ridiculous idea and should not be a requirement.
1231	I think that when the students are sitting 6 feet apart, which it sounds like they are required to, that they should not have to wear their mask. Just like in restaurants, etc. When moving about and being within close proximity to each other, that might be the time for the mask. Also, when playing outside, obviously, no mask.

1234	This is really too bad

1235	Provide paper masks daily.
1236	My students will not attend if masks are required.
1237	We are already wearing them. The students should be used to it by the time school starts.
1238	Time for kids to go outside where they can get a break from wearing a mask
1239	Provide masks for those students that don't have them. Make it fun- add school spirit to masks or teach students/families how to make their own so they are personalized
1240	I don't think I will send my kids to school if masks are required. This is NOT ABOUT HEALTH. It's about control.
1241	There needs to be education on how to properly have face covering on at school. Smaller children may be more inclined to take them Off how would that be addressed?
1242	I don't know. I'd prefer not being forced to breathe in my own Co2. Not to mention it will be hard to breathe, especially for those who have asthma and/or other breathing problems. You would probably have to take 6 masks just for one day so you're not sitting in a gross, wet mask all day. I think the compromised should do online learning, and everyone else return back to school.
1243	Shorter classes. Or opportunity for students to go outside to get fresh air
1244	There are not enough studies to show that face masks are not harmful long term and may do more harm than good.
1245	To lead by example. To make sure that staff agrees to follow the same guidelines and to let the families know that they continue those practices in their (outside of school) daily lives. At the store, at the post office, etc...
1246	I feel that's mostly up to the parents to help them find which method suits them best...shields or cloth masks.
1247	My kids will just do homeschool
1248	I will withdraw my child if this is the case. Schools should NOT comply with this illegal matter. Its unconstitutional.
1249	Be patient!
1250	Reminding them
1251	This is no big deal to our family. We all (including my almost 1st grader) wear masks when we are out in the community - he will do fine with it and I think masking is a great idea.
1252	Follow CDC guidelines with social distancing to allow relaxation of the masks when practical.
1253	Be consistent in enforcement and ensure all staff are wear6theirs correctly as role models
1254	Can there be a place for kids to take a break from wearing their masks? Maybe outside? Or if they are at their desk sitting 6 feet apart from other students?
1255	Fight it and dont force children to wear facemask. Its unhealthy and unreasonable
1256	I think face shields would be more appropriate, you can see the face and breathing will not be obstructed
1257	Are they going to be provided by the school or is the to be self provided?
1258	They are going to have periods of not wearing mask (6 hours is too long for a child to be breathing in their own air).

1259	Good luck.
1260	I have been having a hard time finding child size face masks for my kids to wear. I have ordered three different brands and they are all too large for my kindergartner. I would appreciate guidance in where to purchase face masks that are appropriate for children.
1261	Have teachers give instructions on wearing a mask properly
1262	Educational curriculum that explains and reinforces the importance of face masks.
1263	Provide masks for students who cannot afford one.
1264	My kids will not be wearing mask. It is a health concern for our family.
1265	Chances for them to take breaks from wearing masks.
1266	It is my opinion that the students should be not wear masks. Face shield should be issued by the school every morning and collected every day after school and cleaned at night.
1267	If it goes with hybrid, have some kind of breaks so that the kids can take off their masks and be able to breathe fresh/ cool air. Wearing a mask all day gets too stuffy and hot.
1268	I think masks will severely impact students learning and teachers being able to focus on instruction.
1269	Half the families probably won't support mask wearing as an example at home and public places, so this will be a challenge. Promise to send non-compliant students home to not come back for x-days.
1270	My sped student will not tolerate wearing a mask. How am I suppose to keep him safe. He's 5
1271	I'm concerned there is no great way to help students with this and I am concerned that health issues will arise from wearing them all day. I do not believe kids should participate in p.e. while wearing masks, and think the best thing to do is limit time in school to 2-3 hour blocks.
1272	I am extremely concerned about my kids being in a mask all day where they are not getting proper ventilation and clean oxygen.
1273	One of my kids has asthma and cannot wear masks for a prolonged amount of time
1274	I think schools should have kid size and adult size disposable mask at school (depending on the school) incase a kid lost their or if it dropped on the floor or if they are having issues wearing their own. This would be a nice necklace of mind for sending my child. I also think that kids will take off their mask so maybe allowing them to go to take a breather outside without them on? I am not sure how that will work. Also, there could be a kid friendly video sent educating kids on how to wear mask and why it's important.
1275	I liked his example about the shoes. It is an expectation that is placed on families to make sure kids have proper shoes. I don't think this is a school responsibility.
1276	Reasonable limits on when they have to wear masks. Like, yes, in the hallways, but can take off at desk. Can take off in playground. Can take off for band, for PE. Can take off when social distancing is possible, only on when social distancing is not possible. Create space where there is space
1277	Not require them. It is unhealthy and unsafe for children.
1278	Be consistent. That should be the parents job.

1279	Maybe find a way to incorporate mask wearing as a positive situation and to be seen as a tool for being healthy. I do worry about physical fitness and mask wearing.
1280	Not having them wear one, I will not force my child at 8 years old to wear a mask when I myself have a hard time wearing one.
1281	Not sure how the school can help with this. Parents have to take the responsibility of talking to thier children and explaining the importance of this. If thier child is not able to leave a face mask on for age/ behavior or health reasons then they should do homeschooling.
1282	We should all be getting used to this now. The school should have them just in case they forget.
1283	As a parent I have been modeling wearing masks with my children and educating them on the importance of wearing them.
1284	- Provide cloth masks - Have school spirit masks for purchase
1285	Get new "leaders"
1286	I will not send my children to a school environment where face masks are required
1287	Model it consistently.
1288	Good luck with this for 6.5 hrs a day
1289	Not much other than it is now a requirement and part of the schools dress code.
1290	I don't think kids should have to wear them. They are uncomfortable and I believe will cause distractions for the kids.
1291	Posters, flyers in how to wear a mask properly
1292	Cleaning the desks and touched surfaces should be a MUCH higher priority than wearing masks!
1293	Masks seem unrealistic with younger kids who will have a hard time keeping them on for 6.5 hrs a day, constantly touching their face
1294	Fabric masks are restricting & hot. Over the course of the day they will also become damp. Kids might need to carry more than one. Allow drinks to be carried. Places for kids to take off/get a break from wearing.
1295	Practice before class starts.
1296	Will be a challenge for primary age children
1297	This should be optional. Those that feel the need to ear a mask should be able to, those that do not want to wear one should not be made to wear one.
1298	Make it fun, but also figure out how little ones can have a supply of clean, dry face masks when they sneeze or have a runny nose.
1299	Not wearing them! Co2 has horrific effects that are long term..there is no better way to wear a mask.
1300	Send home practice help sheets and informative videos explains how the schools are implementing it.
1301	I don't think you can ever get used to masks, I can't see kids ever adjusting to them. I shop every week and still get claustrophobia after 30 mins of wearing a mask in the store. It's a lot to ask a child to do while expected to learn in class all day.

1302	I feel like my children will oblige, but I feel it will be hard to enforce school wide.
1303	Limit the time at school by doing in person instructions then go home and do work, have times the kids can go outside to breath fresh air and take the mask off.
1304	I don't agree with face masks and know they can cause health issues and anxiety. How is the district going to handle those students?
1305	Get a lot of help from parent volunteers to stay in class and help with washing and masks. We would need way more outside Time. More covered outside areas for outdoor learning
1306	I think the masks should be a personal choice. Those worried about COVID19 infection should wear the masks.
1307	Set the expectation and give consequences to the students that don't comply. If families don't agree, they can have the option for online school.
1308	Enforcing the rules, I understand that it's going to be kids and that they will forget for the adults more than ever have to keep an eye on them to avoid the apread
1309	Not sending the kids to school , giving them the option do all online schooling.
1310	Losing battle. Kids are not going to follow the rules. Have you seen them at Lunch Period??
1311	Staff modeling, send home if violating policy
1312	Have students individualize and decorate face shields
1313	If they need to uncover their NOSE from time to time to breathe better that teachers and staff aren't jerks and don't freak out. Some kids are claustrophobic and the masks can prove to be tricky. Also don't forget the studies that show extended mask wearing may actually be harmful. That too is important to remember.
1314	Provide enough face masks that kids are changing them throughout the day
1315	That's not an issue for my child
1316	not require them
1317	Gentle enforcement of the rule with a realistic understanding of a masks function and applicability. For example, not chastising a student unjustly for their mask slipping down while playing on the playground.
1318	I don't really know. It is really up to the parents to works with their kids to get use to face masks
1319	Only require when kids are sick
1320	Educate parents to educate students why we are wearing face coverings.
1321	I have no clue. This seems extremely unrealistic.
1322	I've been wearing a mask an increased amount of time and I can hardly stand it, so I'm not sure how my kids are going to be able to handle it. If they are not talking it's not so bad, but talking a lot or doing physical exertion while wearing a mask is taxing. Not sure what to suggest tho...
1323	Only require face coverings when interacting with individuals outside of their home classroom participants.
1324	I have no clue... facemasks are becoming an every day type of a thing. Important for everyone.
1325	Lots of luck

1326	Provide masks for those who do not have them
1327	BE UNDERSTANDING. These little people are not used to this or conditioned to dealing with discomfort.
1328	My kids will not attend school if facemasks are required.
1329	Buy disposable masks for students for every day. Stop insinuating that children will be "killing" others when they don't wear a mask.
1330	Face shields for every kid/ teacher
1331	Not interested in having my child attend school with a face covering.
1332	Lots of thin disposable ones
1333	provide masks to those who can't afford them. Provide affordable (or free for low income) masks and mask alternatives (face shields)
1334	My son has ADHD, and is very easily distracted. He will not be easy to get to wear a mask throughout the school day, and I worry that he and children like him will spend more time playing with/ losing their masks than wearing them. I am all for mask wearing, but I just don't think younger kids are going to be capable of wearing them For long periods of time effectively.
1335	provide shields like you provide chromebooks
1336	I don't think it is realistic for primary students and teachers to wear masks. It is too hard to hear and understand students and teachers when a mask is worn. How can primary students hear the difference between sounds (ie b, d, t, ch, etc)?
1337	I read that if a student is uncomfortable in a mask they will not get required to wear it. hard to breathe, have severe headaches when masked
1338	So stupid, they are going to be touching their faces 100% of the time. Get over it already. A lot time is going to be wasted making the teachers the "mask police". Go back to normal
1339	Provide facemasks at school for students who do not have access to them.
1340	My kids are already wearing masks without problems... we have been out in a limited way and they have been practicing... I think more outdoor breaks where they can remove the mask outside "for a breather" with distancing helps kids tolerate it
1341	Make them standard like uniforms. No personalization. This will ensure they are up to health system standards and there won't be an opportunity for teasing.
1342	School district to provide for each student
1343	Provide each student with a cloth face covering
1344	I don't know but I think it's going to be very hard for all the students to keep them on and not play with them. I have to wear one at work all day and it is very hot when wearing one.
1345	Do not require it. Respect each families choice in what is right for their family.
1346	Face coverings are not feasible in elementary education.
1347	You will have to be firm for ALL school attendees. If students must wear face masks then ALL teachers, staff, and personnel should lead by example. Students will emulate their superior's actions. If all CKSH are not wearing masks, then do not expect the students to follow suit. This is not a "do as I say, not as I do" scenario.

1348	Na
1349	You can't. That's a silly question. It's just going to suck for them like it does for every one else. Also, the school should PROVIDE face shields.
1350	If my child doesn't want to continue wearing it, please don't force her. She's only 5 years old :(
1351	These guidelines will not work. Children should not wear face masks all day. We can barely keep them on for walking into a necessary appointment. I'm completely against this requirement. If they cannot be in school without one, they shouldn't be in school. This is unsafe and unhealthy
1352	If school hours were half days then it wouldn't feel like such a long day.
1353	I have no problem with my children wearing them, but we are an autism family with multiple sensory needs. I see this hindering and causing too much distress for my children.
1354	If face coverings are a must then let's go with the plastic face shields. Staff and students can be issued one as a part of their school supplies. Individually labeled and stored at the school just like headphones and pencil boxes. Sanitizing the shields can be an end of the day activity along with wiping desks and stacking chairs. Cloth masks are hard to breathe through and difficult to keep clean. Cloth masks can just be for transitioning to and from school (ie. during drop off & pick up & bus transportation). Clear plastic shields are better for communication and facial expressions especially for younger kids who are learning to recognize social cues etc. They can also be worn during group activities like music, library, or PE without causing shortness of breath. AND kids can still eat by putting their food under the edge of their shield so they can have lunch room socialization. I do think there will have to be more space between the students at the tables during lunch. Special Ed students are a group that will require more assistance as some of the students will not tolerate face coverings. Those students will have to be worked with on a case by case basis. If staff are wearing the plastic face shields then the students' safety is increased even if the students do not wear one.

1367	Provide breather breaks, maybe out on the playground everyone spreads out and masks off for a few mins.
1368	A LOT of modeling, shorten school days for the early elementary students and frequent outside breaks without masks if possible.
1369	Requiring masks to be properly labeled for each student this ensures that students don't share masks. Also allowing the students a break from wearing mask by leaving the masks in class when going outside for recess.
1370	I have 3 children and I know not only my children but others will have a very hard time wearing masks and keeping them on. Not only that but not all families can afford to pay for face masks just because they supposedly help keep you from getting sick. We are firm believers that it doesn't help keep you from getting sick, germs are everywhere no matter if you wear a face mask or not. It comes in on shoes, clothes, everything!
1371	Will masks be required during PE? Will masks be provided?
1372	A face mask is like putting up a chain link fence to keep out mosquitoes. It's not helping. It's hindering in so many ways! Good luck getting a child to properly wear a mask. It'll be a wasted battle.
1373	Just require it for in person instruction!
1374	Provide disposable roomy type masks not the constricting sterile type the kids will touch their faces too much
1375	They won't do it .. they are kids.
1376	Allow to relax masks when keeping social distancing, maybe space the desks further apart so kids can relax while doing work assignments in class
1377	My daughter is fine with wearing a mask all day at school.
1378	Have the kids go to online learning or don't attend
1379	DONT REQUIRE IT
1380	My student will not be wearing a mask.
1381	We all have to do our part- if the science says that face masks help slow transmission then it is irresponsible of parents to allow their children to break the rules.
1382	Providing the face coverings
1383	It'll be fine:)
1384	not sure but yes face mask is like a daily accessory however not everyone has the chance to get or make a mask. This come to a money issue with their family.

1385	Giving students breaks outside with social distancing measure in place.
1386	Not make them wear them due to causing other health problems
1387	I think students are experiencing masks in everyday life however it may be important to have parents and kids sign a pledge because it has become such a political issue.
1388	I have no idea. I have a third grader and I know for certain that it's going to be a fight every time I cannot imagine her wearing it for longer than 15 minutes much less all day at school
1389	Have students research effectiveness/ineffectiveness of face masks.
1390	Have disposable masks available.
1391	class time. This is ridiculous. Either send the kids back normally when it's safe or not at all. I refuse to send them in a mask
1392	Not really sure there is anything you can do. I will not be comfortable with my son being disciplined if he forgets to wear it or loses it during the day. I guess making sure that there is back up masks provided in case the student loses one during the day.
1393	I have no idea. Sounds like a nightmare and more health risks than benefits with kids touching their faces and masks all day every day.
1394	I think it is completely unrealistic and teachers will spend all of class dealing with students and their masks
1395	No idea.
1396	Provide kid sized comfortable masks that have a band that goes all around their head, not behind ears. It face shields?
1397	Have extras! Clearly explain when its appropriate to wear a mask and when they can take them off. I think these are going to be extra distracting like a hat would be.
1398	Unsure
1399	I'm already seeing sassy Karen responses to the survey on FB. I wish you all good luck in dealing with difficult people in a difficult time. Perhaps remind people that the schools are an excellent 'public' service which means that decisions are guidelines are made by people with expertise and authority based on the information available for the greater good of the group, not an individual or subgroup's personal opinions or interests.
1400	It is not healthy for the childrwn I dont agree
1401	absolutely not. i WILL not wear a mask for 6 hours or in general.
1402	I think this is a pointless rule. How will this be enforced at lunch and recess. What about kids who are claustrophobic? Hand washing and disinfecting are more reliable ways of ensuring the health and safety of our children. Masks have been proven to be ineffective in preventing the spread of germs. Because there are no filters. And you cannot guarentee each child will have a freshly washed mask each day.
1403	Some kids have special needs and other issues. Either regular school or no school
1404	Do not let them off with warnings, students need to take this as serious as the adults.
1405	Provide a list of best practices to help students be more comfortable with a mask. Such as, what are the easiest masks for kids to wear? Training kids/parents in proper fitting of masks
1406	Nothing is going to help the younger ones

1407	Go fully online because requiring masks isn't going to work.
1408	I'm fine with them wearing face coverings. I am concerned about leaving masks at school/home/on bus, etc. I think having disposable masks available for student use is necessary, especially at the elementary level. I am concerned about availability of these items, and children swapping/losing them
1409	Allowing some time during the day that the students can remove masks.
1410	Keep the students informed on the importance of face covering how they will keep them safe and so as the other students and school staff.
1411	My children wear masks when they are in public. They should only need to adjust to the length of time.
1412	I am not optimistic about expecting all students in an elementary school to feasibly wear face masks for an entire school day.
1413	Start by wearing one at home for a few hours at a time and building up to a full school day.
1414	Be able and WILLING to help students retie masks as needed.
1415	I think it is unrealistic to expect young students to wear a mask all day. I would support fewer days at school to achieve smaller class size instead of this unrealistic, overly burdensome, and anxiety provoking guidance of mask wearing for lower grades.
1416	I think this will just be a trial and modify! My kids don't mind wearing masks but it is typically only for under one hour.
1417	Make the rules clear with NO exceptions. Wearing masks is not a new thing. They either wear one or they don't enter the building. And if the kids remove it they are send home. Period.
1418	Contest for best/funniest/most creative/most school spirit masks. Make it something fun. I am also making masks and hope to have a supply to be able to donate to the school for staff and students.
1419	Ensure there are extras available onsite in case something happens to theirs.
1420	It will be uncomfortable for students to be required to wear a mask all day.
1421	As an adult wearing a mask every single day is very difficult both physically and emotionally, I do not want my child to go through this when staying home and staying safe is an option
1422	I think that is going to be a challenge to have kids wear them. 1. let the kids choose or design their own masks. 2. Allow for times and areas that kids can ditch the masks. 3 have a reward program for them to work towards.
1423	I'm not on board with this one, particularly for kids who do any sort of physical activity and who have problems with allergies and asthma.
1424	Perhaps a work shop on options so we can figure out the covering that is most comfortable for our student.
1425	Schools provide PPE's, for free, as well as having parents provide PPE for their own child
1426	Provide face shields for all students and staff instead. They don't inhibit breathing as badly as masks, and allow students to see expressions and words being spoken.
1427	Find something comfortable for them

1428	My children will not return to school if face coverings are required. This is a black and white for us, we do not believe in covering children's mouths. I had to mark the response above that we would not return until there's a vaccine, but that is only because we believe masks will be required until one is available. We will not be wearing masks and we will not be getting the vaccine, so I had to answer using that one since a "return if no masks required" was not an option.
1429	I think the school should provide masks. As parents we can't be responsible to provide a mask every day if they lose it or leave it at school.
1430	It's ridiculous to expect kindergartners through high school to wear a mask! And actually when we read the guidelines it said recommended. We think wearing masks and taking temperatures every day is asinine!
1431	Give some reusable cloth masks to each student. The student who doesn't wear them should not enter the school or ride a bus.
1432	Constant training/education for young students. Implement new safety rules.
1433	provide a lot of support and reminders
1434	The kids will be in a contained area for several hours a day, multiple days a week. Although face masks may decrease the likelihood of transmission, lowering the class size and controlling flow of students is much more a concern. Providing uniform styles of face masks for all students would be great, if required, and allowing the students to pick their colors, also providing multiple masks for each child to allow for washing and for them to change the color when desired.
1435	Consistency, my children wear masks when ever we are out. We remind them of the importance of wearing a mask and keeping their hands away from their faces. We have them wash their hands regularly.
1436	Have disposable face masks really available at school/on the busses. Students should be given a basic course (again) on washing their hands and covering their mouths when coughing/sneezing.
1437	It is more important for children and facility to use appropriate hand hygiene then it is to wear face mask. If children are forced to wear these mask then there MUST be other options for schooling in place that doesn't place the load on working parents.

1445	Teach the importance of this not only for the person wearing the mask (protecting others) but for the others around them (protecting themselves). And the importance of wearing masks correctly!!! Give Schooling options for families not wanting to wear masks - distance learning/ homeschooling ... options to choose for those who are ok with wearing masks - onsite, distance learning home schooling. Provide masks for those that can't afford or need one. Adjust based on age/ school level...
1446	Providing disposable masks as parents may not properly wash reusable ones. Teaching kids how to properly wear masks, wash their hands, and not touch their hands.
1447	Unfortunately, I don't feel there is anything they can do. This is a deal breaker for my kids going back to school is having to wear a mask.
1448	Face mask are not good for healthy students. They cause more health problems than benefits of wearing them.
1449	Parents need to be tasked with acclimating their children to wearing a mask before the start of the school year.
1450	It'll take time to get used to it
1451	you can work with osps and doh and get facts about these things and not keep catering to fear and the medias feelings. Get something that might actually stop the spread instead of making kids wear masks to help people feel better about the world.
1452	Have masks be provided if possible, just in case.
1453	Making sure each student has access to appropriate face coverings. Not all student a can afford "good" masks.
1454	This will be particularly tricky with your special needs classrooms, especially those with sensory issues.
1455	Knowing a lot of the kids I say good luck with that--you are going to need it more so than I
1456	Provide face coverings.
1457	I think making a student wear a face mask will be difficult
1458	My kids hate the masks and I don't know how to get them to wear them to wear them without a fight
1459	they could only require use of face mask when social distancing is not possible.
1460	I think parents are going to need to shoulder some of the burden by normalizing this at home.
1461	By not having them in the school
1462	I am fine with everyone wearing face coverings at school, but I'm not sure how this will be enforced with elementary kids who like to be near each other and touch each other. Also what happens at lunch? What about PE and recess? Is it safe for kids to run in or while wearing a face mask? Maybe it would be helpful if the school day was shortened for elementary kids, half the kids come for half the day and then maybe it will be easier for kids to comply. We can do lunch at home, and then the kids are not around each other without masks.
1463	N/A

1464	I have 2 young children with autism. We are happy to work towards this, but I also expect that the mental well-being of my children be taken into consideration, along with their health. Other concerns are around the safety of them having in a mask that they are not independent in using. (I'm trying to figure out options to take this away this summer) but, as it stands my child is not independent with a mask and I want to be sure he isn't stuck in a mask uncomfortable. I'm also worried about social distancing precautions like not getting play ground use. My children absolutely need those times. They also will need OT, ST and resource room teachers, how will that be worked out while also keeping them just with one class teacher? I do not want them to not receive those services, but I also do not want them to be exposed more than needed. Such a hard situation we have. I'm thankful for your work to get through this!
1465	Send out rules and expectations early so parents can prepare and teach their kids what its going to be like
1466	Constant Education as to why the face masks are so important to keep on.
1467	I don't think this will work and it is not safe for young children to be having a mask on their faces all day. What about kids with medical and high risk?
1468	Make sure there is a common -standard mask for all students that is uniform
1469	It's not happening. That's completely foolish to believe teenagers are going to magically comply, or young people are going to follow the rules. If you believe you're going to get second grade kids and teenagers to keep a mask on, you're an idiot.
1470	I don't see it working. Also school need to provide proper facemask if they are making kids wear them.
1471	Help give parents, students, teachers, etc a voice with our government. Requiring masks is an over reach of personal freedoms, is going to be hard to enforce, can cause many other health issues. Taking temperatures and doing a health assessment each day is fine. Strict hand washing and disinfecting surfaces is a must. Social distancing when able. If staff want to or parents want their kids to wear masks, fine, but it should NOT be mandatory. Requiring masks for healthy individuals is just not right.
1472	Maybe a kids video about why it is important we wear masks.
1473	I'm not sure, I know my daughter hates them.
1474	Allow them to wear their own cloth mask. My daughter's face is quite small and we had to go through several before we found one that she is comfortable wearing.
1475	Perhaps a slow start allowing students to practice wearing PPE around each other. Allowance of face shields versus masks, offering times built into the day that students don't have to wear masks (or outdoor education).

1481	Provide masks for students who forget theirs or provide reusable masks for low-SES families who cannot afford their own.
1482	Face shield
1483	Require prior to entering
1484	Provide face coverings.
1485	It is not healthy to wear a face mask and I have 1 child who feels suffocated every time he does wear one. It will be a hardship emotionally and physically. I might keep them home to learn if this is a requirement..
1486	I think this is a ridiculous expectation of any child under high school age.
1487	Is the school going to have on site face coverings for all the kids who forget theirs or leave on the bus?
1488	Maybe there is a way that students would not have to wear them all day while at school. Is that even possible?
1489	I don't believe the face masks are going to work. Check new studies.
1490	Educate the students and enforce and model proper masking. Possibly provide a mask for students who don't have one
1491	I'm not comfortable with my kids having to wear masks all day.
1492	Provide times/areas they can be mask free. I work in an environment with constant mask wearing and need breaks to allow "airing out" due to moisture.
1493	My child will not come back if you have to wear face coverings. This is not appropriate practice for kids as well as the expectation is ridiculous
1494	These are kids and this is stressful for them. Role Model for them but do not shame them when they forget them. Have a supply ready for those who forget or cannot afford.
1495	Make sure they have a mask before going to school
1496	Allow flexibility for special needs students
1497	Have a mask with breathing / filter
1498	kids are going to struggle for many different reasons and masks are going to make them touch their faces more often then without a mask
1499	That is a violation of personal liberties & should NOT be enforced.
1500	Talking with kids about a month before school with practice beforehand so they know what to expect. Videos from management and teachers.
1501	I think best bet would be to do shields for all
1502	Allow students to have "free" no mask time. It is hard for adults to breathe with them on, can't imagine a very active child.
1503	Not require it.

1504	Teach them about why they should wear a mask. It isn't just about them, but the relative or friend that they could get very sick.
1505	Let them not wear masks if there are less than 10 people in a room and are able to stay 6 feet apart.
1506	Allow the kids to have set aside breathing time while in class.
1507	I will not send my Kindergartener to school if he is required to wear a face mask all day even in his classroom. If he could wear a mask to and from the building but NOT in his classroom, I would consider it.
1508	Be realistic about it. I have to wear a facemask at work transitioning. Once i am at my desk 6FT apart from my co-worker I am not required to wear it. Now if i need to attend a meeting or talk with someone who is wearing their facemask I put mine on. Common sense needs to be part of this. And honestly i don't believe children should wear them. 1511	My son has asthma and is not able to wear a mask all day
1512	wearing them is dangerous to the health of the children, especially during physical activity. I do not promote this
1513	Shorter days. Half day school days to allow disinfecting in the afternoons. Mornings can be used to go over instruction and socialization and afternoons at home to complete work and continue with distance learning.
1514	No clue. They aren't comfortable and I feel would be too much of a distraction.

1516	My kids wear masks now and everywhere we go. By Fall, they will be used to it. A suggestion of this can be made to families. Parents need to set the example and set the kids up early. It's our responsibility as parents.
1517	I'm not sure, but CKHS should convey this requirement immediately to the parents so they can start preparing their children. We're all wearing masks in our family, including our child. This should be common practice by fall, 2020.
1518	Encourage families to have their students practice wearing masks ASAP so they have time to find masks that fit their children well; offer good (comfortable) masks (either at cost, discounted, or free especially if families have free/reduced lunch) available from the school or district; support from teachers/staff in the first days back especially for students who may not be used to wearing masks and are struggling/anxious about all of the changes

1523	Where them for now and gradually stop wearing them.
1524	Our children are well equipped to deal with face masks. This is not one of our concerns.
1525	If families are unable to provide face coverings to provide a cloth face covering that the student can use.
1526	Make sure there are clean disposable of reuseable masks available for children who cannot come by them on their own and remind students before they come to school.
1527	It should be mandatory. If people have enough notice they could get them.used to wesring masks now
1528	I have no idea but there is no way you're going to be able to get a bunch of ecap and kinder kids to keep a facemask on so I don't know how that's supposed to work
1529	??
1530	Provide comfortable, light weight masks.
1531	Make sure the district have a supply of PPE available to the students and remind them to reuse as often as they feel comfortable.
1532	Increase the awareness of each students consistently.
1533	They should not. Face coverings are dehumanizing at best, and at worst cause several health issues from breathing in your own carbon dioxide all day as well as the bacteria that collects on them. For younger students, they can be scary, and will prevent emotional support from failure to see facial expressions and prevent learning from inability to clearly see the teacher's face and mouth movements. Face masks SHOULD NOT be a requirement for schools.
1534	I do not support my child having to wear a face covering, I think this infringes on our rights. If there are children who have health concerns they should stay home. If parents want their child to wear one that is their right as well and can "protect" themselves.
1535	This will be the biggest challenge as the young kids will not be able to not mess with them. Face masks will be a disaster with them and I have no idea how this will work.
1536	It is their school uniform. It is now a part of their school attire the same a shirt or shoes. Parents need to have their kids practice wearing them and putting them on and off. They also need to take care that the masks fit properly.
1537	Learning how to wear them properly at the beginning of school because some people don't cover their noses.
1538	shorter school days if they do go in person, because the longer in a mask the more likely that students are touching it or messing with it.
1539	Schools can provide masks, or make it mandatory to wear.
1540	By not following through with mandatory face masks. Viruses have been around since before formal education, we survived before, we'll be fine now.

1541	Unknown. It's very difficult for my child with asthma to breathe well while wearing a mask for a longer period of time. Potential stress of being confined for hours to a mask as well as skin irritations/sensitivities may be concerning for some children. Not wearing the mask correctly, Swapping masks with friends, or even being picked on for the type of mask, the cost of purchasing masks as well as correctly sanitizing them by the families, and Removing the mask to eat or drink throughout the day are all potential issues.
1542	Ignore this. A child can't be expected to wear a mask at school. Also affects their ability to learn, especially if they have speech issues.
1543	I think it's unrealistic to expect kids to wear face masks at all times. It's going to be a distraction for my child. She prefers to stay home than go anywhere that requires a mask. When she does come out with her mask all she does is touch her face to constantly readjust the mask. Having to wear one for seven hours a day is not going to work well for her. 1549	Tell OSPI and DOH to allow the parents to make that decision. We don't want teachers preoccupied with face masks and not focusing on the curriculum and lesson plan. Your plan works great on paper, not in reality. Majority of adults don't even wear face masks in public anymore and you expect kids to do it. Good Luck.
1550	All the time
1551	Provide videos for the kids on the importance of them.
1552	Two of my kids have developed rashes on their face From the mask and breathing in recycled air is bad for my kids health.
1553	Instructional video
1554	That is a tough one. It isn't pleasant to do. I wish I had the magic answer.
1555	Have each student keep a spare at school just in case. Work with PTAs to get students who need masks, but can't provide them due to financial issues.
1556	Wait a few more month to make this decision.
1557	If my child chooses not to I will support him, even if that means not attending public education.
1558	Have families take responsibility and teach their kid(s) at home regarding safety and the need for the mask. Or help provide face shield for students who refuse or cannot wear a mask.
1559	I don't have small children. My child knows the importance of wearing a mask

1560	Sending materials and links ahead of first day of school, as well as First day back to school being a welcoming introduction to the importance of face masks and proper hygiene. Examples could include: Hand washing songs, face mask decorating, teachers having fun mask prints, videos of children and/or celebrities from around the world wearing masks.
1561	Make sure building temperatures are comfortably cool.
1562	reward students for wearing face coverings! Even if it's the right thing to do. Reward goes a long way, while punishment, unless severe, doesn't get what is wanted. Educators know that.
1563	Provide guidelines when face coverings are required and examples of acceptable face coverings.
1564	Allow students to take a break from mask wearing every once in a while (like taking it off for bathroom breaks or having advisory nature walks where you can take it off).
1565	Have parents remind students at home.
1566	I'm not sure but I just don't see kids leaving the masks on or not fiddling with it.
1567	The schools should probably make a video that shows the proper way to wear a mask and demonstrates how to use things that can be used to help keep masks on people's faces since some people can't keep a traditional mask on their face without other equipment. The schools should also supply masks in case a student forgets to bring a mask to school or needs a new mask while at school as well as things that can keep masks on.

1579	I will not send my kids if they have to wear a face mask

1580	Breaks for fresh air. I think it's ridiculous to expect young children and those with asthma to stay covered up for a full class period. Working in my mask even for an hour is miserable.
1581	My child will absolutely not be wearing a face mask or shield to school or on the bus. This is complete bs. It is not "normal" and I will not teach my child that it is "normal".
1582	I don't feel this will be a problem for older children but am concerned for young kids. It's a distraction for my going to be 1st grader and it's hard to talk with many masks. Not sure how this will work out or what could be done.
1583	Teach the proven scientific evidence through videos showing the distance of our breath and spit in all scenarios. More important, teach that one should have respect for others and the rules that highly educated people are guiding us with. Make it fun in encouraging kids to use the mask as self expression, class colors etc. Maybe kids can sell some to raise money.
1584	Good luck! It's going to be a huge distraction in learning. Clear guidelines need to be set up and clear consequences for those not following the rules enforced. It's not fair or effective if even one or two students go constantly fight the masks. Maybe allow students to have a mask break. Step out side remove mask for five minutes. 1585	I am very concerned about the requirement to wear masks. It is not healthy, especially for my child who has asthma.

1592	Children depend on social cues and facial feedback for positive, healthy socioemotional development. Denying children access to friendly faces because their friends and staff must wear masks will hinder their development.
1593	We just think that cloth masks are a little suffocating if worn for long periods of time.
1594	Face coverings all day is ridiculous and unsafe, and includes a risk of bacterial infection from the coverings
1595	I don't see an elementary-aged child being able to wear a mask all day at school. Also, they will be at risk when they have to remove them to eat lunch.
1596	Ask families to have them start practicing now.
1597	I don't know how you're going to get Kindergartners to keep a face mask on at all times.
1598	Make it fun! Let them wear fun but appropriate themed face masks that let them express their individuality while also keeping everyone safe.
1599	We will adjust
1600	It's going to be difficult. My daughter has sensory issues.

1601	They should be use to it by now
1602	I don't know.
1603	Wearing a face mask should not be as bad a problem considering how it is expected to wear them out in public right now, so most to all kids should at least own one face mask that they can wear.
1604	Providing face masks
1605	Good luck! We are trying to get them to wear them now and it's a challenge. An adjustment period prior to coming to school might help. Some sort of guidance sent out to parents suggesting ways how to keep them on kids, increasing their hourly limit and building up a tolerance.
1606	Giving out masks
1607	Some students have a hard time breathing while wearing face masks for long periods of time. I for one have asthma that is uncontrolled so it is hard for me to catch my breath when talking or walking while using a face mask.
1608	This is a rough one. I don't know.
1609	This should be happening while out of school to ensure safety but if it isn't, parents can be directed toward resources about covid-19. Children can be involved in this discussion and the importance of wearing a mask that prevents droplets from entering the mouth and nose. Adjustments need to be made, even if uncomfortable in a worldwide global pandemic.
1610	I think it is fairly unreasonable to expect kids to wear face coverings all day long while going up and down stairs lugging all their class room materials especially as there are no lockers to store there books and lunch. Also, I can not imagine doing gym class with a mask on.
1611	Expecting children to wear an air constricting mask for hours per day is simply ridiculous. My children have a hard time keeping one on due to comfort and lack of oxygen. Also glasses wearing makes it hard as well. I think schools should provide a face shield for students with glasses.
1612	A video sent out before school starts of teachers demonstrating mask use. It might make kids more comfortable with the idea and understand it is normal and part of how school will be.
1613	Provide time and place where students can take their masks off and maintain social distancing.
1614	Be consistent
1615	I purchased face shields for my kids and cloths masks. Make sure accessibility to coverings doesn't hinder students ability to use them, remind families this NPI is about more than saving lives for some it could have life long health complications. Incentives for students who regularly bring/wear face coverings. Be clear on what counts as reasons for not wearing masks and maybe educate everyone on the reasons (without identifying a person) so that kids aren't harassing those without them or using it as an excuse not to wear one.
1616	Almost impossible, I think.
1617	could have them available at school. for example if a student forgets a mask of face covering then a disposable one may be provided by the school
1618	Understand that students will tire of them and possibly need breaks from them.

1619	Be understanding with the kids!
1620	Let them know that this will be a requirement. However, I do hope you realize there are exceptions to who can wear a mask all day. And I truly hope you do not exclude these from in person learning because of their special circumstances.
1621	Perhaps allow face shield instead of mask. I dont see younger grades following the mask rules very well. I will have a K age child and could see face shields a much better option
1622	I do not see how this will be enforceable (or social distancing, for that matter) with Special Needs children (particularly those highly impacted by their disability).
1623	My students have sensory issues they would struggle with it.
1624	No action required. We have plenty of cloth face masks.
1625	maybe provide some for students who might forget to bring one or don't have access for whatever reason
1626	Occasional break during the day, when they can be socially distant enough to remove their mask. If student can be greater than 6 feet or barriers to allow removal.
1627	I think this will just have the kids touching their faces more creating a stronger risk of them getting sick. I think wearing masks is important but I do not think this is going to work well with young kids. My medically fragile child doesn't understand wearing the mask and will continually pull it off her face.
1628	Don't make them wear them when seated at their desks. Only when they need to be close to others.
1629	offer a good website with affordable, comfortable children's masks for sale for all of your students.It is hard finding child-size masks that fit correctly.
1630	I feel like if you say this is how it's gonna be for sure so get your child used to a mask this summer. People complain but when it comes down to it, they are gonna put a mask on their kid and send them to school. It's better they prepare their child now and quit fighting it...
1631	N/A
1632	I will not send my child to school if this is required! if this is going to be required give parents the option and opportunity to school at home via online distant learning.
1633	Have face masks to distribute to students and teach students proper protocol for face masks.
1634	Allow the students to choose if they wear the mask or the face shield. Also, arrange for breaks in the day to step outside so that masks/shield can be removed for some fresh air.
1635	Will schools supply face mask? Face mask should be changed on a daily basis.
1636	They do more harm than good breathing in your own co2 all day is harmful to you
1637	Again I state if face coverings are required they should not be in school. What it says is that it is still out there and not safe.
1638	Teachers need to let kids step out of class to take their mask off for a breathing break if needed.

1639	Provide options on different styles to choose from. Our 8 and 11 year old would wear the coverings alright, but I know our 8 year old would constantly touch it and complain. I think it will honestly be a big distraction during learning at the start of school. So I think patience and persistence is really the only answer, with a focus on clean hands and working environment.
1640	Show us easy-to-understand facts and graphs that explain how masks are used and their importance.
1641	na
1642	for those that need help verbal reminders but please remember these are high school children
1643	It's easier when everyone does it, as soon as they are others without masks it'll be harder.
1644	Have a 2 part day, that way either the students can take classes in the morning or afternoon to avoid a lot of people. But also so that they will not have to have lunch, therefore, do not have to take their face masks off when at the school.
1645	I have six kids and don't sew. I feel that if the school district is going to require mask at school they should be provided by the school.
1646	My concern is for the younger kids and special needs kids who may not understand why they need to wear a face covering of some sort.
1647	My children will not return to public school with this requirement in place
1648	I just don't think the elementary kids will wear them properly and they'll be a distraction from learning. I'm not opposed, I just don't see it working.
1649	Allow breaks when playing outside and PE.
1650	Giving us advanced notice so that we can talk to our children about the importance. It might be good for my child's teacher to send a video about how to wear a face covering and why it is important.
1651	They should be allowed to wear disposable. Much easier to breathe and talk through and more certain they are clean.
1652	I don't agree with face masks
1653	Shorter school hours.
1654	Make all kids wear a mask with 5 minute breaks in the sun between classes so the kids can breathe fresh air.
1655	Supply students masks as they enter the building/ enter a school bus
1656	Shorten in-school hours and bulk up at-home learning.
1657	Let's not they are awful you can't breathe you can't speak and they're hell for people with asthma
1658	Practice at home in small increments. Show the sneeze in slow mo and point out every droplet being a germ
1659	Provide disposable masks for kids at school.
1660	Put out plenty of consistent guidance (continually as long as they have to wear them) about how often to switch out masks, how to clean them, and effective mask designs
1661	Provide face masks for those who don't have access, other than that I'm not sure how you can help

1662	Give the students breathing breaks fresh air I worry about my kids being sick from wearing a mask all day
1663	Im very much into face coverings to protect each other
1664	Tell them they have to. Dont sugar coat it.
1665	How will this work with beating compromised children? Or asthma? Both my children are severely asthmatic.
1666	No clue
1667	I understand that masks can help our students gather together again, but I worry that having masks on will Dampen their ability to communicate effectively in class. Shields allow for easier communication but are they as effective a barrier on their own? Are they easy to maintain and disinfect?
1668	By allowing periodic supervised social distancing when the children can take a break from wearing the mask.
1669	Sell them at the cougar den at school.
1670	This will not work well with students. It will just make them touch their face more, which means more access to germs and cause more stress on teachers to keep masks on kids. I don't see how anyone can help kids adjust to this. If there are going to be all of these guidelines, just keep school online.
1671	Set expectations early
1672	I don't care as long as schools are reopened.
1673	This entire idea of making kids wear face masks is ridiculous! My kid has enough issues learning without having to wear a mask!
1674	Um maybe at least let us breath actual air in PE because that's seriously gonna suck. Just an idea.
1675	I don't believe face mask are enough, until a vaccine is available it is foolish to send children to school.
1676	It's understandable
1677	Allowing more breaks to have fresh air from outside or in a specific safe area. Making sure their oxygen levels are safe also
1678	This is not okay
1679	Good luck
1680	If it's mandatory, enforce it. If kids don't comply, they get sent home. There should be strict rules if that is what's required.
1681	We just need to properly educate them and express how important it is to keep the face mask/covering on at school.
1682	I dont know
1683	When in the building, always keep it on unless you're required to take it off. For example, during lunch.
1684	I don't believe they will be able to get used to wearing a mask for 7 hours a day, 5 days a week.
1685	Not mandatory, it's just a recommendation.

1686	Require the use of masks. If a child refuses to wear a mask, they should go home.
1687	How to wear them correctly
1688	I think they do more harm than good. Wearing a mask to run into a store is doable as much as I don't agree with this either. Students, teachers and staff should not be wearing a mask for that many hours a day it is not healthy for any of them. Adjusting to wearing a mask is not the answer.
1689	Encourage practicing and taking the time to find the right fit. Start now.
1690	Face coverings are going to be a huge issue for many kids, and a distraction. Especially for kids with health issues related to their lungs. I don't know how this adjustment can be made to be easier for parents or kids.
1691	I was worried about my future Kindergartener being able to wear her mask all day long. But having a face shield as an option makes me feel better.
1692	Make it a zero tolerance policy. Help the teachers by making it simple: you don't wear it, you go to the office. No ifs, ands, or butts.
1693	make it optional
1694	Educate or train staff and students that it is important and for the safety of everyone. And the staff/teachers need to lead, I have seen pictures of teachers at events recently without a mask, not wearing their mask properly, or not social distancing without masks.
1695	If out side they don't have to have the mask on .
1696	To me, it is like shoes. They are not my favorite thing, but I believe in science and my children will wear them. I will be disappointed and angry with the district if they waiver on this. Safety first.
1697	My students will not wear face coverings.
1698	Making masks available for all those who are unable to provide their own.
1699	My family continues to stress the importance of safety, not only for US, but for other's as well. We wear masks in public places bc we believe that if we happen to be asymptomatic, it's very important not to pass anything on to those who may be more susceptible to virus complications. My children are older, (9th and 5th grade), so the understand; however, I am an Early Childhood Educator, and I am definitely concerned about how to address the issue of children under 5 wearing masks and how that will affect them.

1706	Students should not eat together since they won't be wearing masks. Plastic desk shields would be a safe alternative is social distancing is not possible.

1707	Find someone making masks that fit kids, are comfortable, and smell ok.
1708	Kids can start "practicing" over the summer. Start with a short time period each day and gradually increase time until reaching a full school day.
1709	I would like to know how you will enforce this. Will this be a school board policy. If this becomes a choice by OSPI and/or DOH and CK chooses to make students wear masks, that could be a deciding factor in us changing schools for our student.
1710	children should not be directed or ordered to wear face mask.
1711	Come up with alternative. What if the student has health issues such as asthma. Masks can breed bacteria. Masks will pose more of a health risk than not wearing them. This should be a choice! Not a mandate.
1712	I don't need the school working with me to promote wearing a mask that will not prevent the spread of a virus that isn't significantly dangerous to demographic age we are talking about.
1713	I do not think it works for kids. I hope we could find a better way, like plastic board between kids when they are having class.
1714	this is not tenable for our students. health concerns prevent them from wearing masks
1715	Just make them do it
1716	We have no problem if his aides work on getting him to wear a mask, but highly doubt success.
1717	Allow face shields. Students will be more comfortable.
1718	It is ridiculous to expect elementary age children to keep them on and not spend a majority of their time distracted by them. My kid had a hard enough time breathing with one one when we go to Costco.
1719	I don't understand how this works with young kids who are in preschool for a range of reasons. My son goes mainly to develop social skills and speech. With everyone's faces covered and muffled how much is he gaining/learning. Speech and social skills are learned though the learning to read body language, being able to look at someone's mouth to see how a sound is made.
1720	We will support this.
1721	I don't think it will be as big of an issue for middle school kids. They do better than adults.
1722	Allow many different options
1723	This will be so difficult.
1724	Wear it everywhere
1725	I'm not sure. I do know that the paper (medical masks) are the most comfortable and breathable and for me easiest to wear.
1726	provide masks to kids who don't have any and remind students as much as possible
1727	Provide children with masks if needed. Remind children to wear them if they forget. Allow parents to provide mask or shield if family prefers.
1728	NO MASKS. We should be able to sign a waiver and those who are not comfortable With that can learn online

1729	Not fully sure, but I dont see how this will work at lunch times or with any vigorous activity (ie. P.E., etc) since they cannot breath as well with the masks on, which could cause serious health issues.
1730	Before school starts get the last little bit of air outside then when you are at the door put the mask on and sit down and do stuff for a little bit to get adjusted to it.
1731	They're children. If they're told to wear a mask by an adult, mine will wear a mask.
1732	My son is autistic and refuses to wear face coverings. Perhaps, providing face masks ahead of time so the children can get used to them.
1733	Have them wear them at home for periods of time, slowly extending how long.
1734	My kids have refused to go anywhere that requires a mask. One of the biggest problems is they both wear glasses (as do I) and we have been unable to find any option that allows for a mask that doesn't constantly fog up glasses and impair vision.
1735	I'm not sure what the answer is but I have a lot of concern about students not wearing masks like they are required to.
1736	I am not sure.
1737	Practice during summer months Gradually build stamina in fall?
1738	Provide them for students in need.
1739	I believe students should go to school 2-4 hours a day to avoid needing to wear a mask for 8 hours.
1740	Providing disposable masks for those who can't obtain reusables or those who forget. Reminding students who are struggling why it's important to have masks.
1741	I have no idea how you can enforce this rule. Are you going to send people home if they don't wear a mask? How are you going to make a 5 year old in school wear one all day?
1742	Ha ha ha. I understand the requirements, but it's one of the reasons I'm for hybrid school. I think full 5 days a week and 6+ hours a day of mask wearing is too much and will be detrimental.
1743	I am no ok with this method. If this is required my kids will go online school.
1744	My kids say they will do whatever they need to do to go back to school but I know they will tough their faces so much more with a mask. Not sure how we can make it easier for the kids or teachers
1745	Kids are fine using face masks when they are told. Maybe if they need a breather have teachers take them outside and stand apart
1746	Offer half day instruction. Requiring a full 6-7 hour day of school with 100% face mask wearing outside of lunch time is a big ask. Elementary students won't be able to properly utilize masks, and will likely get frustrated. Kids also tend to touch masks a lot, defeating the purpose.
1747	Part of state mandate. Unfortunately you have no choice.
1748	Provide 5 per child.
1749	Face coverings are for people who are sick not healthy people. If they do not wear them at any other time why force them to wear them at school

1750	Realize that 100% compliance is not achievable
1751	Just make it a requirement, they'll get the hang of it eventually
1752	Unsure. Perhaps provide masks as needed.
1753	I don't think it's reasonable to expect 5 year olds to wear face masks for 6+ hours a day. I currently can't get my daughter to wear it more than 10 minutes without her fidgeting with it.
1754	I have a special needs child, she won't be able to wear a mask.
1755	I think it is going to be a very difficult task to get all kids to wear masks all day. Specifically in elementary school.
1756	A fun video from fellow older students (my child is in elementary school) that show how to wear a mask in general and why it is important. In addition, however to eat lunch, what to do if you have to use a tissue, getting a drink, etc... (I am a pediatric occupational therapist and I can foresee these functional tasks being difficult to understand for young children.)
1757	It will be challenging but most kids are doing great at the grocery store and other spaces where required. An entire day will be very hard for kids to wear masks and it might prove to be frustrating for all involved.
1758	Masks with fun kid designs?
1759	The masks do nothing to protect the one wearing them or the ones surrounding anyone wearing them. It would be a joke to keep masks on kids for 6+ hours a day. They have proven to cause respiratory issues and sores on ears and faces from wearing them.

1762	I'm not sure how long students will be able to wear face masks. My kids can hardly keep theirs on at the stores. Maybe the classrooms can do something like the grocery stores and have a clear acrylic barrier between desks?
1763	I believe this will be difficult for elementary aged children. Kids at this age will have a difficult time wearing a mask if they are running and playing. I dont understand how daycares can operate with teachers having masks and the kids (not wearing masks) have temperatures taken each day. But the schools can not operate in similar fashion? Also for those that are low income will they be provided masks for children if they cannot obtain on their own?

1770	Talk about it, recommendations for kid fitting masks. Ties and other devices with school branding to help ease discomfort
1771	We should already be using masks, any time we have to interact with people.
1772	Model it, reinforce it, reward it, have contests for most creative?
1773	I do not see this being a feasible thing to manage/implement.
1774	This will be a huge task! I know my teen is already fighting me on this issue. I don't know how the school will be able to comply with this, kids will constantly be taking them off, playing with them, forgetting them at home, not washing them, etc. I wish there was an easy answer, but there is not. Masks should be worn! But I personally would not want to wear one the entire day.
1775	It should not be required.
1776	Well, you'll always have some people who don't like the idea, but making it a part of the dress code could help mandate it. Also, maybe brief the students on why face coverings are important. It may lead to a more responsible student body in this context.
1777	Have ugly face mask day. Provide a reward system for those who consistently wear face masks every day. Use peer pressure. Have. PTA's provide the school with face masks. 1778	Either have PPE guidelines provided prior to school starting so parents can share guidelines and expectations with students.
1779	practice with students before school begins. Teach parents to present face masks in a calm and factual way. If students won't properly wear masks there should be no repercussions - just education and working with the student and family
1780	You can't force kids to do things. Those who don't want to follow the rules won't follow the rules. They will find ways around any and all precautions; exploiting every single loophole.
1781	Providing mask if students forgets, ASB can sell fun Raider face coverings for purchase.
1782	For some it may be as easy as an orientation to the new school year giving the kids instruction and reason why there are new rules in place, for others they might already understand the need but for some it may be an impossible thing to explain to the child and it may indeed be an impossible task for some children as well!!! This all needs to be based on a per child need! I for one have a special needs kiddo and she doesnt even have the understanding of what a virus is let alone why the need for a face mask is so important. She has sensory processing disorder and wearing a facemask is not something she can do.
1783	Make the masks fun, remove the stigma of wearing them that they may have from their parents, and keep track of exposure so the parents are aware.
1784	I think it is an unrealistic expectation. It is not developmentally appropriate for younger students and that it will cause more problems than it will help.

1785	I don't support kids wearing masks. They don't in daycare settings so why make them at school? The guidance is not law, it is recommendations based on the phase each county is in. Central Kitsap will be past phase 4 by the time school starts. So at what point do the kids get to stop wearing masks?
1786	No mask

1796	Compliance has to be monitored if a student does not want to wear a mask they should be asked to leave the school.
1797	Maybe by helping those who don't have masks acquire them.
1798	I think it is ridiculous.
1799	Ensure all students adhere to the rules,
1800	Provide enough for all kids
1801	provide families with school colored masks
1802	I'm not too sure to honestly
1803	We can send with face mask but the schools probably should provide if students forget to bring, etc.
1804	I'm not sure that my kids will return while face coverings are required.
1805	Allow a wide variety of face coverings, as long as there are effective in reducing transmission. Provide masks for low income students and their families. Make available a wide variety of materials: cotton, mulberry silk, neoprene, antibacterial athletic material for students with different tolerances due to eczema, acne, tactile sensitivities, etc.
1806	Provide students with masks and not require them to get their own.
1807	It's not possible. You cannot even enforce the CURRENT rules that are in place.
1808	Don't require it, it is ridiculous to think this is healthy for kids to wear a mask all day. They will get lost every day while at lunch. We will not be buying into the mask hysteria and we will not purchase them. We will go to the dr and get a waiver to not wear one

1809	Provide clear messaging on requirements and exceptions to policy and consistent enforcement
1810	Give them breaks to take them off and breathe fresh air outside in between classes/hourly
1811	Might be difficult for them to adjust specially for the younger ones.
1812	If students are required to wear face coverings all day, I have been looking into home school options and will likely choose to home school over sending them to school with a mask.
1813	I ordered my son crayola fun print masks but i honeslty dont know. I think making young children 5/6 wear a mask will be hard and i personally dont think it should be required of them.
1814	OK to mandate masks

1829	If the school districts can supply masks for students with clear face coverings on the mouth so that students can SEE the teachers mouth moving while taking and for the teacher to SEE the students mouth moving while reading. I personally feel (as an educator myself) that is NOT feasible for students to wear masks all day primarily younger students learning to read and relying on watching people's mouths move while talking. It's also going to be hard for students to hear and understand their teacher and peers through the muffled sound while talking in a mask. The masks are unbearably hot so I don't foresee my 5 year old or 7 year old being okay to breathe with a mask all day. That to me is the most detrimental aspect to this new guidance put out by the health department.

1832	Seek out and share where families can purchase comfort-fit masks. Provide comfortable masks for families who are on the free/reduced lunch program.
1833	if they don't do it, they aren't allowed to attend
1834	Not sure. I am really worried about my 7 year old constantly touching his face to keep it on. Also, I am worried about his behavior because of it.
1835	We refuse to send our children to public school if face coverings are required. It is ridiculous to think this is practical or even necessary at this point.
1836	Wearing face coverings while crowded together in close quarters for hours at a time is 100% futile. There has to be a better plan. If you are going to do in person schooling, you need a better idea than simply masks. I would say 3 hours max is what the students would be able to do with the masks.
1837	Having the teachers do it as well.
1838	Although it's required kids will not wear them properly. How will they eat lunch? It's not a safe environment to put kids in.
1839	This task seems impossible.
1840	Honestly -and I'm not trying to be pessimistic here - I just don't see this as a viable, realistic expectation for children.
1841	Make the school days shorter. You can not expect a child to be comfortable wearing a face mask for 8 hours a day and still be able to focus on schoolwork. Also will y'all be getting rid of P.E and recess?
1842	N/A
1843	I have been wearing one at work for the past 3 months. Aside from students with health/breathing issues, it should not be a problem at all.
1844	Will face shields be provided for those who can't wear masks, or can links be provided to parents to procur them for their kids?
1845	I don't agree with face masks and will expect some flexibility from staff for kids getting used to a new requirement.

1846	Provide times/breaks when they can take them off if they are 6 feet away from everyone at their desk or outside.
1847	Integrate the behavior into existing reward programs.
1848	My students will not be returning in the fall if they are required to wear a face covering for eight hours of instruction. This is not healthy! If this is indeed the only way the children can return to face-to-face schooling, I hope that the district will continue to offer an online version of instruction for Families that don't wish to send their children back to that environment
1849	What about the kids with asthma? These face masks being worn all day everyday is horrible for the kids , little own the ones who already have co.primised lungs and airways
1850	Tell them about their faces breaking out and they will need one every single day, you know be honest. Practice at home.
1851	Encourage them to have fun and show their personalities. Mask hygiene/changing also needs to be encouraged.
1852	Ensure all students are following the rules of wearing a mask and using it properly. Have extra masks available if a student may need another one due to soiling etc.
1853	My 4th grader will not do well in school all day with a mask. I have to wear a mask at work and by hr 5, it is very distracting.
1854	Do not require them
1855	There needs to be some clear guidelines. I personally think this is a ridiculous requirement
1856	Honestly wearing the mask isn't the issue. Ensuring it's proper wear, and hand washing guidelines are followed is my concern.
1857	Don't know
1858	Make sure all students, including special education students need to follow the same protocols in order to keep other students and staff safe.
1859	I'm concerned about the kids having to wear a mask the whole time without breaks. I believe it's not healthy for them to wear masks for extended lengths of time. They need to be able to get some fresh air, outside. Even if weather isn't great.
1860	Circumvent this problem by allowing telecommute study. It is irrational to expect literal children to maintain PPE for hours on end. The risk of asymptomatic infection in my child becoming a symptomatic infection in another member of my home is too great at the present time.

1868	Face shields might be a reasonable alternatives that teachers could disinfect at the end of each day. Cleaner than a reusable mask
1869	I'll have a Kindergartener entering school who can hardly breath in a mask for any length of time. I think it's unrealistic for younger children to be required to wear them.
1870	I work in retail where we have to wear ours all day long. I can't imagine making my 7 year old wear these all day.
1871	If it isn't safe enough to attend without PPE, it isn't safe to attend. We should pursue online and hybrid options as other districts are.
1872	For younger students, a Mr. Rogers type video in early August talking about facemasks, why we wear them, acknowledging that most people don't like wearing them, but that it's important to wear them. Also having stuffed animals wearing facemasks might help. For older students, anything that makes them fashionable/fun/cool. 1875	Possibly having incentives or rewards for children wearing their face masks. It may be hard for younger students to wear one all day.
1876	For the younger kids, Make is a game. Maybe allow students to creat their own masks for the classrooms
1877	My son is 4 years old and in the developmental preschool class. Wearing a mask for several hours will be very difficult for him.

1879	The schools should put out information throughout the summer to remind families to practice at home so kids can get used to wearing them.
1880	Provide compliant masks or shields from the school. This way everyone is wearing the right thing
1881	Make it a consistent and enforceable expectation.
1882	Provide resources to agencies that may be providing reusable masks
1883	Specific guidelines in when masks do not have to be worn (at lunch, drinking, at desk, etc). Signage to remind them to wear masks (doors, bathrooms, hallways).
1884	Mandate cloth mask/face covering a "no excuse " rule. It will be an adjustment but being lenient will undermine all attempts for overall safety.

Both of my children have been stressed in the past when they are rushed by their teachers with putting on coats, etc. Since kids already don't like masks, give them plenty of time, and approach the subject with a positive attitude.

1892	I don't support face coverings for all day of school. It is ridiculous (from a scientific perspective...as I understand it). I understand it is more unhealthy to wear a mask all day than to not wear a mask. And ineffective as well unless done "perfectly" as medical professionals are trained in and motivated to practice perfection...our kids should not be expected to engage in behavior that has them "throwing away logic"...my not so humble opinion!!! :-)

1902	Have breathable face coverings. Most are hard to breathe through. Also I don't see kids complying with the rules.
1903	Face shields should be provided to the younger students. It's an impossible expectation for younger elementary students to be required to properly wear a cloth mask that won't just be a conduit for germs.
1904	It won't be possible to follow this guideline, especially for students with special needs or very young students.

1948	I'm not sure. My kiddos are younger but I would like to design something for my ADHD kid so that she will tolerate it better. She freaks out in the stores so I don't know how a full day at school will be tolerated.
1949	I believe that it would be hard for a lot of kids to properly wear their face mask for a full school day. Even for the ones that are some what use to wearing one.
1950	breathing break
1951	I strongly disagree with the requirement of face masks for children. This should be up to the parents discretion and we should be offered an opt out form understanding the "risks" associated with not requiring our children to wear them. We have not required our child to wear one this entire time and the couple of times our son has been required to was for his sisters surgery and within 5 minutes was telling us he could not breathe right and it was hard for him to catch his breath. After 5 minutes....this requirement is absolutely insane on the health aspect for these children. This is another distraction for the students and turns the teachers into mask police. Has there been consideration over how this is just going to catch snot? They will not be able to leave them alone meaning the masks aren't doing any good with being touched all day long? 1963	Allowing them to pull them down when needed and not getting in trouble for the need to have a breath of fresh air.
1964	Giving instructions on how and why wearing them is helpful.
1965	Provide additional face masks if a student forgot theirs? Allow face shields

1966	Make them wear them, no exceptions
1967	make masks available for free on demand with no questions asked for students and their families
1968	Learning at appropriate levels
1969	Before school starts parents need to orientate their children to the face mask if they haven't already.
1970	It must be mandated and enforced for all or they will slowly stop participating in wearing them. Also to allow them to express themselves through their masks. No dress code on the masks (unless there is nudity, racist images, or curse words).
1971	I don't agree with the face masks in the first place, but I do believe it will be incredibly challenging for the kids no matter what. I think a lot can change between now and when school opens for Fall and we need to have that re-evaluated. I don't feel comfortable with the expectation of wearing face mask all day.

1973	My son will be returning to school as a 2nd grader. As a parent of a young child I see a big struggle for teacher. If its mandatory then we need to make sure all parents know soon so we can help our kids adjust to them for long term outings like school.

1975	Use face shields. Cloth masks over long periods of time are detrimental to your health
1976	Teach half days. Masks become more uncomfortable the longer you have to wear them.
1977	Have some grace for the students by not strictly enforcing every moment they be worn.
1978	I believe it is a good idea to implement wearing face masks. But to be honest after reading the outline of what is going to be expected for daily interaction. This is completely absurd to think the 6ft rule, face masks, and no contact interaction is even a possibility. Let alone a realistic notion for young children.

2008	That's ridiculous. I have no idea how I would prepare a 7 year old for that.
2009	Provide masks
2010	To enforce mask wearing compliance (allowing exceptions for SPED or verifiable medical difficulties). Perhaps requiring district approved mask options to ensure efficacy.
2011	It's hard to imagine a school year where kids don't ever see each other's faces. We lived in Japan for almost three years and wore masks regularly when in crowded places like trains and busy tight shopping areas..but all the time while at school is hard to imagine. I would hope there are planned spaces where social distancing is possible and students, and teachers too, can interact responsibly while seeing each other's faces. I think the 100 percent mask wearing is going to be challenging for learning as well both for the kids and staff alike. I can imagine my son saying well..might as well stay home and remote learn. 2020	My children will not have that issue, they wear masks frequently.
2021	This is an absurd requirement and has zero science to back up the necessity of having children wear a mask. I don't see how they can expect a child to wear a mask for 6 hours a day, especially the elementary aged children.
2022	have a design contest for mask for each school and then have them made.
2023	Provide guidelines ahead of time for what can and cannot be worn. Just like with a dress code. Can they have graphics on their masks? etc. I'm not sure how teachers are supposed to teach with a mask on though...
2024	Offer an incentive to the kids to keep them on and not lose them such as extra recess time etc

2025	Give kids a break with masks on to have them breathe fresh air. And if they are struggling with wearing a mask, don't force them to wear it.
2026	I have no idea. It's going to be a constant struggle for the teachers with younger students.
2027	Students can't wear face masks when doing vigorous, or just more then sedimentary activity. Or anxiety. Or asthmsa. Or other times it's difficult to breathe, and need a break from limited air flow. Some have died in other schools that were required to wear face masks during PE.
2028	I honestly don't believe the students will be following guidelines with masks.
2029	Students should not be required to wear a mask during school.
2030	Not have students go back into the schools. It is a short sighted decision.
2031	I am not comfortable sending my children (kinder & 3rd grade) to school having to wear masks ALL day. I understand it would be required but I personally see it as more of a distraction.
2032	Treat the children with grace. My kids will practice wearing their masks prior to school reopening, but they are young elementary age and will need grace for a while.
2033	Don't care if we have to wear masks
2034	I think it is going to be difficult to have children wear masks at school. They can be hot and I feel they would be cumbersome when palying
2035	No PE or physically exerting activities. Patience and gentle reminders for children.
2036	I hate this situation, but we will do what we have to do. What will be the school's response to kids who struggle with the mask requirement?
2037	providing them for those don't have them, kids who forgot them, or they got dirty, etc
2038	Make provisions to the rule. Like if doing in person, allow students to take off the masks if desks are 6ft apart. If students are transiting or around friends, then have the mask be required.
2039	I honestly am having a hard time picturing this being successful, and I am strongly in favor of masks in the community. How will lunchtime work? How can a classroom of kindergarteners be expected to wear a mask for a full school day? And it will take more than mask wearing to keep the virus from spreading. What about social distancing? The classrooms and hallways are crowded as it is.
2040	My kids are wearing face masks while they are in local grocery stores. My only issue is wearing one for several hours a day. My children complain that it's uncomfortable behind their ears or that it's hard to breathe.

Maybe a plexiglass partitions between desks so students may remove them for a time, or increased breaks to "go outside" for a breather? Provide incentives for keeping your mask on. 2056	I have an incoming kindergartener. I have no idea how this can be enforced with children that young.

2059	They need to wear them, period! Stop coddling parents and their kids.
2060	Make them thin as possible and know that it's going to be next to impossible to get young children to wear them effectively.

2067	Masks are hard. They slip easily and then the kids are touching their faces even more then they normally would. I feel like standardized face shields for all kids would be easier and then everyone is doing/wearing the same thing
2068	Having a place where they can take the masks off for a break would be good. Last week we had alot of errands to run and having to keep them on except in the car was hot and uncomfortable
2069	My students won't keep a face mask on. It's also very unhealthy to keep a face mask on for hours everyday.
2070	No masks
2071	Good question
2072	good luck keeping a kindergarten class wearing masks or social distancing.
2073	I'm interested in the face shield option vs face mask
2074	Make them personalized and fun?
2075	Install plexiglass barriers between their desks, so the children can take their masks off while at their desks. Are we really expecting children to wear a mask for 6 hours a day?
2076	No masks will be worn by my child. If you require face masks, my child will not be attending.
2077	Make school online.
2078	Rotate each student a chance to take it off periodically.
2079	Families that want face covering mandatory should keep there children at home.
2080	I am hoping that although my child is in middle school that there would be a time or two that a group could go outside with social distancing and take their mask off for a break.
2081	Videos prior to school and first day
2082	How can we ensure that the classroom and full building is disinfected everyday all day and without putting rediculous demands in the school supplies list for parents to pay for. We'd keep them home if we still had to supply products.
2083	I don't want to send my young child to school where she has to wear a mask all day and cannot have normal activities like going to the cafeteria, lunchroom, recess, specialists, etc.
2084	By introducing a positive culture about precaution importance
2085	Be patient as they adjust....offer many reminders throughout the day. Let kids pick fun/cool patterns for their masks.
2086	Would love if face shields are an option
2087	I'm not sure
2088	Stylish fun prints on fabric masks to help students express individual style
2089	Fun mask related activities. Mask design competitions. Class masks. Build masks in class.

2090	Patience, allow time for breaks (makes free zone) and be explicit in accountability to parents and students. Child's refusal not placed in discipline record
2091	Not make them wear face coverings.
2092	If there is a way to make mask wearing incentive-based, I think children will respond better to wearing masks. It's going to be difficult to wear them all day, so we will need to recognize students and provide positive engagement around wearing them.
2093	Some events to help students feel more comfortable wearing masks and getting back into the classroom. Info for students who still feel scared of going out because of Covid fears.
2094	Provide them.
2095	The kids need to understand the "why" for wearing masks and how masks are used to protect each other not only ourselves.
2096	Practice at home
2097	Get used to it by wearing them now when they go out-
2098	Good luck with that. You really think 5 and 6 year old are going to be okay with a mask all day at school? And actually keep them on and sanitary?
2099	I think it's going to be really difficult to have the kids wear face coverings all day (mainly the younger kids). Not only will it be irritating, but if the child does not want to wear it and starts having issues like throwing tantrums because of it, or getting upset, what is the teacher supposed to do? I would have a hard time forcing the kids to wear the face mask if it was causing an emotional response. I think the timeline of the day (amount allotted for lunch, recess, etc) will have to change to allow time for students to wash hands before and after those events too. Maybe hand washing stations could be set up to help with this? Kids aren't going to be wearing a face mask while eating lunch, so they are touching their face to take it off then to put it back on. There are just a lot of variables surrounding this whole issue. I don't envy the school district for having to make these decisions!
2100	It's not reasonable for students for a 5 hr school day. Shorten the day. My son is very bothered by his glasses fogging up while masked. I'm really concerned about the emotional effects of not being able to see emotion in each other's faces.
2101	If schools could provide face coverings or face shields, that would likely be helpful to many families. It will just take time and repetition for students to get used to attending school in this way.
2102	By setting good examples from staff and not allowing exceptions.
2103	Encourage people to have common sense. Anyone who doesn't comply should not be allowed in the classroom.
2104	My child has had to every time we leave the house so I don't think it will be a problem for her however for her older brother who is currently homeschooled but not through Barker Creek since that option doesn't exist anymore if I were to opt to enroll him back I to the Special needs program, I think it would be hard to get him to keep one on, just like it would be for most that are in that program.
2105	there just needs to be mask breaks I wear one at work all day and its ruff some days

2106	Where do we even begin with addressing this question.
2107	School provided and breaks throughout day
2108	I think wearing masks in moderation would be good, but requiring them to wear them all day long is not going to work. Children will be touching their faces more than usual with required mask wearing; which will cause the spread of germs more easily.
2109	Having face covers available of different sizes For a comfortable fit. Fun looking. My boys hate them because you can't see smiles.
2110	Grace with children adapting to a new norm.
2111	Schools can provide them for the students and staff. If they are provided by the school and are required upon entering. If they don't like it they can have the option of distance learning/homeschooling.
2112	Ask parents to have them wear them in public places now like they should be so they are not new to them. It's just going to be a new way of life so it will have to be understood and if it's not then maybe remote learning is the best option for the families that don't agree to it.
2113	Send them home if the kids can't comply.
2114	Should be a personal choice over half the masks people wear don't help one bit it's a false sense of security
2115	I don't believe this is the schools responsibility. This is on parents to work with Thier children over the summer to get used to wearing them.
2116	Face coverings will just be the next thing children get in trouble for. What about children with sensory issues, or special needs kids who may not understand why they have to wear them.
2117	Smaller classes, no changing rooms, limit interaction amongst students, no cafeteria or group gatherings.
2118	Good luck I feel like face mask will be a distraction in learning
2119	In class doesn't have to wear it but once out of class they have to wear them. Also check their temperature everyday before going to class. Smaller class sizes
2120	If my child has to wear one we will most likely opt out of school. This will be her first year of kindergarten. I will be worried if she will have to wear it for more then an hour.
2121	My daughter is fine with face coverings
2122	Some education about the need for Dave coverings, ability to provide face coverings when they forget/lose them, turn them into a fashion statement.
2123	Not effective fir young students. Use the rules as guidelines, not absolutes.
2124	Provide throw away masks if a student forgets their mask, or can't afford multiple masks. Enforcement of mask wearing.
2125	My child has ADHD and is very hyperactive. Wearing a mask all day long is not something I'm going to make her do.
2126	Good luck...there is no one way to do this. We don't believe in wearing masks to make others feel better, but I know there are others who will wear masks in the home to make it feel normal.

2127	It's not healthy for anyone to wear face masks all day long. Children are safer by not wearing a face mask due to they will continue to touch there face and play with the mask. Along with them not getting enough free air and causing more health issues to develop like headaches and difficulty breathing in most children.
2128	I don't feel that face coverings are healthy for students to wear for extended periods of time and hinder fresh air and proper breathing. Nor do I think kids will properly wear the face coverings for extended periods of time.
2129	This is a challenge for kids.
2130	Supply masks for those that cannot afford or have the means to, I worry about the smaller children who don't understand the importance as much
2131	Make it fun for them and to help them understand why they need to wear them
2132	Limited time. Only outside of their primary class room.
2133	Have families trial wearing face masks throughout days and weeks before school starts. This will help parents decide if the children will be able to tolerate a face mask or having to adapt to homeschool if not able to tolerate it.
2134	Ages play a huge part, it's very difficult to make a 6 year old understand they have to keep a face mask on all day.
2135	unsure
2136	Not make them wear one.
2137	Na
2138	Good luck enforcing mask wearing without creating mental health issues in elementary aged kids!
2139	My kindergartener responded very well to hand-washing training this year. Modeling proper face covering training after this would likely be helpful for her.
2140	I'm not sure how to do this. Wearing a mask for long periods is hot and uncomfortable.
2141	My children do not like to wear a mask. They fidget with it and have a hard time not being able to read the expression on other peoples faces.
2142	I will remind and work with my child to wear face coverings but being so young it's hard for them to understand not to touch their face or other surfaces.
2143	Provide masks for those who don't have them.
2144	We have been wearing them already. Teach kids expectations of masks. Allow for "mask breaks" outside
2145	It is the parent's responsibility RIGHT NOW to practice and educate their children on appropriate mask use/wearing and hand-washing. If families start now, it won't be such a big deal in the fall.
2146	not having our kids wear face masks
2147	This will not work with younger students. 1. Supply masks to students that properly fit them. 2. All students will have to have a number of opportunities throughout the day to remove their mask an not wear it for 15-20mins at a time.
2148	Provide face coverings

2149	One of my students is autistic and I'm not sure how he will react to the face mask. He tends to put his hands in his mouth.
2150	Give us a venue to argue this unrealistic proposal. I see the value in trying to do this - my wife and I both work in the medical field - however, it is not going to prevent anything, and could in fact make it worse, aside from the obvious issues I pointed out in my last comment, children - and even adults who have not developed conscientious habits due to their profession continually touch their face, adjust their masks, etc. This is an ill conceived concept.
2151	To me, this is no different than wearing a seat beat. It is the new normal. Consequences must be put in place for those that do not follow the regulations.
2152	Most kids should already be wearing them in public
2153	Only require it when cannot guarantee 6 foot distance. Also allow the students to take off their masks whenever possible, especially those with asthma and respiratory issue so that they can get fresh air and not breathe in so much carbon dioxide

2157	online school, I do not care if there is a vaccine.
2158	Where them at home to build up to wearing at school
2159	Provide masks for students who come without a mask.
2160	Provide a standard fase covering for all students to insure equity.
2161	This is impossible at the elementary level. The mask will be a plaything for most, and a complete distraction from learning.
2162	I'm concerned that there will be more face touching than normal due to all the face mask adjustments during the day. This will increase the probability of the kids contracting viruses.
2163	Maybe allow breaks more often to allow them to take the masks off outside for breathing regular air. Making sure they stay hydrated
2164	It's hard for adults to wear face coverings for part of a day, let alone having kids wear them all day at school. What about PE? You'll have more issues with kids having health issues from wearing a mask all day, everyday
2165	My children will not be participating in face coverings.
2166	Acknowledge that "guidance" is not law and not require masks.
2167	We can 3d print mask holders which make it way more comfortable for kids. These can/should be given out. Im happy to help coordinate.
2168	Have kids practice at home ahead of starting school

2172	I'm not sure. I do know my children will have an extremely hard time wearing a mask 24/7 while at school.
2173	You CANNOT make a special needs student wear a mask. Also you need to take into consideration special needs students that rely on facial expression to be taught or to mimic language. A face mask on teachers in these scenarios will also affect that child's access to a proper education.
2174	Don't make them wear a mask or face covering.
2175	I believe as long as everyone is mandated to wear masks and it's enforced it will be easier for students to adjust to the new norm
2176	I don't believe there is a way for kids to wear masks for a entire school day. I have a hard time while at work wearing one for more than 30 minutes at a time.
2177	I have a special needs child at woodlands and am concerned about the children in his class. I know it is especially hard on them, wearing masks and I am worried about them keeping hands clean and personal boundaries.
2178	Maybe incentives for school spirit masks or consistent wear.
2179	Give students several samples so they can figure out which type works best for them...and reduces the amount of their own air that they are breathing back.
2180	Have extras on hand in case kids forget/damage their masks. NOT in a "look who doesn't have one/ruined their mask" style!
2181	It's unfair and unrealistic. It's hot muggy I don't agree with this at all
2182	Let them have the ability to take the mask off if needed without worry of punishment or peer shaming
2183	Don't require it or allow times for it to be removed as no one is used to wearing such an item all day.
2184	Lesson on proper face covering wearing the first day of school and follow up each week for the first month.
2185	I honestly dont know. My 7 year old hates to wear them I dont know how this is going to be possible
2186	The kids should learn from home
2187	Simple and straight forward instructions, expectations and boundaries released to students ASAP! They need practice and to know the plan and expectation.
2188	There shouldn't be an adjustment, people should be practicing these skills already.

2189	face shields are preferable as to not cover mouth so students have full access to communication
2190	I cannot ethically let my children attend a place that requires them to be uncomfortable via masks or distance. It's traumatizing and isolating for children who don't understand and need that physical connection to feel safe.
2191	There is no way students will adjust....I do not want my children wearing any cloth face coverings, I want face shields
2192	Not this is so stupid good luck
2193	possibly provide additional face coverings
2194	It is guidance from OSPI. I've sent numerous emails and all come back saying it is guidance not a policy, not am RCW. Cloth masks do nothing and will create a social distraction that teachers will have to manage. In addition, the masks will be traded, stepped on, get wet and nasty and create a bigger health issue than they supposedly deter.
2195	No mask!!!
2196	Face masks are not healthy they only stop 2% the CDC said only the 6 should wear them this is ridiculous we're gonna have kids with more long problems
2197	I can't imagine it being practical. If this is our situation, I will keep my kids at home.
2198	I will not have my student wear a mask at school. If this is for safety I will homeschool next year.
2199	I believe this will be the hardest guideline to follow for all students because they are uncomfortable for even adults. Especially during an ENTIRE school day. If I am being told that a way to keep my children safer at school if y wearing a face mask, then i should not be forced to send them to school. This guielines give me no confidence in my children's safety.
2200	I know that this was not a decision you guys made, but I honestly don't know how anyone can adjust to a face mask.
2201	There's no guarantee they will. That's why sending them back is crazy. Especially for the younger children.
2202	Maybe ways that they can take a few minutes in a safe area to take mask off periodically
2203	I have already purchased 5 masks per week for each of my children. You may want to have a fundraiser for lower income families or provide back up masks. Further recommend spraying bottoms of shoes and hand sanitizer on entering, exiting classrooms.
2204	Lots of clear expectations and practicing. Possibly provide a social story for younger and special needs students.
2205	At first I thought WOW I can make masks along with my women's service club. But thinking further I am concerned about who will wash/clean them. Who will be sure kids have them. Best answer is for the state to provide money for disposable ones so each student has a clean one every day at school.
2206	I would not want my child to attend classes in person if face coverings are required.
2207	Make the kids feel more comfortable with wearing mask
2208	Consider possible alternative options for kids with sensory issues

2209	Will all students have an adequate supply of face coverings?
2210	By not forcing that on families who do not support that. Unless it is ruled a law by the state then masks are not mandatory.
2211	I don't think they should have to wear face coverings.
2212	It is overkill, the flu kills more people and we never had to wear facemasks for that or any other virus/bacteria
2213	By not making them wear the masks in the first place.
2214	Having time and space where they can take off the masks and have a little break.
2215	I'm disappointed with so much research against mask wearing that OSPI/schools would still push this mandate. I will fight that. I think health screening, temperature checks and teaching proper hygiene is a far better option.
2216	I honestly don't see how this will work. But as a working parent that has to work to provide for my family I don't have an option but to send my child back to school in the fall.
2217	Offer safe places/opportunities to "take a breather" and let the mask off for a minute in the event the kids feel uncomfortable/hot/claustrophobic
2218	It should be mandatory. Families that do not have access to ppe should be provided some by the schools. Each school could provide one ppe With the school logo on it and then the option of purchasing more. Also the option to buy extra for families who can't afford them and dispense accordingly to families in need.
2219	Students should not have to wear masks and I hope you take this as a guidance and not make it mandatory. Many children have disorders or disabilities that either won't allow them to wear a mask (for various reasons) or simply won't be able to learn because of the distraction.
2220	Not a problem kids are relatively experienced with wearing masks when ill prior to the pandemic
2221	Maybe look into providing face shields so they are able to see faces.
2222	I will remove my child from public education if a mask/shield is required
2223	There isn't much that can be done.
2224	Explain the reason and importance behind a mask in a kid friendly way.
2225	Providing face masks for students that fail to bring one whether that be because they forget or because they cannot get one
2226	Make sure the classrooms don't get too hot. It will make it hard for the children to comply if they are sweaty.
2227	Providing masks for students that forget or lose them.
2228	Be consistent. If they are at school, they have to wear them! Special considerations- face shields maybe- for DLP students.
2229	Give students breaks maybe outside where they can take the mask off.
2230	Just enforce masks. It can be done.

2231	This is a true concern for me, I don't know how I feel about my five and seven-year-old wearing them for six hours. We wear them, and believe in them. And wouldn't want them to go into a school with everybody not wearing them. But for that long, It can't be good for their little lungs.
2232	Allow 'mask breaks' for young students (wearing a mask for prolonged periods is both uncomfortable and unhealthy). Provide masks to children who don't have their own.
2233	This is an unrealistic expectation
2234	Make it optional to students/parents. Not everyone believes in wearing them – my husband and I included, and our family hasn't other than going to the doctor/dentist/etc.
2235	Making sure the kids all have proper face mask
2236	Provide comfortable, well fitting masks to students who are unable to get their own
2237	Offer 2-ply masks for those that cannot obtain them.
2238	Allow outdoor periods for fresh air (mask removal) otherwise I don't have an issue sending my kids to school with masks.
2239	By not having them be there 5 days a week for all day. I could see 2 days in class and 3 days online that would limit exposure and the masks would be less of a thing for my 6 and 5 year old
2240	Allow intervals to take them off for X-amount of time while outside
2241	A covering that is clear so enunciation and phonics can be seen. Those are huge parts of learning.
2242	Good luck! I hope families realize it is for the best interest of everyone to wear a mask. I know that might be tough for some of the younger students. Maybe periodic breaks throughout the day to go outside and have a minute or so without a mask would be nice if that is possible.
2243	Start now by sending out info in regards to mask wearing. If kids start now it'll be something they're accustomed to.
2244	I'm more concerned about lack of oxygen flow to the brain while wearing these coverings, missing instruction because of lack of verbal cues for speech, and the psychological repercussions of feeling isolated and distanced from others.
2245	My child should not be required to wear a mask it gives her anxiety.
2246	Provide masks. It's going to be nearly impossible to make students keep them on all day.
2247	Wear them in group settings if needed. Otherwise just social distance.
2248	I think since everyone will be wearing them it will help them all adjust quickly
2249	Kindness and understanding while students adjust and also having time to remove the mask so they are not wearing it for 6 hours straight.
2250	Hold parents and students accountable for wearing then
2251	Allow children to go outside so they can remove their mask for a short period of time.
2252	Unfortunately I'm not sure?
2253	Will not send my children if they have to wear a mask at school.
2254	Offer face shields for those that have difficulty wearing a face mask
2255	They shouldn't have to wear face coverings. Students may not be able to handle it.

2256	My only concern is those who can not afford a mask or does not have one, how will they get masks?
2257	Will not send my two kids to school
2258	Kids shouldn't have to wear masks! Ridiculous
2259	I don't know how Kids can understand their teachers or vice versa.
2260	Get used to wear a face covering
2261	Provide at least 1 reusable face mask per student
2262	Provide masks that are easiest to breathe in
2263	I believe it to be both a hindrance and unhealthy for our students to be wearing masks in class all day. As far as helping, I would think disposable masks should be provided as I'm certain you'll find that many students will be unable to provide their own.
2264	Educate the children on use of the masks and possible importance of why they are wearing them.
2265	Face coverings have the possibility to create shame and kids being made fun of if it's based on what they can provide or bring to school. I think standardizing the masks and providing appropriate face coverings while kids are in the learning environment should be considered and understand that they will all be highly sensitive to the "look". Much care should be taken in navigating their insecurities a mask will/might bring.

2269	At an elementary level, I don't think this is very realistic. Especially the younger students. I know adults that have a hard time wearing one to work for hours. How can we expect that our kids will be able to?
2270	idk
2271	Allow the kids time to be outdoors with the ability to remove their masks.
2272	I do not agree with children wearing masks
2273	It is ridiculous. Kids under 1st grade are not going to keep them on all day. It also is hot and restricts their breathing if kept on all day. You are really irritating people with this.
2274	My son will not be able to wear one all day because he will have a panic attack. I feel like they should only be worn in large group settings and in the halls. They should not be worn in the classroom.
2275	I say face shields are a better idea for children
2276	I honestly don't know. It seems like such a large task. Most adults can't even wear one properly. How are children going to?
2277	Kids shouldn't have to wear them.
2278	My child knows and understands the reason for facial coverings.

2279	My kids understand the science behind why it is important and so although they need reminders to avoid touching their faces, they do not complain about the masks.
2280	Start having parents make their kids wear masks in public through out the summer to prepare. This is a parent's responsibility.
2281	We support this. I plan on donating 300 masks to Brownsville Elementary(my children's school) for students and teachers. I will continue to make masks for your charge for the school district. I would like to know if you will be giving students masks to wear and disinfecting them at school or is that the parents responsibility?
2282	Allow breaks w/o mask
2283	Make it fun. Design there own masks in school
2284	Help them not to lose the masks so parents aren't having to buy new ones constantly
2285	kids will not keep masks on all day, good luck trying!
2286	This is a tough question. My kids don't mind wearing it to the store, but I'm not certain they won't grow tired of it at school all day.
2287	If it's not a law, mine will not be wearing masks.
2288	I don't like the idea on kids wearing face coverings. Young children have the tendency to "share" items, whether its clothing, hats, etc. plus I feel were jeopardizing our immune systems by over sanitizing, etc.
2289	I'm not sure because u have a 5,7, and 10yr all going to woodlands and I know all 3 of them would not be able to sit still or be able to keep a mask on all day if thats what is required.
2290	It's a guidance not a requirement. Making all children wear face coverings is unrealistic and a distraction. My guess is those making this guideline has never spent a length of time with children.
2291	Not require them as they do not prevent illness and are actually causing more health issues.....
2292	Make sure there is available masks for students who forget theirs.
2293	Contact with families prior to school starting to ensure kids have access to masks and the ability to practice wearing them and that they understand the expectation that they will be worn.
2294	I don't know.
2295	Good question □
2296	Doesn't matter. It's safety, not comfort. Teacher oversight would be critical, which distracts them from doing their actual jobs.
2297	3 of my children put of 4 will not be able to wear one, nor will I attempt to force it.
2298	I don't know. I plan on having my kids wear them more and more as the school approaches so they aren't just thrown into it.
2299	I think the older kids will be able to adapt to it, but elementary students will have major issues. I have three boys and when we are out, I am constantly having to get on them to keep their masks on. Even my 13 year old complains when having to wear it for more than 30 minutes.
2300	As the nation as a whole increases mandatory mask use, it will become easier for the younger students to adapt to wearing it.

2301	Face coverings for students are not necessary regardless of what the OPSI says. Children have the lowest risk from Covid and the virus has a 99% recovery rate per CDC. You will be creating an unhealthy environment for children by forcing face coverings especially for the ones who already have breathing troubles. 2365	Allowing children breaks from masks. Understanding that some children cannot wear them do to developmental aspects.
2366	We're practicing all summer - my kids will be ready! :)
2367	All must wear them for my special needs child to participate. A face shield, rather than a mask restricting her ability to see and give nonverbal communication is HIGHLY hoped for, for all staff and students she interacts with.

2368	I completely disagree with requiring face masks for students. There are more and more instances of people wearing them too long and getting secondary illnesses like pleurisy due to breathing in your own breaths over and over in a mask. It is fine for temporary short periods of time. I'm not ok with them wearing the masks for longer than one hour at a time without breaks. It's just not healthy. 217	Yes, this last quarter was a difficult one. I don't feel they are up to par.
218	Yes but have been using apps and online worksheet and teacher recommended activities.

221	Being able to keep stamina to work hard all day
222	I feel they will be behind, we need more material and resource during the summer.
223	I'm always concerned with their academic growth regardless of current challenges. If online courses are what happens then make sure teachers are prepared to provide meaningful and common sense instruction.
224	How will students be able to check out of the libraries?
225	I am concerned about there being more expected academically speaking. I understand that we went into online learning very quickly last Spring but the COVID A for everyone was a bit too lenient for my taste. D students ended up with a 4.0
226	Yes, the school handled the changes extraordinarily poorly. There was essentially no teaching (online/Zoom), assignments were given with the expectation parents would be the teachers (and in some cases graders) or told to just go to Khan academy. There was no structure offered by the school or teachers. It was a hot mess. I'm afraid our students are behind grade level now due to a complete and utter lack of engagement from the district or teachers.
227	I worry that if our district chooses to go online the kids will not progress or grow academically if online schooling is anything like it was this spring.

238	Somewhat. Not that my kids won't excel but that the other kids having issues or not as caught up will make it difficult for the teacher to move at the expected pace.

239	Yes. My daughter struggled so much and it's become clear she may have some form of ADD. She went from being an A/B student to not being able to focus or complete work and got extremely Behind and depressed. I have since recognized her true struggle. She really does better in school va on line, but I am concerned because I am high-risk so I'm nervous about sending her back. It's a tough call.

241	The Spring semester was a complete mess. The Fall will be the same unless you plan for the probability that schools will be closed and/or a large percentage of students will stay home regardless.

245	Yes. I am unsure that I would be aware of opportunities available for student growth.
246	Yes, we have huge concerns. We are worried that having to wear face masks is a distraction and impedes teaching, learning and student interactions/communications with teachers and other students. Also, we are concerned that valuable instruction time will be lost due to time spent disinfecting, waiting to wash hands while social distancing.
247	Not at this time
248	Yes I have concerns about them not returning.
249	Yes. I realize the end of the last school year was hard all around, and it seemed to me like the learning stagnated. Depending on what all the school has to deal with in the fall (wearing masks and being at school, partial online learning, full online learning, etc.) I'm concerned with figuring out the best ways to help kids grow and learn again.
250	I feel growth would be hindered by online only. My kids don't exceed as well in that environment and I'm a full-time working single parent.
251	yes, concerned about being behind half a year because of the initial shutdown and not being able to catch up.

253	Yes, adjusting to changes.
254	My 2nd grader was in a reading group and I would like to see that he gets the extra help in reading as a 3rd grader in order to maintain success in all subjects.
255	With the online learning that occurred last semester I don't feel as prepared but not to a point where I will fail it might just take more work
256	I'm worried my child will fall behind
257	yes
258	Not as much because they where still had acadenic learning activities.
259	I feel as if the students don't go back to school in-person then they won't learn as much. Staying at home isn't an ideal learning space and grades will suffer if we don't go back to school.
260	No

261	My middle schooler did poorly with online learning- the format provided was confusing and not consistent for her and she felt overwhelmed. I realize it was the best that could be done under the circumstances of course. My kindergartener did better with online learning, but he needed tons of socializing. I'm concerned about the social emotional health of students and what resources will be provided for that!
262	I'm concerned about how the grading system will work as well as how engaged my student will be in classes. It can be hard to pay attention in these new circumstances.
263	Yes. Facemasks will become a huge hinderance to learning. Something to play with strapped to their face all day long. All kids will see all other kids with face masks of different colors and patterns. They will trade and noone will notice them strapped another person's germ infested masks straight to their face.

280	I'm not a teacher and feel that I would fail and cause my children to not learn effectively
281	Yes I think this covid thing is WAY OVERBLOWN!
282	No we in want our child to go back to school
283	Yes, this past year caught all of us off guard. I hope our educators listen to parents and are allowed to create some streamlined, realistic curriculum and educational plans for the upcoming year. You guys have a tough job too, I understand that.
284	As a student, I didn't feel like I learned the material nearly as well as I did in a traditional learning environment such as the classroom
285	Yes.
286	Online does not work for some students. Let us sign a health waiver and get back to life
287	Yes, due to the school ending so early from previous year from covid. Students will need a refresher.
288	Making sure that all parents, family and other visitors understand mask and distancing requirements.
289	No
290	Yes
291	Yes! I feel that lack of daily face to face instruction dramatically effected my children's education. Zoom should have been used as a virtual classroom for those who had the ability and have parent sign. Permission slip or wavier. Others who did not could be issued hot spots or the other educational instruction options. Now with class size limitations maybe the school should have the class on zoom with a mixture of kids in the class and others virtually to help with spacing.
292	No we're going to do just fine with homeschool
293	No I do have concerns about my child missing school. Since the closure I have received emailed contacts from three teachers, two calls from two of the same teachers and one teacher sends cards to my child. I have four kids attending three different schools and so we have been shocked and disappointed at the lack of contact and effort from teachers. My kids have completely lost interest in school due to no expectations. Home school has been a really bad experience.

296	If schooling from home I'm worried about academic growth.
297	No. Running Start.
298	No. With clear objectives and focused online communication this is not an issue unless people refuse to pivot.

300	My son is in the process of working through an ADHD diagnosis. We do not have his medication worked out and feel we will not be able to until he is in a steady routine in a classroom.

301	My kids struggled with online learning. The need in-class learning as soon as it is available.
302	With being out of school for so long it might be hard to get back into a routine
303	Yes, one of my children has an IEP for social needs, we did see some regression, which was expected.
304	Absolutely!

307	FOR MY CHILD NO, SHE IS YOUNG AND WE ARE VERY ACTIVE AT HOME ENRICHMENT
308	I am very concerned as my student could not, for some reason, engage himself with chromebook and has credits to make up. I am not blaming the teachers, they were very supportive and tried their best giving my student extra chances, he just could not get motivated. I offered to help and so did others. He needs to go to school.
309	My spouse and I are not trained as educators and both work full time as essential employees. I cannot spend 14+ hours a day either working or teaching an 8 year old with ADHD
310	Yes, I feel this interruption that occurred in the 2019-20 school year will greatly affect students going forward. My suggestion is to get them back to normal as soon as possible.
311	It's hard for us parents to teach our kids when they are so distracted with things around us. They NEED to have class interaction with learning not just interacting with their class once a week to have show and tell. This time has been very difficult with all families that we know dealing with the same issue. Colleges has classes everyday teachers use projection screens to write on and teach. They even did this when I was in high school 15+ years ago. Please help us really teach these kids this upcoming year they need to get back to normalcy and this would be the closest thing to it.
312	Possibly. The lack of parent notification for assignments with a confused child only led to missing work rather than an easy follow-up with the help of an adult to keep the child on track.
313	I do not believe what they did should continue them to the next grade. I work a full schedule and even though my children completed their work. It was jammed packed in an hour when I got off from work. Learning from a computer does not benefit children. They could not explain to me anything they did when I let them complete their work at daycare.
314	Consistency in availability and feedback from teachers on the elementary level was subpar.
315	My concern is that the bar will be set too low to accommodate the minority of students that may have limited technology access. There should be a high standard set and focus resources on finding solutions to assist those who have hardships.

317	I feel they cannot grow without in person education by a licensed teacher.
318	No
319	I am concerned my children will fall behind on core academic skills, but I hope the district will do everything possible to get them back up to their levels.cal

320	So long as education continues regardless of in person or online, no. If, however, online learning only is offered, it must be structured. It is unfair to students to just drop education expectations entirely with no measure of accomplishments.
321	Yes. My children thrive in the classroom environment. This fall I will have a 3rd grader and a 10th grader. My 10th grader is taking AP classes, and I don't see how she will succeed in difficult classes, where she has to learn from home. My soon to be 3rd grader is supposed to be in highly capable classes. He needs the challenge that he did not get these past three months distance learning.

323	Yes, concerned with so many restrictions that my 3 year old will not be able to learn how a typical 3 year old learns, simply by social skills improving by interactions with other peers, sharing and more. all skills we are trying to avoid solely because of limited contact and social distancing.
324	I worry about addiction to screens more than anything. That's been the worst part of all this for my child. I also hope there will be social opportunities. I hope whatever happens that my sons will be motivated and engaged. I think there is a danger of kids thinking that school isn't essential and doesn't matter. So I hope there is good follow up and accountability and measurement of kids skills.
325	Nope as I will most likely pull them out and homeschool. She can not wear a mask everyday.
326	Yes, I do.
327	My student is entering 5th grade and I want her to be well prepared for middle school transition and academics.
328	No concerns as long as it's in person classroom learning. My child does not have enough self discipline for online learning.
329	Some teachers were really supportive and answered questions right away. Others weren't helpful at all. Sentences to issues as it should work is not helpful nor engaging. Teachers perhaps need to be familiar with online format if they are instructed to teach it.
330	Yes, I feel the online learning was not great this Spring. If online learning is the answer the kids need to be on a google meet with their teacher doing in person instruction each day during their scheduled class time. It's not fair to give my child algebra to do and send them a link to a random YouTube video and expect them to learn that way. I feel the kids are already behind and being a military family, we will move next summer so my children will be behind at their next school as well. They need actual grades, not pass or incomplete, otherwise they don't have the drive to succeed and will do the minimum to get by.
331	Our children showed a big loss of momentum when it came to learning this spring. I'm concerned about how long it will take to make up that momentum and get them progressing again.

332	Yes. I have heard that classrooms reduced in size due to social distancing restrictions. That's great. But I've also heard that there will no sharing of other rooms such as music, PE, cafeteria, etc. This makes me sad that the students will miss out on these important aspects as they grow. 337	Yes, they were not challenged during the shutdown. I think CKSD did the best they could in very difficult circumstances, but I am concerned that my kids did not take instruction very seriously (especially the middle school kids) since grades were not on the table, despite endless nagging from their parents. 339	CKSD is doing an excellent job. Our son will learn at a rate that is feasible for him, as a special needs boy. 347	I'm concerned that with the lack of work given while distance learning, my kids are behind the curve. My high schooler continued working because the teachers gave assignments and held google classroom meetups but my middle schooler didn't. They a weekly meetup for one class and then one for advisory but the other classes, there were no meetings. The only classes that I received weekly followups were from the classes that were high school related (my high schooler and middle schooler's high school credit classes) so I had no idea what was going on in other classes. All I could do is have my middle schooler show me his google classroom to show me that he opened files and if work was required, it was attached. I had no idea of his progress. Also, with the assigning of work only once per week and due the following week, my middle schooler has everything done for the week in one day.

358	Yes, one of my children just started participating in the L.A.P program before school shut down. I'm concerned I don't have the expertise to help him succeed and require additional guidance through the school to address his specific needs.
359	Interaction with the school was minimal - very little feedback was given which was far to late
360	First time going to school
361	Yes definitely they did not get enough education this last spring
362	Yes. They won't be ready and teachers may move quicker than the student resulting in frustration
363	Missing half a school year in the classroom was rough and I plan to work with my kiddo to catch up some through summer, but I worry that she is behind.
364	No
365	Yes my student has not left the house for months now and going back is going to be challenging
366	No, but the social function is very important.
367	Not at all as long as teachers are comfortable. At the university and collegiate level we have been doing many courses online for years. So this is a new paradigm.
368	yes because online classes DID NOT work for my student
369	Yes

370	No-just safety concerns as there are three students in our household, two parents and a grandparent who is high risk. If my children are exposed to COVID-19 at school, it more than likely would have dire consequences for our household.
371	Yes, I feel there was lost time. Having a professional teach my child is best.
372	YES. CK Middle fielding of remote learning was too little, too late. Teachers did NOT teach classes at all! 374	Yes. I'm afraid she is behind in math.

376	Pro social behavior safely, as well as teacher support when a student is struggling.
377	At time it is lacking a normal structure, routine and teacher assistance.
378	My main concerns are: there were times my child found the school work too easy or not enough core work to help cement ideas. I had to look at other resources to help me teach her. Finding ways to break up harder concepts. I feel the lack assessment and set of skills that educators have to help my child grow will cause her to be Unexcited about school and growth.
379	Not really
380	It is unrealistic to think that these kids will be able to focus and learn when they have to maintain social distancing and masks...its hard to hear with them on and understand whats being said.
381	Absolutely. She is already behind and this is setting her back more.
382	I think our focus has not been on their academic progression and now we will have even more distractions so yes concerned

384	Yes, my student needs in person interaction with teachers

391	I feel like the lessons that were given had little guidance and therefore little impact on my boys.

393	Yes, I feel like they missed a loat last year and I am concerned for next year
394	I know for a fact, my son fell behind. I know this spring was just thrown at the teachers and administrators at the last minute, but I was disappointed that a schedule was never really established. Why weren't normal classes held at normal times they would have been taught utilizing zoom and or other group meeting functions. Course work was established, but I was not able to follow through ensuring all work was being completed. As a matter of fact, I am confident little to no work was accomplished the last 2 weeks of school. Having the teachers and classes actually meet as a class, probably could have helped keep him engaged. Especially if it were per the normal schedule.

397	very much because there was no support from the teacher what so ever. i had to email teachers and still some never answered me no my student, on line learning sucks big time for students which work better with one on one or in person learning
398	I'm concerned if kids do not return to school the kids behind with fall further behind
399	If they are not in school they will lose their social emotional growth, plus they will fall further behind thier peers
400	Yes, they need more small group or individual support for each of their IEPs
401	Yes. She was ahead for her age, and I don't want her to fall behind because she is relying on a non certified person teaching her.
402	yes! She struggles with learning
403	No, ck has done a good job educating both of my kids!
404	Not at this time
405	Yes we dont have internet or even the ability to get it installed too rural too many trees. Both parents work so I can't take my child to the school parking lot after work for her to do homework be9im exhausted and need to cook dinner
406	No.
407	A little bit, but they are both young and kids a resilient.

408	I am concerned with the quality of education with the online learning that occurred for the end of the 2019-2020 school year. That being said, given the amount of time the teachers had to put together an online education program, it was impressive what they came up with.
409	I would like it to be as "normal" as possible so they can learn to the fullest of their ability.
410	Yes particularly if the students have to continue full-time online learning. This did not work for my children. I will accept a hybrid version but only as long as it is temporary. Full time in-school learning should be the main goal, without all the restrictions put upon the schools by the government.
411	Yes, there was very little new teaching provided after school closed.
412	Yes - my student is considered "highly capable," is also an athlete and plays in the band. 448	Yes. My son was not interested at all with the online learning. He said more than once that he didn't like it.

450	If we do full time from home at the beginning of the year, I would be concerned that I would not be able to teach my daughter the lessons in a way that she would fully understand, or it may take her longer to understand something because of that
451	Yes
452	Of course, but will support the efforts of the school and district to make the best of it. I also hope this terrible situation will result in addressing some of the short falls of public education...I believe it needs to be modernized using recent science and examples of successful learning.
453	Not at this time. My child was provided some school learning material during online class.
454	I do In the sense that I hope my daughter is challenged enough. She has grown in a few areas academically.
455	Yes, distant learning impacts the quality of learning and education.
456	No my children like being in school over online since they were not as accountable in getting work done or setting a good schedule. When they are at school they feel like they have the help and support they need.
457	Yes, especially if there is no structure and engagement from teachers on a consistent basis. Email communication isn't enough to keep middle schoolers engaged and with full-time working caregivers we cannot provide level of needed supervision to have them focus on learning as they would receive within the school setting.

461	Not really, my child is mostly conscientious which I don't think is the norm.
462	I'm concerned they are not taking school seriously.

463	Both of Ariana's parents work full time even throughout the pandemic. We were not able to stay home and teach her. We did our very best and worked hard on the weekends but I don't think it is good enough for her.
464	No. We have been doing online learning still through the summer as well as hands on learning/projects and workbooks.
465	Interaction with peers and teachers is of high importance. Additional virtual (zoom meetings) would be beneficial. So, supplementing some in person with virtual would be great. Access to challenging curriculum with teacher guidance.
466	I have major concerns for my student. Specifically with staff not understanding the level of trauma everyone is experiencing and trying to maintain the status quo with grading and the like.
467	Teacher feedback and support
468	No
469	Please open up! My special needs son needs face to face interaction for his language learning
470	that my son did not pass most of his classes and now will have to make it up
471	Potentially, if the school is unable to provide instruction.
472	Yes if they are not able to attend. They need the in person instruction to thrive
473	Absolutely! My child is in the special needs program and needs a lot of attention to learn. He was making great strides and now I fear he will be left behind due to the lack of in person interaction learning. I work with him at home but he does things for teachers he will not do for me.
474	I do but I also understand every student is in the same position
475	Academic growth is vital in developing a child's future.. a bigger and brighter future.
476	Yes
477	My children are academically motivated and our Venture teachers were able to maintain some challenge for them in distance learning. They did miss more of the STEM/Project based learning models that can be employed in the classroom. I'm hoping that if we can't come in to the classroom we can figure out a way to do some experiential learning vs. only computer based model
478	Absolutely. My children shouldn't be held back academically if other families did not follow homeschool guidelines in March.
479	Yes. Online learning is not beneficial to them.
480	Yes. We worry too much time will be spent focusing on COVID and politics around it instead of actual school work.
481	I believe my students will struggle after the unexpected transition to the distant learning that was used at the end of this school year
482	Yes.
483	YES. Long term consequences of curbing curriculum down to allow for more absences, lost instruction time, etc. Healthy SOCIAL development is not being considered enough.

484	Preschool teachers at Silver Ridge were great at getting materials out to kids (OT, Speech, etc) and providing guided instructions (videos, etc) for kids and parents. Such great communication with parents through emails. apps, etc. No concerns about academic growth!
485	If CKSD is to switch to 100% online schooling, it is vital to have lesson modules developed specifically for online education. The current process for at-Home learning was not sufficient, and my student learned nothing. There has to be some level of accountability...as the student progresses through each lesson, there is a review and test at the end of each module, that the student must take and pass to at least ensure they read the material to pass the test, and did not glaze their eyes over the material. If CKSD develops proper web-based instruction, teachers would only need to be available via email or webchat to answer questions students may have over lesson material. I have seen that my students did not pay attention at all during the teacher web-based Google Class meetings. Lay out the learning material for the student to read, with examples provided for subjects such as Math, and have a review and pre-test after each chapter (multiple-choice will suffice). At the end of each lesson/book have a Final Test (multiple-choice). All tests for each Class Subject will be averaged at the end of each quarter for final grade. I suggest that CKSD look into developing their online school program following a format similar to the ACE PACE home-school Curriculum (without the religion, just the education material) and develop it into a fully web-based version.
486	I believe the district needs to have a plan in place for on-line learning (like zoom classrooms) so it is ready to go on day one. For kids with no internet access, the district should have a plan for them to come into the schools and social distant so they can get access too.

494	Students need teachers to guide them. Online school is ok, but there was not enough guidance or structure to keep kids focused or accountable. Google classroom was hard to learn and navigate at times. This should be made more streamline with specific instructions and guidance. More interactions with teachers is needed.
495	Yes my son is special needs and I feel during this time he has been neglected.
496	Yes lack of social interaction

497	If the students are not able to return to a full in-class schedule, I feel that my child will get more and more delayed
498	No.
499	Being around peers are just as important as what happens in the classroom. Being alone at home could drive students to hurting themselves.
500	Students have skill deficits.
501	No, my kids did well adjusting, but missed interacting with the teacher(s) and their friends.
502	Yes, our granddaughter's parents both have limited secondary education and struggle with on line coursework for our granddaughter
503	Yes-I know my daughter will be behind in math some. I could not give her the support she needed as I was working full time remotely and caring for my dad in in-home hospice. I worry that she will feel overwhelmed a the transition and trying to catch up.
504	Absolutely!
505	Yes.
506	I am a little concerned the new format will not be as effective as traditional methods but something is better than nothing
507	The remainder of this past school year was a struggle with the distance learning for my oldest. He has an IEP and it became very apparent that he really needs that direct in-person feedback and interaction from his teachers to succeed. As we move into his Senior year, I believe it will continue to be a critical component for his completion of the year. My other two children are flexible and would be able to complete next year in whatever method instruction is delivered. What they have missed the most are their athletics and activities. I am concerned teachers my not have the ability to motivate and accurately evaluate students; especially academically strong students. These students need good guidance, teaching, and good grades that they work so hard for to help them with their college applications etc.

529	Yes. I feel I can't teach them and give them the help they need. I don't know if they gained anything. My students were already behind and I feel like a failure because I feel they are more behind.

531	My main concerns are that they fill in the gaps missed by this last spring and are able to fully move forward without being too distracted by the masks and social distance, especially my kindergartener who will be starting school. I also am concerned about the lack of recess/pe as an outlet for excess energy and the behavior issues that confinement will create. Also, since we will have two in school now we'll need extra support to make sure they both get the full instruction they need to succeed.

It would be nice if there was a way for me to log in and access their information or see what they had completed without having to have them log in and take their word for it. The google meets were the best parts because my students could interact with others.

557	A little. My older kids are self motivated but my kindergartner struggled with the work. He was in a lap program and needs more help.
558	I'm afraid that my son going into 7th grade will not be prepared.
559	I hope she doesn't fall behind.
560	Even though my husband and I assist our children with their work, I don't believe that we are fully equip to assist our sons in their work.
561	Yes, there is no 1 on 1 assistance.
562	I am very concerned with the gaps in education right now. Working with learning institutions everyday, I realize that there really is not a great plan in place to replace the foundational in-school learning that we, in the public school system, is accustom to.
563	Unsure at the moment.
564	I am more concerned about the lack of socializing from being at home for so long.
565	My concern is that our children will not return do to state guidance, and/or a limited/hybrid schedule will not allow our children to gain the knowledge/training/teaching they need. I am more concerned with the restrictions/limitations than I am the virus.
566	Yes. My student does better learning in a classroom than online without feedback. There was a lot of struggle between teacher and students this spring as far as google meets and homework without instruction. The way math is done currently will not work without proper instruction as the school curriculum has changed making learning core subjects much more difficult
567	Yes, if it is not in person instruction we are concerned that academic growth will be small.
568	my student did very well learning from home. How might we continue this?
569	Yes, if online learning does not meet same level of education as in person learning.

689	Yes. It will be hard and extremely distracting to wear a mask while in school. I am concerned about sitting together at lunch when face covers are off. Students will have a hard time staying away from each other and abiding by the rules.
690	Yes I hope they are able to receive meaningful and helpful instruction.
691	No. I am concerned about the social growth of my child due to lack of interaction with other children.
692	yes. I feel like all this time out of school has been a great disservice to all of our kids academically.
693	Yup. I think with the added stress of mask wearing, social distancing, possible schedule changes and different ways that school may look next year, kids are going to have a hard time staying focused with so much change. In turn, I feel their academic growth may suffer because their will be other issues on their minds, especially in the lower grades.
694	My concern is we have created a fear and our children are confused. My childrens anxiety issues have skyrocketed and its due to the instant isolation to their entire life. If we dont allow fair social interaction with children we are failing them.
695	Yes!! My son really struggled with online learning. And with my husband and I working full time, I am afraid that he will not be as successful as if he was in class. Also, he is going from elementary school to middle school, which in its self is a big adjustment!

As covid-19 dominantly attacked the elderly. The younger generations especially the kids still in school don't fully understand the negative outcomes of this pandemic. Our thought process is that "it can't hurt us". Lots of us have had their entire social lives ripped away, The last thought in most kids minds is how good their grades are. And if we are wearing a facemask or not.
706	yes, we feel as though we have done the minimum needed due to lack of guidance for advancement.

710	Not being able to go to school and parents who work till 5. A kindergartener and a second grader getting left behind because parents work. I want the best for my boys and school is where they get that, we love our school and we love our teachers
711	My youngest is not motivated, so online learning will not be easy, but I am hoping that if that is the route, more tools are available to parents with unmotivated learners. My oldest struggled this year without the support from certain teachers. As a middle schooler, having access to her teachers, even just through email for support was super important and we didn't get enough from some of the teachers. I hope as the newer learning model progresses, at home instruction is met with more supportive instructors, and kids are maybe given an opportunity to sign up for one on one zoom meetings(or similar) to get help, at least once per week.

722	Yes, I am not equipped to educate my child as well as a teacher
723	Yes, I feel she really loss her math skills that she already struggles with IEP.
724	yes. Challenge to my middle schooler! Her not getting board.
725	Yes, I feel she will start off behind by nearly a half a year.
726	Yes. As the edicts of the Governor have dictated the the DOH response with skewed and fictitious results, kits are being punished. My kids want normality and it is not the schools place to override the parents . NO MASKS!

728	No
729	Yes, my kids need a more structured and easy to follow schedule for schooling than we had this spring. I'm concerned if they don't get that with any of the available options.
730	I am concerned for my little ones in elementary school. We need better structure for the younger ones who are still developing discipline.
731	I will be far ahead because my parents enrolled me in supplementary classes.
732	My son has speech delay and seeing the teacher's and other student's mouths while interacting is extremely important to his development.
733	If there is a hybrid form of school or if the schools shut down completely again I think math and science will need to be a daily video meet for students. I did not feel that my middle school child got a substantial math education since March and worry about her ability to move forward to 8th grade math. Getting assignments simply was not enough. I appreciate the effort teachers put into the online learning and understand that it was a learning curve for everyone, however going forward there will need to be more content delivered and not have everything as a review of what was learned from September to March. Teachers will need to be more accessible and if they choose not to do zoom/google meetings they need to respond to emails before the end of the day so students are. It falling behind the following day. I believe it will be difficult to follow social distance guidelines for all students as children are social beings and separating them, taking away recess, separating at lunch will all become tiresome to many children and they will simply not comply.
734	Yes. We are concerned that the added precautions will be distracting for both the students and teachers. The course material and engagement from Mrs. De La Cruz (Esquire Hills) was better than any of our daughter's teachers at Ridgetop.
735	Being a student, I've noticed I learn better in a classroom with a teacher. Online classes is a very independent type of learning and not every student can learn in that type of way.

736	Mostly when it comes to Math, as the content this spring seemed light, and now the gap of summer break.
737	I am most concerned about whether students will be able to participate in collaborative and hands-on learning. If not, students might as well be doing on-line homeschool. I am not concerned about the educational aspect as much as the social aspect which seems to be at risk with the new restrictions.
738	No. Because we were able to supplement, our children received a far better education. They are actually ahead now and will most likely be bored!
739	He needs to be back amongst others!!! Please open up!
740	Yes. Is the coursework going to be up to the same standards as it would be under "normal" circumstances? I want my child to receive the quality education she needs and deserves.
741	My student actually did better at home distance learning as I was teleworking and able to give him the little bit of one on one assistance he needed. Telework will linger be an option for me in the fall. My daughter is very school driven (going into kindergarten) and loves to learn. She will most likely succeed in any option unless she has to wear a mask all day at school.
742	Absolutely. We need in person instruction. Our children need to not fear their schools or teachers- making them cover their faces and act like the world will kill them is absolutely reckless.
743	Yes, he was in third grade and not up to 3rd grade math yet.
744	Yah teachers were web page designers, not teachers so I'm wondering where the teaching part of school will happen. Accountability.
745	My elementary students had minimal instruction at the end of the year. My high schooler's classes were hit-or-miss. It seemed that some of the teachers were checked out. This was particularly concerning for one of his AP classes. He and his friends ended up contacting the other teacher for the AP course to get instruction and coursework to help them study for the test.
746	I have concerns about one of my students reading level he is struggling and his deficits may be more than I know how to help him with.
747	Lack of challenge and expectations.
748	Yes
749	Not at all. The ONLY thing I'm worrying about is if they don't go back to in school learning. They NEED to be IN school.
750	Yes. My children are typically good students who driven and take advanced classes (my middle schooler is in Magnet and my high schooler is in AP classes). Even still, they struggled to get assignments turned in on time and to understand certain concepts, especially in math and science. I am afraid they will both feel behind as they start the new year.
751	No. I trust our Teachers. Either in person, or online, our Teachers will go above and beyond.
752	I think the school requirements and the homeschool curriculum are completely different and not as demanding as what the school requires.

761	Yes. During the shut down, my middle school student received minimal instruction from 2 teachers and absolutely none from a teacher who taught 2 subjects.

763	Yes, I don't feel they learned as much as they would of if they were at school the entire year. I will be holding my student back a year
764	Definitely! But I also hope that teachers understand that all kids will have difficulty adjusting and will meet kids where they are and move forward.

766	Yes. Concerned that one will not be ready for middle school in the fall, as she thrives on supper and in class help from her teachers.
767	**** your question about sending my child back to school— there needs to be an option that is other or says "until NO precautions are set in place****Absolutely- from all the studies shown and especially CK district always preaches the social and emotional learning aspect- it is not being met. There is NO data showing that Covid kills young people. Let us parents sign a waiver like we do for sports, teachers can do the same, or get a leave of absence if they feel unsafe. Students MUST have interaction and not the stress of all the precautions that the state is putting on the districts. It will be stressful, inconsistent and that is not a good learning environment
768	Yes. My student struggled with the online school work. She felt she had no support from the teachers. Her questions were no answered and she had anxiety about doing the work wrong. She was an A student the last two years. She needs the in the classroom instructions to be able to interact with the teacher.
769	Yes
770	Yes, both my husband and I were working full time from home during COVID while trying to support our daughter with her online education and class work. We were not able to provide the amount of support needed for her to feel successful and also fulfill the responsibilities of our jobs. It is not a sustainable model going forward.
771	I will if there is not in person instruction.

772	Yes, I believe my student is likely behind based on the time off and limited teaching provided during the back half of the year. My student has a 504 plan that will need to be modified should we use online learning. I think that realistic goals need to be set to catch students up. It will likely take more than a year.
773	My student will be a freshman. He is an excellent student on an accelerated math pathway. I am hopeful whatever model is proposed will support him (and all) students in a way that will prepare him for future, more challenging course work

776	I do because both my kids have IEP and one was in the life skills class
777	Yes as a student at Olympic high school I thought the online learning was disorganized some of my teachers responded to my emails and kept me informed but some of my other teachers did not reply to any of my emails and it was very hard to contact them. Also I take Ap and college in high school classes like pre calculus and it was really hard to stay motivated and engaged when you are not around people. 783	Absolutely!! They are NOT getting what they need with online learning. They need the social interaction that is offered by in person learning. It develops better discipline and learning.
784	Some. During this time teachers were not very reliable in helping my child. Very hard to get ahead of
785	Yes, my 3rd grader who was already struggling. I am afraid he is going to be behind in 4th grade despite our efforts to keep him caught up.
786	No
787	Yes. My daughter who was in 7th grade really struggled through math prior to the closure and did not have an easy time doing the homework assigned during the closure. She typically is in math lab/math focus class and may not be ready to move forward.
788	Distancing will be very hard on kindergartens. I don't think academic growth from the past year is worth discussing. Most kids will have lost progress. It will just be harder to get going this year.

790	Yes
791	I would like more parent instruction sent home on the best way to try and teach the material. Just a brief outline would be helpful for the middle and high school subjects.
792	The online learning was a joke. So, I believe my daughter is a bit behind. Teachers were not good with staying in touch, replying to emails or giving the students instruction.
793	Yes. A few weeks at home may not have a lasting effect, but I do not believe my children received the level of education I would expect. Teachers were not prepared for an online delivery. It's understandable, but there is time to correct for next year. Private schools moved to structured online school, with Zoommeetings, etc.

797	Yes. My son has autism and ADHD and the special ed services were critical. Its hard to manage his school work 100% of the time, work, go to school my self, and help my other child who's in school

802	My concerns are for my CKHS student who didn't receive any instruction via Google meets. He learns best via Instruction, not read this do that.

804	As long as its in person not online. Especially for math and science. And teachers actually teach
805	Yes
806	Yes spring quarantine he did not learn much
807	I'm concerned that at home learning was not adaqute. I don want to see see my daughter and others fall behind because of this.
808	Yes- I'm really worried that my 1st grader (will be returning as a 2nd grader) didn't obtain the instruction needed. My hubby and I work full time and as most of the learning was self paced, my 6 year old Struggled. She was still learning reading and sight words which is tough to do on your own. We helped when we could, but it was less than ideal.
809	I am concerned that kids will fall through the cracks. I focused on my child's schooling this spring, but will have 2 in school and want to ensure they both are continually challenged and working towards the educational milestones. Also, school provides the social interaction that is so important to their development. I am also concerned that too much reliance on technology will hinder handwriting growth. I requested the packets every two weeks so my child would have materials to work on while not using technology. I think packets should be mailed to every student (not an opt in) so each child has access to printed materials.

838	Yes
839	A little, but it's worth it. When it's time for college she will be in the same boat as others.
840	Yes.
841	Yes, especially if students don't get the interaction between the teachers as needed. I don't know these stupid common core methods and don't feel I should have to learn them either. It's more like common confusion to all.
842	This past spring was very challenging for my student. As a 9th grader she was receiving so much homework that it took her more time than the State mandated for her age. She had a few teachers that exceeded their allowed lecture minutes. She received vague due dates for homework/projects but would receive messages from her teachers as to why she hadn't turned them in? Some teachers were terrible online teachers especially her math teacher. My daughter would ask the math teacher to explain a math problem and the teacher would message her back these responses, "I don't understand why you aren't getting this?", "you need to redo the worksheet because I didn't teach you this formula.". My daughter had to rely on online math sources to help her learn Algebra 2 as her teacher did a terrible job and then seem to penalize the student. I do not want to have this happen again this Fall for my daughter for 10th grade. Some classes require the teacher to visibly show the student how to do things.
843	YES
844	Yes. Our concerns academically are related to online learning structure. In Spring, our child had one teacher that nailed the online learning, was consistent, and engaging, and we really felt like she was continuing to be challenged and had the support of her teacher. Another teacher, although there was communication as needed and support on some level, they did not have the technical experience to provide consistent, engaging, instruction. Her science instruction was nearly non existent once we transitioned to at home learning. So our concern and hope is that if we need to integrate an online instruction portion to school, that the standards of education, growth, and needs of my student will be met.
845	Yes. I feel like I got no updates on how my child was doing in school the last quarter. No report card. Nothing. I don't even know if she passed.
846	Very much so. Distance learning made it more difficult for my children to learn. The workload seemed heavier and my kids couldn't keep up with it. 852	I have concerns about her ability to have an opportunity to learn outside of a classroom setting.
853	Yes..we moved back to the district in January...my child was only in school here a month and a half and the school didnt know where to place him and didnt have enough information to help support his IEP

855	Yes. They won't learn as much because I person school is better .
856	Absolutely! Even though the school and teachers did the best they could with the time and resources given, I know it wasn't enough.
857	Yes. It need to be in person somewhat bc they did better in school.
858	Yes
859	Yes, I do, if they are not in school, and if sports do not run as scheduled it will be detrimental to all.
860	Yes because they have all been figuring school out online instead of in the classroom with actual teachers.
861	Absolutely. My daughter was struggling in math, and I know that 4th grade is where math gets a lot tougher. We are continuing to work with her over the summer.
862	Yes. I'm concerned mostly for my elementary student. We learned that he's not an online learner. But I think if it was a hybrid situation he might be ok. Teacher interaction is very important to him. I will say that the elementary kids had WAAY more homework than my middle schooler. My middle schooler appeared to be ok but is slightly concerned when/if new material is given. I wish there was more teacher interaction for middle schoolers too. I saw some districts/states have a full online learning class. That would be amazing. Perhaps some type of streaming ability that gives everyone the chance to have live discussions with the teachers. On one hand he was able to see what he needed to do for the day - do it and then be done with his work. I need a consistent schedule to know what is due and when. And if we could narrow down the number of websites and apps to use that would be amazing as well.

864	Lots of time spent on review will no doubt frustrate your teachers and the new guidelines will only add to the frustration. Sex Ed is a program to groom kids for future exploitation. You're making it easier for pedophiles to trap them.

865	We felt that both of our sons, particularly our 6th grader, received pretty much zero guidance nor instruction these past 4 months (and therefore NO academic growth). My concern is that this will continue in the Fall. I have friends in other regions of the country that, within a few weeks, all the teachers were brought up to speed on distance learning, and the teachers and students followed a consistent school schedule, with clear goals set forth. That has not been the case here at all.
866	Posted milestones of what children need to know to move on to the next grade would be helpful.
867	Being realistic and fair about what grades mean (not like the A or incomplete for this year). An actual plan/curriculum for the courses. A way to ensure engagement with/from the teacher.
868	Yes! Last several months were stressful and NON productive. If anything my child went from a happy straight A student to a sad, stressed, anxious, frustrated student that does not want to return if these conditions are not improved. Such a negative impact it had and NO learning as the work assigned was too much and our child had a hard time keeping up with limited to no support.
869	Yes. Being a working full time single parent with no family in this state made Spring learning extremely difficult. The child care center my son attended did no course work so this only left 4 hours in the evenings to complete the work before bed time. He is also a special education student and is beginning to regress in his social/behavioral skills without the peer-to-peer interaction in the special education setting.
870	Maybe behind in math
871	Expectations need to be recalibrated with the potential compounded effects of at home learning and the summer brain drain. I expect learning and growth from the start of the year not achievement if some nebulous benchmark
872	Teaching students in elementary school worth online classes is completely unacceptable. I don't know how long it's going to take my three children to recover from this
873	YES! There was a definite stagnation or loss of skill over the last 3 months. I know we can do better as a district, but it will take planning and support for all teachers to excel in providing quality online instruction. I feel lucky that my elementary student's TEAM teachers were more prepared and clearly put in many extra hours to try to reach all students. If you have questions about one technique that I feel worked well, ask Kristi Denton.

880	Yes, my students were already behind in their learning and with the distant learning, we did our best, but our main focus was on surviving.
881	Wondering if they have fallen behind where they need to be for the upcoming year. I
882	I'm more concerned about their mental health. Academics can be adjusted.
883	Yes
884	Yes, I feel my child is going to be behind due to not being in the classroom.
885	No. My middle schooler thrived. My soon to be Kindergartener did well because he has a received 1:1 attention unlike at his preschool where he doesn't receive instruction the same.
886	Slightly. But I believe with enough time and effort from family support and teacher it should be fine. Take it slow in the beginning to make sure everyone is on the same page. Which to me this was not an issue for my kids. First two weeks of last Year, in Some classes the teachers were making sure this was the case.
887	Yes. I think kids need the option to be in school. If they don't have this, my kids will be in daycare which is likely worse than classroom.
888	I want to make sure that my child is "tested" for placement in reading and math at the beginning of the school year, as I was able to really give my son lots of one-on-one instruction, and worked on learning most of the day. I know not all parents were able to do the same, and I can only imagine the gaps between students. I just want to make sure my child is challenged and not bored.
889	Yes; He was not interested in the online learning. I fear that he fell behind in his knowledge.
890	Absolutely. I'm not a teacher and I have a toddler as well as a future fifth grader so I can't keep up with trying to keep focus on the older one's schoolwork so I would like consistent feedback from the teacher if there will be a lot of online work.
891	I am concerned as we struggled all year. I'm worried my student will be further set back this fall.
892	They need structure and routine
893	Having enough access to the instructor for help is my primary concern
894	Absolutely. As a full time employee (spouse is as well) and not in the education field, we are concerned that we are not doing enough to teach our children in a way they will succeed.
895	Yes, this is my student's first year in high school and I have concerns she is not going to be prepared,
896	I do not have any concerns I believe we did a good job filling the teaching role and whatever was missed will be easy to catch on to.
897	Yes!!! I'm concerned with the core subjects of math, science and English.

898	I think distance learning is a mistake, and children need to be in school full time next school year.
899	I will have a concern if they do not get to return to school.
900	Yes, the end of this year was incredibly difficult for everyone. My student struggled with understanding the work, getting the work, doing it, getting help, and mental health. With an IEP for many areas that gives extra support in learning the material with one on one instruction and for a check in to be sure is being turned in this was really hard. Extra help was in the form of more work not actual teaching. Teachers didnt ask if everything was ok. The student had to go to them for help. My student has major teacher anxiety which is why we arranged the IEP for the teacher to check in with the student. It was just a mess. You guys couldn't help much of it but we cant do that again.

903	YES! My daughter is starting Kindergarten. I am a single mom who works full time and cannot home school. I am so sad to think my 5 year old is going to sit in front of a screen all day. Kids are still learning motor skills and use hands on activities for learning. Not to mention their energy levels and attention span. Though I care very much about everyone's safety, I do not think distance learning or e-learning is a sustainable method of school for kids this young. I am worried about this generations education and how that may affect their futures.
904	Yes. Our children did not do well with online classes and I feel they are behind.
905	I'm worried that my son will struggle with long-term learning due to missing or getting behind on major fundamentals. He was a kindergartner for the 19-20 school year and missed so much. The next day, the students would switch from online to in-school learning. All the students need the time with their teacher when the parents do not understand a learning concept. My concern is for those students that can meet minimum standards, yet are below their personal potential. If an over abundance of resources are used to support those that might need help reaching minimum standards. Some support needs to be available for those students that are not struggling.
1156	Yes. It was difficult for my daughters this spring with various expectations and constantly changing instructions, and honestly was confusing to us all. It would be beneficial to have a set path/schedule for class meeting times, expectations for homework, quizzes, and tests, and grading.
1157	Yes, my son missed everything in fifth grade that he should have had, now he has to go to a middle school which has not had any of the normal transition tools. I'm also concerned that he will struggle because so much was lost with the current school year being cancelled. I think the district is barely equipped to offer any tailored instruction in normal circumstances and that what they have delivered by diving into what I consider a failure of distance learning is not the quality of results I want to see. In most cases, traditional homeschool children fall behind a little socially but get ahead academically. This year, our public school children fell behind in both. We only participate in public schools for the social growth opportunities that you cannot get anywhere else. I KNOW that I can deliver a better education with another program, and fully intend to if CK is not returning to some semblance of normalcy, why would I?

1160	My student is entering 1st grade. She already is so behind on learning the core material of kindergarten that I'm concerned that she isn't going to have a good education if schools go remote again. She will not work with me, she shuts down.
1161	Yes. CKHS - I am concerned that the model for online instruction & learning was not just "copied" from programs like K12 or Barker Creek. The one day dump of assignments + self teaching did not work for us. RMS - Special Needs Department does not function in a manner to support individual student goals in a manner to progress sufficiently. So much so that I am concerned that if we have to do online learning again, I will be looking for a national homeschool program that can support special needs progression towards typical graduation.

1163	My son will be starting 6th grade in the fall. So with missing some of his 5th grade school year, I am concerned that he's missing fundamentals.

1165	My son is quite bright but he nearly failed geometry because he didn't turn in enough assignments. I know the teacher's are busy but an email heads up that your A student is about to fail would have been nice before the "all homework I am accepting this year is in already" email.
1166	Yes. The transition to the next phase of a course will be extremely compromised. The schools need to not only teach them what they would normally teach but they the burden of catching them up from what they lost during the shutdown.

1168	Yes, my children thrive when they have in person encouragement and help at school. Not as likely to ask for help when virtual learning from home.

1174	My concerns are, if my child does NOT go back to school in person her academic career will suffer. She is not one that learns well with online classes. It was a struggle this spring and very depressing for her. She did NOT complete all her classes which she strives to receive all A's. She learns best in a classroom environment. My child needs the that structure.
1175	Yes. Both my students struggle one has an IEP. They need help IN CLASS. The teachers cannot properly teacher over the Internet.

1177	Absolutely. We had very little contact with our teacher last year. A dojo message in the morning with a math assignment and answer key. That was it. I feel he's not ready to move up but expect he's not alone.
1178	Yes, while I realize this spring was more crisis learning than distance learning, my concern is about rigor and accountability.

1180	I absolutely do, no matter what the new year learning format looks like.

1184	Yes, last semester many teachers did not provide much education or instructions. My middle schools student only had about 30 minutes of work a day and some days had none. my high school student had teachers that provided no instruction on new material and did not help when we asked for support. I am very concerned about what material they missed even though they all passed their classes.

I also have a child with an IEP and online learning was a bust. If we had a stay at home parent we could keep the kids on track but many families aren't afforded that luxury.
1403	Yes. The online model used this year did not provide enough challenge, structure, or support.
1404	I am mostly concerned about my special needs kids who received a lot of one-on-one instruction from teachers and para educators. because I have six children who will be in elementary school this fall I am not able myself to school all of them at home. I am curious to know what the school district will be able to provide in terms of support for special needs, specifically children with IEP's. Our son has regressed so much this spring he is taking his homework in weekly to his occupational therapist to receive help.
1405	Please do not do online learning- it is terrible. The programs used were terrible and trying to keep up with what was expected was terrible.
1406	No
1407	No
1408	Yes. Both of my sons are performing academically above their grade levels and by removing them from school they lost the ability to have guided, challenging curriculum. I took this in myself and it worked out but it is very alarming to imagine another year or more of this.
1409	My concerns are that students can easily fall behind without the structure of a classroom setting.
1410	Yes, I worry my child will not be challenged enough with distant learning, or his academic level will go unnoticed without interaction with teachers.
1411	Yes. The last three months of the 2019-2020 school year were of no benefit to my students. My family supplemented the education that the school district did not provide with our own educational life experiences. My primary concern is that my students will not receive a proper education next year due to the need for teachers to repeat material that was not adequately mastered by students during this incomplete school year. I am concerned that the academic standards in our state and, specifically in our school district, will continue to be lowered beyond reasonable expectations and we will not challenge our students to excel. If the school district continues to fail to meet the needs of my students, I will be given no other choice than to find an alternative means of providing this basic education.
1412	Yes. I feel like the vast majority is going to be behind where they should be. I feel like the last three months of "online schooling" was a waste of time and a major cause of stress within families.
1413	No
1414	Yes.
1415	Catching up!!!!
1416	I guess I'm just unsure about the whole situation. My grandson missed half the normal school year. Being in a classroom and around peers and learning from a teacher at his age is critical I feel. I guess we'll see.

1417	I do not. We have had a good routine but need school to be up and running M-F with before and after school care.
1418	Yes. Especially with online schooling. I do not see my child being challenged with his schoolwork online and I can see how the lack of direction and effort the teachers put into the minimum 90 minute class time affects the students.
1419	Yes, I feel there was less instruction than what was happening in the classroom during the last three months.
1420	Yes I'm worried my son will need to be held back
1421	Consistent learning with all teachers engaging with google meets. This did not happen as often as I would have expected for my kids with year.
1422	I am concerned that classes and expectations could be less rigorous, thus not preparing students adequately for college and the workforce. I am also concerned that students are losing opportunities to compete, collaborate, and inspire one another.
1423	Just concerned with my daughter who started kindergarten this last school year. Distance learning was very difficult for her.
1424	Yes. I feel she wasn't engaged with the online learning especially since there was no schedule so it will take awhile to get caught back up if ever
1425	Yes, lack of 3 months of school that will leave most students unprepared to go forward in the fall.
1426	I worry they will be behind
1427	Yes
1428	Absolutely.
1429	We worked on all expected standards during the school closure. We continue to read throughout summer. We are confident in his ability to catch up on anything that wasn't covered, and in the teacher's ability to meet his needs.
1430	Yes because I feel like he received no services via his iep teachers were to focused on the covid A or literal took pass or fair to if you dont get a 100% you fail...this needs to be figured out.
1431	Absolutely. I feel my child wasted their time this spring and did not have access to the resources needed to be successful.
1432	No
1433	Not really. Cottonwood is pretty special.
1434	Lack of actual interaction with teachers is a set back for kids with learning disability
1435	Yes
1436	not at this time
1437	Online course were difficult for my child. My child had difficulty focusing and I work fulltime and was unable to help keep the focus while I was gone for 8+ hours a day.
1438	Yes
1439	The ground they lost during quarantine. The loss of interest as they did not have consistent interactions with their teachers.

1440	No. I will not make my children wear face masks.
1441	Instructions, expectations and teacher help and support need to be clear and easily accessible.
1442	Yes.
1443	The setback from this pandemic is going to be substantial. Our children need to be in school 100% of the time and educated by teaching professionals, not parents juggling work schedules.
1444	The online platform for grade school was horrible. It was very hard to locate assignments and some assignments were not accessible due to having a Mac book pro.
1445	Yes, I am worried that it will not be of the same quality as before.
1446	Yes. My son did not adjust well. I hope it will be better with planning ahead of time.
1447	I'm concerned that my kids won't have a close interaction with their teachers to be able to grasp what's being taught. I don't want the kids to be separated so far apart that they can't go to their friends and each other for guidance and help with what's being taught.
1448	I'm concerned about a lack of feedback. I'm more concerned about lack of social interaction.
1449	In school face-to-face is the way my children learn the best. Online school is not great for them, but if I have to I will switch to an actual online homeschool. Those teachers are used to teaching that way and there won't be a "growing/learning" period on how to make that work, that already know how to teach that way. It will be an easier transition for my kids, than "everyone" learning to transition.
1450	Yes, I do not feel like much learning was done online.
1451	Yes. I will be getting my son a tutor for algebra since he didn't really understand the math trying to teach himself from The book. He got caught up in the multiple steps required to turn in assignments, correct work, and request quizzes. He fell behind and never quite could catch up.
1452	Yes they missed quite a bit of learning this year so im know sure if he is fully prepared for upcoming curriculum.
1453	Not at this time
1454	Yes - he was about ready to enter small group classes for math when the pandemic hit. I fear that he is falling way behind in math. I am doing my best to keep him studying throughout the summer.
1455	I am not concerned about loss of learning from this past Spring, but since my student is already delayed, the thought of ongoing limited instruction is scary. I have been thinking he might need to stay in school well past the age of 18. He is only going to be a 4th grader so I guess really only time will tell what he will need as he eventually transitions to MS and HS
1456	No
1457	Yes I think online learning is not good enough for them to learn all they need to without there teacher to teach them
1458	Absolutely! Some students will have had NO instruction and some had parental support to an over-the-top degree.
1459	Yes, they need the social interaction

1460	I have two of my four that struggled online. I would prefer in person school. They need the support of being in school. I work also, I cannot support mine if I'm at work.
1461	Yes
1462	Yes, I am afraid that she won't get the extra help and support she may need due to restrictions in schedules and health rules.
1463	Yes in math
1464	No
1465	Yes I am nervous that she will not get as much out of less schooling through her teachers.
1466	Not returning.
1467	No I dont.
1468	Yes
1469	Just that the actual program will be followed and not to give the kids the notion that things are not graded accordingly so they have an option to do their work or not.
1470	Yes
1471	Yes! I'm afraid they are falling behind since I am not a natural teacher and we were simply surviving because we have other things to do besides school!!!
1472	Yes, I'm worried they will not be able to meet the requirements for the grades they are entering.
1473	Yes, if is done online.
1474	I'm worried they will be behind. I'm not a very good homeschool teacher.
1475	Yes
1476	YES!!! They are drastically behind!!!
1477	Always
1478	I hope that I will be able to get the most out of my junior year and be able to learn as much content as I can. I also hope to be able to participate in clubs and sports this year.
1479	Yes, math concerns me.
1480	My kids are set academically but social growth is a concern.
1481	Yes they just got pushed through an entire semester of material and now are advancing to higher levels without a proper base to build on
1482	no i do just fine in school
1483	I believe many students did minimal learning this spring and teachers will spend lots of time getting them caught up. Meanwhile, those that did all the work with parental guidance and support will not advance their learning.
1484	No, there are many online assessments to test growth.
1485	For younger children the standards that are being put in place are impossible and unacceptable. Five year olds should not be forced to wear a mask, stay six feet apart and wash their hands 50 times a day. I do not see how they will be able to effectively learn when there is panic about maintaining these standards.
1486	Yes so worried about them falling behind
1487	No

1488	Yes they need to be consistently challenged.
1489	No
1490	Yes. We cannot sustain this type of instruction. Both parents work and our child goes to daycare, not a home school teacher.
1491	Online learning does not give enough explanation.
1492	I do. If our students have to homeschool again, I fear that my children will fall behind.
1493	No.
1494	Yes
1495	This whole thing has been overblown
1496	Yes. Staying engaged as a youth will certainly impact learning.
1497	I do. Our student is motivated by results. There really was no motivation this past spring because the results were pass/fail
1498	Yes, online learning is not a great fit for my daughter, she had trouble staying engaged and voiced that she felt like she wasn't learning much.
1499	Yes - I am stressed that she did not have enough interaction with teacher and other students
1500	Yes- I worry all students will struggle to learn all that is expected from them- both to make up for the end of this past school year and to keep on pace with where they should be this year
1501	I don't have concerns about academic growth but I do have concerns with our freedoms being taken away for pLandemic.
1502	I feel the school work should be material They would be learning in the classroom and not just School Programs they are suppose to be on for 20 minutes a day.
1503	YES!!!!!!!!!! Most teachers DIDN'T teach, they just posted assignments that gave us no new learning opportunities WHAT SO EVER. There was only one exception, where one of my teachers posted videos with explanations, examples, and assignments, plus she checked to make sure everyone understood. I think that should be mandatory. I only learned a little bit.
1504	Adjusting back to some sort of normal. Feel that they will be behind and not truest ready for the next scale of classes
1505	Yes. They need that in person attention from the teacher
1506	Yes, my son has trouble focusing when in a home setting. He wants to do anything but schoolwork. Additionally, being a dual income household, there is no one home to assist with homeschooling. It would be a financial hardship to take time off to ensure efficient time dedicated to learning.
1507	I'm concerned about fake grades earned this last year and how that will affect my son's future academic career.
1508	I am concerned with having children who did not do well with online learning. We did very limited "school assignments." If we begin next year without in person I am worried my children will fall even more behind especially being a parent who works.
1509	Just to make sure that the resources needed are available.
1510	Yes! With some parents still working, is hard to also tackle online learning and make sure the students keep up.

1511	I prefer full time school for my children because they learn best face to face being able to ask questions to fully understand what they need to do.
1512	Yes, mask wearing and social distancing is traumatizing and extremely harmful to children.
1513	He has had to adjust to my teaching and it may be hard to get him back into another style of teaching with timelines and such.
1514	No
1515	The ability to participate in clubs and athletics.
1516	Online is not as effective unless it's going to be with actual teaching. I don't know if that's a recorded lesson the kids can watch or an interactive google meet, but self taught, which it would basically be for kids with working parents, isn't going to get kids to standards or be conducive to actual learning.
1517	Yes but we can all only do what we can do.
1518	Yes. My concern is that the focus will be on enforcing the numerous guidelines and not academics.
1519	Yes my child test advance of the class she will be in so why not advance her to the grade she test for
1520	No. I believe my kids actually did fine with online and home instruction. However, they missed the social interaction.
1521	YES!!!! I don't feel like my son achieved everything he was supposed to. He used online apps but I have no feedback indicating whether he's on track or not. How do I know where to adjust if B I don't know where he's at? This should be easy with b online apps yet I hasn't seen anything to help assess his work
1522	Yes masks will be a distraction
1523	I am concerned that several math units were skimmed over and my student does not have the prerequisite skills to be ready for the next grade level of math.
1524	Yes, between the school and doctors offices being closed I'm concerned my child may not be able to get the IEP I think she will need to succeed and feel confident.
1525	Yes. I feel that the closure of schools during the second half of the 2019-2020 school year has had a negative impact on my child's academic development.
1526	Yes, but more concern with social-emotional issues. Especially anxiety and depression that many students are facing.
1527	no
1528	I'm concerned how this years interruption will impact my kids in the next grade. Although we tried to keep up I'm concerned they are behind and going to struggle next year.

1529	Yes. Learning was OPTIONAL this spring (a direct quote from an email my child received from their teacher at the end of this academic year, although the emphasis is mine). I expect the district to spend the summer formulating a plan that allows for actual instruction and learning in some format, whether a hybrid of in person and online or all in person, plus an online backup plan in the event that the state mandates a shutdown in the fall or winter. Other children in other districts had online classes with a firm schedule. They learned this spring. I do not want our district's children to fall behind.
1530	YES! The spring teaching model was not sufficient. Some teachers put the very minimum into teaching. I feel the kids did not learn anything new as there was no teaching, just assigning tasks that didn't give the kids new learning opportunities. There was only one exception where a teacher made videos explaining, giving examples, tasks, and checking in to make sure her students understood.
1531	No
1532	I have bigger concerns if they do not return to school. The teachers are doing the best they can, but online learning is not engaging.
1533	Yes, I'm afraid that he will fall behind.
1534	At the end of the school year the students are expected to have cover X amount of information. When the classroom instruction ceased and the online instruction started that the students will not have reached the X. I fear that the new year review of the prior years material may not be adequate to cover what was missed.
1535	I just want him to succeed and have more and better access to teachers to make learning easier instead of having him struggle with learning new skills.
1536	Students need in person teaching instruction to help them learn and advance!
1537	yes I am concerned how masks and social distancing will affect quality of learning and instruction
1538	Believe that on-line learning has been a poor substitute for traditional in-person / in-class learning environment.
1539	My youngest is going into 5th grade, and already struggles with grade level reading and math. My concern is the work load and academic requirements that students will be held accountable for at grade level, as any other school year prior to COVID.
1540	My son only learns at school with his speech services. If I can't safely send him back to school he won't get much needed services
1541	Yes
1542	Yes, as well as for growth that may have been cut short at the end of this school year, especially for my elementary student.
1543	Quality of learning online is not the same as in person learning. It would be helpful for the kids to have a live chat for tutoring or a tutor able to take over students computer remotely to help students with any issues.
1544	Some classes seemed to be a waste of time only videos to watch ?? No teacher interaction etc...

1545	I fear that there wont be enough review to see where they are academically.
1546	Absolutely
1547	Yes! I would like more communication with all teachers (regardless of what grade they are in). I'm lost without communication I don't know how to support my kid without communication. And no I don't want to look on their google classroom for their assignments. That's their responsibility. I would like to encourage and keep track with a weekly email about what was missed for the week and what is due for the following week. With this being done, I can see my worries being less.
1548	If the school tells us what to do then I have no concerns. Without direction I will run around in circles not knowing what to do.
1549	Yes
1550	No. They are fine.
1551	Yes, math and band
1552	Yes, significant.
1553	I will if we continue online. I feel like they need at least a little interaction with a teacher in person
1554	Yes! My kindergarten missed the last 3.5 months of school. I fear it will stunt her education.
1555	I have two kids who have done great at online and are fantastic at self starting. Staying home has caused one of my kids to become very depressed, he dosnt understand what is going on and why he can't just go to school. he refuses to do the online courses. Another keeps locking himself out of his accounts and basically did anything possible to avoid school work. It was very frustrating. If we did online again, I would prefer a k-12 online set up which is more parent friendly. I personally needed daily tasks outlined and organized. I need to see in the future and be very organized as I have so much going on in my house.
1556	Yes and no
1557	No
1558	Distance learning did not go well. With preparation I am sure it will better. Some of my daughters teachers were not engaged.
1559	No. My children worked very hard and stayed up with their studies. Their teachers were exceptional. They were there for my kids when they needed them. They provided as meaningful work as they could due to the circumstances.
1560	Yes
1561	Yes. I am concerned that students will not have their educational needs met due to extensive time spent reinforcing PPE in the classroom. I understand the necessity for it, I just don't feel it is a realistic expectation to have for such small children.
1562	I'm starting to suspect it would be better if I took a bigger leadership role in educating my children or finding out who can educate them.
1563	No
1564	Yes
1565	Yes.

1566	Yes, but my family's health is more important as we are a high risk family
1567	Yes, especially if it is completely distance learning.
1568	Yes. I feel my eighth grader is not well prepared to enter high school. He was already struggling in math before, now it's even worse. Common core is hard to teach someone when myself was never taught that!!
1569	N/A
1570	He will be starting Running Start, which has a much better online learning program. From what I am hearing, close to 50% of the high schoolers will receive at least one "incomplete"
1571	Yes, but I'd rather my child and our family be safe.
1572	I feel remote learning put my child behind.
1573	Just don't want him falling too far behind where he would have been.
1574	My only concern is if I have to teach her online as I dont have the time.
1575	I am afraid we missed too much this year and we won't be able to make up for it
1576	YES!!!!
1577	Yes...one of my children is 7 and is at an age where learning to read write and do things that other kids his age are doing with the help of school
1578	Help is needed for struggling students, both emotionally and academically. Our kids' teachers were amazing this spring and made heroic efforts, but the kids need more support and interaction with their teachers (including for specials and counselors, etc) and their peers.
1579	Teachers are definitely going to be in review mode for longer than usual...taking time away to learn new skills during the year.
1580	My child had no access to his IEP services. My other child will definitely be behind.
1581	No.
1582	Face masks are great to enforce, however my child has a very hard time focusing with distractions and suffers from sensory processing issues. I do not believe she would benefit from in-person learning and having her constantly being expose seems pointless.
1583	Not at this point, but I do worry if this continues longer that they might fall behind
1584	Absolutely, I feel if they don't have in person or better online instructions it is very difficult for my middle school and high schooler to engage. I see lack of motivation and no interest. I would like to see online school treated closely like regular school. A schedule such as Google meets as a class where the student gets on like they would if going to class have a 20-30 minute instruction, work on their work and ask questions if needed for 10 minutes. Then have a 10 minute break then move to the next class. I also feel hands on classes or electives will be difficult to do online unless their is a better platform or forum that will be used.
1585	Yes, if we do not return to the classroom I am greatly concerned. We had a wide range of teachers this spring, from doing nothing, to having a teaching video every week, to somewhere in the middle. We need consistency.
1586	No

1587	Yes, please keep teacher opinion and bias out of the classroom and stop teaching my child morals and values. That is my job as a parent! We should be focusing less on social issues and more on preparing our youth to think logically for themselves, without influence. Put the facts out and nothing more. Teach them to debate correctly! School is not and should not be anything but a place to acquire knowledge. My kids do not need to see propaganda about sexual orientation, gender fluidity, etc on the walls. Prepare them for college educationally... I will do the rest. Maybe teachers wouldn't be so stressed out and striking every year if you removed this burden from their daily schedules. It also stresses out the kids. And no my narrative probably doesn't fit your liberal institution but there is much to be learned from 'less is more education'! 1588	A little bit.
1589	I have two students who need speech therapy. Without speech they will both continue to struggle with English and language arts.
1590	Yes, I feel that not enough attention will be given to each student and all of them will fall in the same category
1591	No
1592	Yes, I want to make sure they are challenged academically and still able to continue building relationships and doing extra curricular activities.
1593	It depends. I believe COVID will be a HUGE distraction. While I am fearful of sending my children back to school because staff are not sufficiently trained, I also know that my kids are not learning anything at home except how to google answers to their tests and homework.
1594	At home schooling as implemented spring 2020, while necessary, is not sustainable for my children's education. This was a special circumstance, and I believe everyone (educators, students, and families) made it "work", but we need to either return to "mostly normal" or find a much better way to do distance education.
1595	Yes.
1596	Not enough teacher led instruction.
1597	Yes. My child needs more constructive and hands on learning with feedback or guidance. I would want to make sure he was still provided that even in a home/virtual setting
1598	Yes. Spring online learning was a joke for my child. He does not learn in an online platform.
1599	No.
1600	Based on the rapid onset of the lock-downs, rush to online work, and close to no accountability of the students to do the work online, there is no way of knowing the knowledge level of students coming back. This could cause a delay in teaching new material to kids. This delay could cause students who did the required school work to become bored and try to find an outlet in the classroom.
1601	Yes, the kids are being denied a normal education; online/distance learning is not the same as in person, in classroom learning. We are teaching our kids how to panic not preparing them for their future

1602	Yes. So little measurable progress was made during the final months of this last semester. I do worry about returning in the fall already behind.
1603	I do not have concerns about academic growth in my students. We will ensure that our kids are educated and engaged in academics with or without the school. I believe it is a parents job to educate their students and school is simply the tool for achieving that education.
1604	No, all of my students are highly capable. They will thrive in an in-person environment. The e-learning this past was anything but learning. If there is no in-person instruction, we will homeschool.
1605	With the limited amount of contact from teachers I'm concerned that my students will fall behind in their understanding of new concepts. Plus, I have a fifth grader moving to middle school and I'm concerned with how he will navigate online school with multiple teachers when he's used to having one teacher. Not looking forward to this fall.
1606	Yes. I am not a teacher. My shortcomings in terms of knowledge, scheduling, and self discipline will greatly affect my child's ability to learn if there is no in person school next year. My child needs the routine that school provides in order to get into the headspace to learn, and that is very difficult to achieve for us in the same space that every other part of our lives happens and with the additional distraction of siblings.
1607	Yes online learning this year was difficult for my kids to feel they actually learned.
1608	Absolutely
1609	No
1610	Yes. I hope the lack of formal education is taken into consideration for this upcoming school year and teachers spend time doing some review.
1611	Nope.
1612	Of course. There has been no school work issued since March. There has been no opportunity to make up work from when my child missed a week of school prior to the closure.
1613	Yes
1614	Absolutely. In this household, online learning has been proven not to work. With a high school student with an AP class load, online learning is not acceptable. Elementary teachers did what they could but they missed out on so much more that they normally would have had. It has been awful.
1615	They dropped out last year so I didn't lose My job. They cannot be homeschooled in the fall or I will lose my job. My youngest's speech has declined since he's not in therapy anymore.
1616	Yes, remote learning did not work for my student at all. I am most worried about the effect this remote learning had on my student's mental health.
1617	No. Last year, We were in a school district in Charleston,SC that was well equipped for distance learning.
1618	I volunteer. I sure hope I am allowed to come in and help. This fall, teachers and students are going to need assistance more than ever.

1619	Yes, online remote learning was a disappointment. Teachers gave homework packets but not enough time was given to cover the material. Teachers scheduled online class time but did not always "show-up." Consistency seemed to be a bit lacking. We understand this was new but it seems some teachers would rather just give out assignments then find meaningful ways to teach.
1620	YES! My teens felt HS teachers put in minimal effort to teach/ help them learn and added lots of unnecessary busy work that didn't need direct teaching. That is NOT preparing my student for college nor helping in the scaffolding of skills needed to take the next necessary course.
1621	Not if we go back to normal, not the SPI "new norm" waste of time.
1622	Yes.
1623	No, I feel like RMS and Oly did a good job with distance learning.
1624	Yes! I think she missed some of the classroom teacher led instructions
1625	Yes, my kids are advanced and bright, but did not feel engaged AT ALL with the online google (the only part they looked forward to was once a week google meet to see the teacher and kids)
1626	Yes
1627	Yes they've lost ground being home and at home instruction
1628	Yes.
1629	i hope teachers keep in mind that due to being shut down students will be behind in academics
1630	I just hope that they will have a teacher that can help them with everything they missed out on. Example being if they start algebra but never got an introduction to it and the end of last school year
1631	No
1632	Restrictions may affect academic growth.
1633	Absolutely!! Our students received little to no instruction from their teachers. The teacher(s) posted an assignment and the student was expected to complete the assignment with no instruction or guidance. Students were expected to give full effort while most teachers gave minimal effort. Some teachers would go weeks with no input to students and no responses to student's and parent's email.
1634	Yes
1635	Not at this time.
1636	Absolutely. There was NO teacher engagement. No video chats, no video class sessions, no schedule voice calls, Nothing. It felt like there was no teacher, just a list of frustrating assignments with problems and no one to help During class Time
1637	The last three months of school were very hard on her ... keeping her in a routine for attendance every morning would have helped.
1638	Yes, at least one of my kids is way behind and I was not able to home educate as well as I had hoped I could.

1639	So far my children have been able to complete the assignments and are not behind academically. They do miss interacting with their peers.
1640	Yes, worried virtual options will impede learning. They hate learning at home and it is a fight every day.
1641	No
1642	we appreciate the efforts that the CKSD and OSPI have gone to achieve every possible need for our grandchildren.... CKSD ROCKS
1643	Not as long as he actually gets to go
1644	Yes, I've had to keep working a packed options for homeschooling my child. Homework was done as much as possible after work and on weekends.
1645	No
1646	Only in classes that needed more in person support such as world language and arts
1647	It will be impacted to a degree because of COVID-19 related necessary precautions, which is expected, but I do worry about their ability to focus well enough to academic instructions in the context of all they'll have to remember/keep aware of in relation to COVID-19.
1648	Yes. While also being worried for the health.
1649	Yes, my special needs student was basically unsupported and I fear he is falling further behind
1650	Yes. My son will be going into 4th grade and he was already struggling. My daughter will be transitioning to middle school which is already has it's challenges in itself.
1651	Getting behind in math.
1652	Yes
1653	If it's not 100% in person I do. The last 3 months my 7th grader struggled with several classes and teachers not communicating. Deadlines for work being turned in was not communicated properly by english teacher to parents. If teachers are only communicating with the student and not the parents we all aren't on the same page. Also my 9 year old had a 504 plan and how can we implement that without help. He also is falling behind in writing and needs great assistance for it.
1654	Yes. My student has tested high in reading and English and I will be very upset to see that wasted.
1655	I think the focus should be on the kids' mental health.
1656	With the school closures both my children are now behind in their academics. My husband and I are both essential personnel and we were not able to provide what my children needed academically. I'm not a trained educator and I feel my children have suffered severely. I'm concerned for how they will get caught up and reestablish those academic routines so they don't continue to fall behind with each new school year. I'm also concerned for their mental health, being away from so many people who love and care for them like the school educators, as well as being isolated from all their friends. I understand it's a very uncertain time and we're sailing in new waters, but I am concerned for how this entirely new education process with shape their future if there is zero continuity present.

1657	Yes, with face coverings it's going to cause more anxiety and kids not getting proper oxygen to learn adequately.

1665	Yes! Face masks and social distancing are going to be a hinderment for elementary school!
1666	I feel some of the work they had her do needs to be retaught over starting this next school year.
1667	Definitely believe she, like most 6 th graders going to 7th are behind where they should be and many Students didn't even participate in the online learning so will be even more behind which will slow the overall classroom popup down
1668	No
1669	Yes. Considering most teachers got fre fee students to do their classwork
1670	Yes, specifically my kindergartener missed a lot of in person instruction for learning to read, I'm afraid she will fall behind.
1671	No, I am more concerned about the health and safety of my family than anything else.

1710	No, my number one concern is healthy and safety. Academics can be worked on at a later date.

1712	Would like to see school resume a month early so student can catch up.
1713	My husband and I made sure our kids did the work they were assigned. We also had them work on their grade level on Khan academy. Even with the extra work we assigned our kids started by 8:30 and were done by 1:30 every day. There are some gaps in their education this year. But not as many as there could have been had we only followed the work they were given. I hope if the online learning continues the work load is a little heavier or there are additional challenges for kids who complete the regular class work.
1714	Level of knowledge applicable to their grade and support if they are below standards
1715	Yes I am concerned based on the extremely poor quality & quantity of material & education that was provided. The reliance of the teachers of leveraging on other educational websites showed the lack of effort & preparation the teachers put into their work. This also made it difficult to try & accomplish what the teachers were trying to accomplish. Trying to navigate multiple websites was an unnecessary burden.
1716	Yes. I felt like it was a scramble to get anything online for the teachers to "grade".
1717	Yes. I'm worried they won't be where they should be because of the lack of actual instruction this spring. Sending links and lessons online is not a substitute for teaching online. Teachers could have easily set google meet times for each day to actually instruct rather than just talk to students.
1718	Yes. I feel like they have been stunted without a proper school environment. It is impossible to provide that for my 7 year old with his younger siblings always needing me or distracting him.
1719	Yes, I think in person teaching is the best for my kids. I worry that they are behind and I worry how we will get through school with 2 full time parents of schools don't open back up. At home learning will cut into family time. Yes, I am concerned. I am also concerned about the health and safety of my family and my kids. I realize this situation is not ideal for many reasons, that just doesn't lessen my expectations or apprehension for this next year.

1767	I worry that he will miss the socialization portions, which is important especially in the younger grades.

1769	Yes. I am worried that my kids will be held back because teachers have to teach to the kids who have been unable to do school this spring and will have to teach at that level instead of meeting every child where they are at.
1770	My child did not do well online. In person is best for him.
1771	Yes! I found this year hard trying to be a teacher, ST, OT, PT and special education teacher. I like being mom. My son likes me being mom. I'm always very involved with his learning, but we greatly need the assistance of our team!
1772	That we didn't meet this years basics and won't meet next years.
1773	Yes, shes transitioning to middle school and everything is totally different. Worried about her anxiety in returning

1775	Less time/ ability to interact with other students
1776	Yes, with special needs programs. Children who have a hard time staying on task while at home because they are so comfortable. I do not have a teaching background and find it hard to find different ways to teach other than YouTube videos to help for better understanding
1777	Yes, my child already has a speech delay and as his first year in kindergarten I'm worried he will get behind
1778	Yes. This past semester was a joke. The teacher interaction and instruction was non existent. If next year is anything like this past semester I will pull all my children out of the public system. it has to be better
1779	Of course.
1780	In person works for my kids. Online is very hard to keep them engaged and motivated. And that was with both parents at home too. We are back at work now and home/online schooling is absolutely untenable. One of the parents will have to quit their job just to make it happen. Not good.

1781	Not letting my child fall behind.
1782	Yes. Kids are there to learn from their teachers at grade level. All these extra rules and guidelines take the focus off of learning. I'm concerned they will be treated more like prisoners or sick patients than the healthy, vibrant kids they are.

I also know that some students received an "A" and didn't complete any assignments or work during the second semester. How is that okay?

1834	Yes, but I know that the district—administrators, teachers, and support staff—are working hard to optimize learning while also protecting people's health and lives. I'm hopeful that the district will come up with a solution that is adequate for everyone but especially students with special needs who need extra support and/or school-based therapies.

1836	Yes, it was very hard to help my student feel connected.
1837	My child's IEP needs to be adjusted so she can succeed.
1838	yes because we missed alot of school
1839	Yes because we lost so much learning this year.
1840	Not for my children but for others, Yes!
1841	Yes I feel the distant learning set my child back a lot. She was already struggling with school before all of this. It's the number one concern of mine.
1842	My students were struggling with switching to online parts of school, I'm hoping the teachers will be able to provide more support to help the students understand.

1843	My students is able to concentrate better in a classroom setting rather than online
1844	yes. I dont feel that the majority of my students teachers made much.of an attempt to engage him in their respective materials. Lectures can be posted to you tube or other channels etc. Office hours need to be more thane one day/week for one hour. It would be nice if they could arrange in person meetings for those whom the virtual help isn't enough
1845	Yes nobody actually taught my son anything it was just third grade stuff through the computer that he was expected to know he hasn't learned any new math but was crying over everything that was assigned to him because nobody told him how to do it now I do but yet they stated that they didn't want parents to help
1846	Yes. I am not a teacher. I am a full time working parent. I am sure I did not provide everything my children needed.
1847	personalized training during online tutorials instructing students
1848	In person lectures are critical for children learning new materials. Without teachers' commitment to engage in giving scheduled classes, proper education that children deserve will be compromised. When impossible to have in person lectures at schools, zoom style classes should be held to maintain the year long study schedule. Not "read or watch the instructions below and solve the problems", which is 100% self study. What's the point of having teachers then?
1849	I fear his academic growth will be prohibited by the distraction and irritation of wearing a face mask as well as the inability to effectively see his teacher's face
1850	Yes I am worried that face masks will distract the younger kids.
1851	Being slightly behind but not due to resources but because my husband and I have both worked during the COVID school year and were unable to homeschool during the day.
1852	Yes, school is different now. I absolutely need a teacher's support because I don't know what I am doing.
1853	If we do do online learning, some kids can't learn without having the teacher there in person so they can ask questions face to face.
1854	I just would like to make sure students are being challenged still and hearing from their teachers on a regular basis and held more accountable to getting their work done like they do when they are in school.
1855	Yes. Lack of structure in online teaching, coupled with the risks of in-person tend to not be a good mix.
1856	We do. My 3rd grader was already struggling with reading and having school canceled as he was starting to reach the desired level was a detriment to his reading. We are not sure if he is ready to move on to 4th grade.
1857	My concern is the school district ability and willingness to focus on what matters, your only job, that is quality education. Drop the hysteria, social and political issues and leave that to the parents.

1858	Yes. I believe the masks may make it difficult to hear, understand, or concentrate on the lesson/teacher. I am concerned what pe would look like as one of my children has a hard time breathing in a mask as it is. I'm concerned how they could safely eat or drink throughout the day. I'm concerned about the sanitization efforts being made (especially the bathrooms and common areas).

1865	Yes, I have a child entering kindergarten next year. I am worried that a lack of in person education is going to be detrimental to her future learning, as I strongly feel that kindergarten is where the foundation is laid for their future education.
1866	Yes. If they are not in class, you can't claim academic growth. Second semester was pitiful with respect to school involvement. My children are lucky that they have two highly educated parents that can actually create academic growth, because the school failed miserably.

1869	Yes, finishing this school year was a struggle because he only got slides and youtube videos. He had a hard time learning anything that way and struggled. He needs someone to be able to teach to him. A teacher should do video class instruction and not just hand out slides.
1870	No I'm excited about them returning to school in person. I worry about them being home since my children have been home they have literally done no schoolwork, have depression, gaining weight and even though I have four children only two of the teachers have contacted me about my kids learning. The way teachers have completely disengaged is very shocking.
1871	Yes. Concerned about being behind in subject areas where skills build (i.e. math)

1896	Yes I believe the fear of "COVID19" will be too distracting.
1897	The teachers! If they don't care it reflex's on the children's mind body and spirit. I could not have been more disappointed in how my child's education was handle this spring.

1898	My kids started doing better while learning online. If they didn't understand something we were able to go over it again until they got it.
1899	Yes. I feel like the teachers should have zoom or conference calls with their class at the given class time to teach, explain, and answer questions regardless. If "normal" school can't be in session, I can't imagine how lost the majority of these kids will be. Many parents have already and will be returning to work far before school is back in session. You're talking about a huge group of students without support at home while navigating their school work alone during the day.

2173	Absolutely. The online learning experience was horrendous for our family. I'm concerned that the mask wearing, social distancing and other precautionary measure planned for the on-site learning will result in an environment in which the kids aren't learning well either.

2176	school is already really hard for me, and now the corona is ruining everything for me, and making it all even harder
2177	Concerned that because of the difficulties
2178	I worry about one of my children who already struggles with learning. I hope there is a catch up/review period to go over things from the end of this school year. My son is worried he will be behind other students.
2179	Some for my kindergartener and my preschooler who receives speech services.
2180	YES
2181	Yes, my child did not want to do school work at home. I know she is behind but I'm afraid she will be left there. Will there be an extended reevaluation of where they are supposed to be, like after summer breaks?

2183	Yes, because my daughter is above her grade level in all areas (according to hear teacher). She was providing differentiation in class but she wasn't able to to the same extent when distance learning began.
2184	I'm concerned with the lack of support from the school district and teachers for this closure.
2185	Would like to be graded on merit and not issued "COVID A. My student will have 4 AP classes, gets straight As, and this should be acknowledged on his record.
2186	Absolutely. As a military family who had relocated at the very end of last school year, and had attended schools across 4 states in 2 years, my children were already struggling to piece together any of the curriculum they were missing. Now that they essentially missed an entire semester, I feel like the cards are stacked against them. Covid isn't the only factor affecting their education, but I'm afraid it's all getting lost in the chaos.
2187	Yes, health safety of my kid and i have a family member who is immunocompromised.

2188	If my child has to do online learning I feel they will struggle, lose interest, and fall behind. Causing them to have bad grades and lack of great academics. Online learning is difficult for anyone. I know first hand as I attend online college and even as an adult it is difficult.
2189	I do not. However, the school coursework needs to be a lot more challenging then it was the previous 3 months.
2190	Yes, how will students and teachers communicate properly. What about student with anxiety that hyperventilate when the put a mask on
2191	I am concerned about the lack of consistency my children experienced from their various teachers. My children understood that they only needed to do the bare minimum in order to pass their classes during COVID. They will need to make up a lot of work lost during their second semester to truly be on track for their senior year.
2192	Yes, they missed quite a bit at the end of this year and I am not confident I have all the knowledge to answer questions. And, I want my child to continue above average, not fall to average or behind peers.
2193	Yes, there were already issues at this school for my struggling student that were improperly addressed and parental requests and concerns were ignored. All of the new restrictions and unconventional environment will only amplify these issues for us.
2194	Yes. Parents need access to a legitimate learning program and materials to use with their kids. Can not be dependent on individual teachers who are not even present! PowerSchool is a nightmare also. We can not be left at the mercy of teachers and PowerSchool.

2196	Yes concerned for falling behind if they do not return to school!! My child received the bare minimum distance learning for her 5th grade and impossible to catch up if not in the classroom in the fall.

My son was having some issues (he had some things going on with his IEP as well) before school was closed due to the pandemic and had gotten behind in school, and after school had been closed and everyone was racing to get something rolled out for online classes, he got further behind, and now, he has been given covid A's, with a couple of exceptions, and will now go into his junior year not knowing most of what he should have learned in 10th grade. 2274	I believe they need to not start with testing as normal and have more of a review time for most kids who may have struggled during spring

2411	I think there needs to be consistence learning via online. Treat online school as if they are in person.
2412	Yes, I do. I feel that the home bases learning was not interactive enough.
2413	Yes, the remote education was poorly organized and frankly non existent. I'm disgusted that you would have every student progress to the next grade level, given how poor the education for the second half of the year was
2414	I don't have concerns for my kids at this time.
2415	I am concerned that the model used in 2019-2020 did not challenge my child. Most of it was review work. Next year I hope that if they are distance learning or hybrid model the work will be more individualized and challenging.

2416	If we have to do online for another year we will not learn as well or as much and kids will struggle
2417	Yes. I am concerned that with limited in person education they will not be adequately taught new skills and concepts. I can help my child stay up to date with things like reading and writing but I am not qualified to teach new concepts such as math, science, etc.
2418	I dont feel that there was sufficient structure to support grade appropriate learning. I feel that a lot of students will be behind in the fall
2419	I am worried that without in person teacher instruction, my children will not fully understand/ learn new concepts. The IXL program works well, but has flaws and is very time consuming (more than a typical lesson at school). I am also worried they will not be challenged enough, my children are all high cap or in the venture program.

2422	not really
2423	No.
2424	My son is a hands-on learner. He is smart and got through his classes this year, including his first AP class, but I don't feel he learned as much as he would have if it had been a normal year. I worry that his learning will be stifled if it's only online or a hybrid, yet I have a compromised autoimmune system and can't afford for my son to get the virus.
2425	I'm only concerned that they won't be where they should. I'm hoping that the first few months they review things from the past 3 months.
2426	Yes, my two sons really struggled with virtual learning. They needed face to face instruction.
2427	My only concern is if my children are not able to attend school in the fall they will fall behind. I do not believe they were able to learn anything different with this last springs online learning g.
2428	Yes, there has not been enough instruction. My daughter needs more social interaction and hands on teaching.
2429	no
2430	Well, I know all of the kids are behind in their education. It will be a challenge to get the kids caught up. I do have a concern because I have noticed signs of dyslexia in my child. This will be something that is best assessed in the school setting. Again, another reason why I believe face to face in-person instruction is important. How can you assess learning disorder in a child if all of the education is done online? My child is an eager learner so I don't really have concern in terms of ability to comprehend new information. I just hope there won't be too much pressure to catch up and that the pace is not too hurried for the children.
2431	My student has been concerned about how her grades will be reflected on her transcript later on, meaning these grades won't hold as much weight as grades in the past.

There is/was no consistency in learning and I worry.

2437	Only if the environment is solely online. I worry about sustained engagement/motivation as real person-to-person relationships with her new teachers may be hard to establish online.

2440	My son went from an A student in math down to almost an I with distance learning. He struggled not having the guidance of his teacher while doing the work. We work very hard to get him outside of school help to get the A. His teacher sent an email stating that he would have been more successful if he had some in school instruction. I seriously hope that for the kids protection and learning that they will be on an every other day or a daily staggering in school/ distance learning combination!

2442	The stress of changes in the way schools will be and time to adapt to the new norm and for students to have that time to adapt.

2444	Yes. Bith my kids have lost progress since home schooling. We did all assignments.. its just different without live instruction.

2446	My daughter is a visual learner. Assigning videos to classroom and extra example problems should work just fine.
2447	Adjustment to social functions are my biggest concern. If there isn't a benefit to staying in district on a social level then academically it's just as good if not better to just home school.
2448	Somewhat
2449	there will be little to none and one of my kids has an IEP and this is really going to destroy her progress that has been made to this point
2450	Yes, my concern is that they are not getting individualized academics to help them continue to grow at the regular pace. (Being slowed down from the normal rate of progression.)
2451	Yes. I feel like unless teachers work individually with students and/or in person somewhat the kids will fall thru the cracks and not get the support and academics they need
2452	If they don't continue in person learning my students will suffer greatly with just online learning. It is not there learning style.

2455	yes. I believe social interaction is key to development and I can't teach that at home. no one can replace schools.

2463	The online line learning is a waste of time.
2464	Yes. She was not "disciplined" in the school work. That might change if it became the norm. She will be anxious since we have been staying home for the most part.

We work full time and by the time we get home from work, his medication has worn off and it's a constant struggle. At school the first semester he had honor roll.... when we went to virtual learning he probably has all Fs.
2490	How will IEP goals be met at home
2491	Absolutely. My Kindergartener was able to grow and learn while distance learning basic knowledge. My venture student however was not challenged outside of daily math lessons. I'm super concerned that compared to other students across the nation, we are falling behind. It was also clear that students had little to no motivation to do online work as there was no feedback or grading being offered. This has to change.
2492	I have serious concerns about the academic growth of my student for next year. This spring proved to be academically challenging for her and she was less than successful. The model of 100% online learning simply doesn't work well for her at all.

2494	No, since I am her teacher and I have made sure she is on target or above for the benchmarks.
2495	No
2496	I have concerns with the lack of academic growth over the time schools were closed
2497	I think missing half the year of in class learning will have an effect on all students everyone will need to play a little catch up
2498	Of course!
2499	Yes, with the new learning model I do not get challenged and the grades aren't fair. There is no room for success in top students.

2500	Yes, my student did not have the ability to get their teacher to verify the progress of academic growth during covid. It would have been nice to get some form a assessment to determine which skills needed to be worked on during summer break.
2501	Yes. My boys got bored because it slowed down too much for them so they had less motivation to try when they are usually good students. So I found things to help keep them going.
2502	No
2503	Yes. Child#1: readjusting to 8th grade academic responsibilities. Child#2: not receiving challenging learning opportunities due to limitations. Child#3: getting a quality introduction to public education in kindergarten.
2504	I do not have concerns.
2505	I don't worry about my own because as a reading intervention para I have been able to support mine and some friends kids at home as well.

2515	Yes. The last three months of this academic year were highly disruptive and I think my kids education suffered. My kids are not great self motivators and are better served with school time.

2517	My child wants to stay on top of her game with learning and growing as a student. This whole issue has caused concern in my family. We would not like to see her fall behind next year as a result she didn't get a full school year grade term.
2518	Yes. If not for A or incomplete, he probably would have been seconds away from failing the 8th grade. He has been suffering from lack of socialization and went into a depression. Also, without the teachers there to encourage him along, he felt no need to do the work. 2531	Gen Ed student - no SPED student - yes
2532	Yes they are not where they need to be. The online based lessons were very vague and teachers were not understanding that parents couldn't be there all the time.
2533	I feel my child will be distracted by adjustments made for COVID and not be able to learn properly.
2534	I do for online portions.
2535	No. I am concerned with social skills and behavior.
2536	Hopefully there is an improvement on how things are done. My high school student had work for most classes while my middle school student had no work for most of his classes. The biggest issue with turning in work seemed to be the classes that required a photo be taken and sent with the chromebook. Teachers complained that the photos weren't clear.
2537	Yes.
2538	Nope. I trust the staff of CK to help my student grow as I believe they are professionals. My bigger concern is the social-emotional wellbeing of the students.

The chrome book would not link to school system making it difficult to turn in assignments. The isolation has created a depressed learning environment with very little motivation. I worry about reintegration and how for positive interactions.

2555	I'm more worried about their emotional and social needs not being met.
2556	Yes I'm concerned with my student not getting enough of an education. There needs to be classroom time. I'm not a teacher, I'm a mom and I work.
2557	Just that they will be a little behind due to the lack of in school teacher instruction. Kids are more engaged at school

2559	The 3 months of online "learning" has left them unprepared for next year.
2560	I'm more worried about emotional support for students.
2561	no, academics can be caught up in the future when there us a vaccine. my children being dead from a deadly disease because people can't follow rules and guidelines cant be changed.

2564	Yes. Distant learning is difficult for children and inefficient when compared to traditional classroom instruction, as shown during these past few months. It would be ignorant to assume each child has an adult family member just waiting by at home to walk their kids through each assignment and throughout the day. These last few months have shown that distance learning requires a significant increase in parent parent interaction and during normal working hours.

2573	I am just concerned that my two students will have different schedules. If we do have a hybrid model for school and kids only attend certain days my hope is that families will have students attending on the same days for transportation purposes.

2575	My students did ALL of their coursework during online lessons...then found out later it was not all required.

2596	I do. My older student has been tested highly capable the last two years, but I feel her education is severely lacking with at home instruction.
2597	We need actual teaching from teachers through remote technology; merely assigning class work and then referring the kids to other sources is not teaching. Teachers must actually teach using Google Meets or Zoom
2598	No my student actually excelled academically with homeschooling
2599	Yes. She struggles in school and not having teacher interaction really hurt.
2600	Yes, I have a sophmore in high school and a kindergartener starting school this year. I need for teachers to be engaged.
2601	As long as they return to school next year I feel fairly confident that with all of the effort we put into distance learning this year they will not be behind anyone.

2603	Highly disappointed in the middle school magnet program during the shut down. Conversely, was impressed with the high school AP teachers, particularly Birkenfeld, as well as middle school math teacher Pitcher
2604	I have massive concerns about academic growth for both of my children. My oldest is in a gen. ed. setting but he has an IEP for reading/ speech. I am worried that he is even further behind now, despite my best efforts to work with him at home. My youngest is severely affected by autism and this school closure has been horrible for him. The change of routine sent him into a significant regression and the loss of service hours is also going to be a big setback. It is near impossible for me to give him the structure and support that he needs at home while I am working full time. I feel like at the beginning of the year and most of the year it will be reteaching what was supposed to have been taught at the end of the year and will be a constant game of playing catch up for most students.

2636	I have academic concerns if we don't return to in building school or a hybrid model.
2637	I am more nervous that she is ahead of most students. We were able to push her through the course work we were provided and purchased items to ensure she would continue to learn. I know many kids were not in a postion to do that and I don't want my child to be bored while they catch up.

2639	I will be home with my three kids, in my own rigorous nursing program that will be online, while my husband is deployed. I think I will struggle greatly trying to homeschool my two school aged kids alone.
2640	My son did really well with his curriculum given by Ms. snow. I think he's ready for second grade. I am concerned about my kindergartner and how he will feel about school if he's entering into all of this
2641	It will be challenging to have students who have had disparate experiences with online learning and are now at a wide range of levels as far as grade-level skills are concerned. For example, I worked with my child every day and he is now above-level but some of his classmates were unable to do any distance learning and will start the year behind.
2642	No.

2661	Yes, some subjects I don't feel I can properly support my child in. Online learning seemed to review more than teach new content
2662	I am concerned that my child will not be able to meet their IEP goals if they don't have adequate time with their teacher and other team members.
2663	I feel they'll be behind
2664	I worry if my child will truly be ready for college if he is not getting lectures/presentations online and is not getting the reading that he has to do in order to be ready.

2666	Yes, there will be a huge gap with children since you closed for so long and didn't start for a couple weeks. Many children fell way behind from who I've talked to. 215	I just pray that any new system of learning is constant and has multiple opportunities to figure out how to use it before moving forward.
216	My kids greatly benefit from the wonderful school environment and daily personal interaction with teachers and classmates. At home learning has not been very effective in my opinion. Hopefully, things can be as normal as possible with reasonable precautions in the Fall. I understand the need to be mindful and careful about the risks, but at some point we have to live our lives and I am worried about the long term educational and social development impacts of my pre-teen/teenage kids especially if the online-only model endures into the fall. Plus, my kids need sports.....please!
217	Social distancing mediates rate of spread, but the biophysics and organic chemistry of this virus' attack on an infected human won't change based on human social behavior. The time density of infection-capable interactions between humans governs its growth rate. Two medically fragile members of our family, including our son, are likely to be impacted too severely if infected. We strongly prefer a distance learning method for our boy at home, in our green zone, instead of placing him in a high probability of infection location at a school. We acknowledge and appreciate the school's best efforts. The challenge is biophysics and time density of human interactions.

219	I do not feel comfortable having my children taught by someone in a mask. Humanity is not a virus. Coming together and not being separated is very important to human growth and is the only reason I send my children to school.
220	I'm just very very concerned about how this is going to work what's children wearing face masks all day long they're going to be coughing and sneezing and putting boogers all over those masks that can't be healthy for them or the other children around that that's only if we can get the children to keep the face mask on while they're at school
221	I don't think the answer to homeschooling is entirely technological. I think much could be done using good workbooks and packets. I think individual instruction from teachers online is great. I think clear expectations are necessary. I think that the work must be graded and expected to be completed with plenty of allowances for individual situations. Children need feedback.

223	I think it is important to attempt to continue extracurricular activities like sports and clubs to maintain student morale.

224	Please find some way for the children and their parent who is a teacher to have the flexibility to be on the same schedule if going back to a part time schedule in the 3 schools where my children attend. Without this consideration, it will be quite difficult and extremely stressful to manage it all as we have no support network and cannot afford day care.
225	It is of my opinion with proper Sanitation proper education improper practices there is no reason we can't open school to its full capacity
226	Special Needs Children are in a category of their own
227	My concern for this ridiculous guidance is that there is a good chance that the reduction in their ability to breathe due to constantly wearing these masks are a great concern for my family and I. Why are children required to wear masks if the virus isn't transmitted via children.
228	That the safety of our children come first.
229	Would be horrible if my child had to start school with online classes.
230	1) Setting expectations, but not lowering education standards. 2) Ensure security of technology. Especially if kids are working more on-line. We are more open to hacking attempts and well as PII and Sensitive data risks with online schooling. Especially since computers are not using VPN to firewall off the chrome books. 2) Increase STEM awareness by leveraging this event as an educational moment of using technology to keep us safe.
231	Social opportunities and mental health support is important for many students. I think a hybrid program would be ideal. It would provide social exposure and easier access to help even if on a limited basis.
232	It's TIME to get over the fear and ADJUST to REAL LIFE. We can't hide in bubbles forever. Send your high-risk health faculty and staff home and replace them with low/normal risk faculty and staff. We are working AT WORK with adjustments. YOU can work AT WORK with adjustments. NO EXCUSES for not delivering public education in the classrooms. If other families choose to opt out, that is their business. 234	We should be doing online learning like we did when this virus started. My child flourished and was still able to socialize with his classmates. He wasn't forced to wear a mask..and wasn't risking exposure to the virus/carrying and exposing our beloved community members and teachers.
235	We need to be intentional with the kids that are needing extra help.
236	I think the fallout from this lack of real interaction is going to be felt for a long time

237	Stay calm and assure students that it's all okay. My daughter is nervous and anxious that the world is falling apart. I keep assuring her of all the good things, and smiling a lot while saying it's okay to be unsure- we just do our best with what we know. We also take control of the things we CAN impact.
238	I'd love to send my children back to full time in-person school if possible, with appropriate masking/disinfecting precautions. I think most *older* kids would not have an issue with this. If a hybrid model (part time in person learning) has to be followed, the daily calendar/schedule needs to be made ASAP for those working parents who will need to figure out childcare. And, the schedule needs to be consistent for the same childcare reasons. If part time or full time online learning is planned, please have the kids follow a schedule (for CKMS minimum 30 min per class, google classroom video meets to see and talk with teacher, hear and see a lesson/actual teaching, discuss questions, take attendance). Similar for elementary school- 30 min (or similar) per subject, on video/google classroom for teaching. NOT just packets sent home. Any "assignments" given these past 3 months without teacher involvement (which was most of them it felt like), required the parents to become teachers. I am not a good teacher, I fully admit this. Plus, the kids are SO distracted at home, the learning environment is very unfavorable. They NEED to be back at school in person for the motivation, engagement, challenge, and quite frankly socialization. Many kids are showing symptoms of depression with the quarantine, mine included. As a last thought - music. Both my kids play an instrument. They love band. I'm not sure how I see this working, but if it means switching them to an instrument which does not require blowing/breaths, I will do that. (i.e. I will switch my flute player to percussion or a violin, etc so she can stay in music) Can the school invest in negative pressure ventilation practice areas so the kids can get individual instruction with good ventilation? Online after school all band practice on google classroom? I know this is difficult for the school, but bottom line is that teaching needs to actually happen next school year. Thank you for all the teachers who made an extra effort to engage to kids these past few months.
239	I'm worried about multiple children in a family t the same school being on different rotating schedule. This would mean I can't go into the office even part time.
240	The classes I want to see him do at school would include lab sciences, higher level art and math since I don't feel qualified to teach those.

241	We live in the age of online learning mostly for higher education and professional development. It was clear some teachers adapted well to online learning management, being available to students, and proactively engaging them in online meetings, email, chat, etc... Others simply went dark, this is a problem. We need a better support team to get teachers to meet effective online education standards which may include getting the Union to make concessions if online learning is used next year. I cannot support teachers collecting a paycheck and going dark with the appearance of doing an hour or so of work a week. We were able to support our student's progress with Power School, yet not all teachers used it or updated it regularly adding to an already challenging situation. Some were great, others weren't, they all need to do their part and be consistent.
242	Internship opportunities and college planning / scholarship info are needed.
243	I work at a different school than the school my children attend and am concerned that I won't be able to continue working with all the options being floated around
244	Idk if kids will be able to wear a face mask all day. It's not comfortable. I will be so worried and some kids specially kindergarten kids don't keep their distance.
245	I want issues of social justice and anti racist curriculum to begin at the elementary level.
246	if students have to wear masks my student is refusing to return to the schools all together. 6+ hours a day wearing a mask is out of the question and not safe for the students that can barely tolerate them going to a store for food shopping
247	Kids need an adequate learning environment and not all kids have this at home. This will further the gap for these kids in learning and education.
248	No face masks for children
249	Middle school students and high school students have a better understanding of social distancing, therefore their day can be longer, K-2 students need a shorter day. Have a plan for all at home, hybrid model, and full return. What happens if a student tests positive or a teacher? The whole school shuts down?
250	Kids with out internet access need to return to full time school. The packets that were sent home for her to do were ridiculous should have lasted her 2 weeks she completed in 2 days. I'm worried my child isnt getting the education that other children are because we dont have access to internet it's not equal opportunity
251	The children's lives are paramount. Any child lost to this virus can never be brought back to life. There are no "do overs." Choose wisely. The kids are also vectors so even if not symptomatic, they will host the virus and bring it back to their families and loved ones. Is it worth it to lose loved ones for the sake of in person learning??

252	It's a tough time right now. They are so many unknowns. It's hard to imagine a safe situation for them to return to school. And it's not due to the lack of ability to keep things clean. Its because kids will be kids. If there can be a better at home learning set up and not just imagine learning and redbird, some other things in the mix that are required also. Because honestly this is all a little overwhelming and I took the easy road and most of the time, those two programs where all my kids did. I feel that it was lacking something, but it was definitely better than nothing. I appreciate what the schools do. I understand that there was only so much time to come up with a plan. So my hope is that you have more time now to dial it in so these kids can continue to advance.
253	Face coverings should be optional but not required. Regular sanitation of the classrooms and public areas should be the focus. Sports and other activities should resume as normal. 256	I think that social interaction for children is just as important as their education and feedback is how they grow more and learn. Provide all children and teachers with extra support for learning and getting caught up.

258	Masks are not helpful and children get sick sometimes it's ok!
259	I don't expect my child to return to a normal school schedule if a mask or face shield must be worn all day.

261	I feel a key piece to making this work more effectively is providing the parents and students with a single source of information. It was very confusing to get emails from some teachers and not others, get Google Classroom notices that were not very detailed, and PowerSchool metrics that didn't relate to current status. I think it's very important that if the student is going to be working from home that the parents/guardians who are virtually acting as proxies have the information they need to ensure their student is on track and working effectively.
262	I think a mix of online learning and in-person learning would be the best option. If all learning is online, the students will not succeed and they will be deprived. Having the right balance is key.
263	Try to have classes outside.

264	I believe we are past the worse part of the virus and wish school would return to normal this fall so my kids have the best chance possible at learning and getting the best education they can. Unfortunately I am not capable of filling the shoes of a teacher this last year was a complete nightmare for us w my kids and even tho I tried as hard as possible we fell behind and most definitely did not benefit at all!!
265	School should start out exclusively online and gradually add in attending in school buildings after several more months have gone by. Perhaps November or January? Or next Spring? We need a vaccine- our community has too many people who are forced to travel with the military/ commute to Seattle for work. It simply isn't safe.
266	I don't think masks should be required
267	Please please improve the communication to families. Don't rely on our kids to give it to us. If they are even partially online, I want a clear schedule and syllabus of work to look at. I only had one kid (out of 3) whose teacher did something like that this past school year when they were all sent home and it made a huge difference in my ability to keep up on what was required/how to support them.
268	If only one child at school doesn't follow the rules and pretend that it's smarter than others - everything will be useless
269	I believe the teacher is the most influential part for teaching my son. They often motivate him and provide expertise that the textbook does not. This relationship is critical and I worry about how to establish this in an online setting.
270	I worry that even if there are proper precautions, my child will still be at risk for exposure. I also believe some will take precautions seriously and some will not.
271	I really appreciated the teachers who put extra effort into lifting students spirits. Online learning is boring. Music, jokes, and assignments that got my son outside and moving were instrumental in keeping him engaged. Zoom classes that were as much about socializing as the were about instruction also helped.
272	teens need social interaction, personal interaction with teachers, and immediate feedback. none of those happened this spring. with such little participation in online HS overall I think a different model needs to be explored
273	I reiterate, the burden of sanitizing should not rest on the shoulders of the teachers. Their purpose is to teach the children.
274	I believe it's important we still have a social aspect in the school. With that one I believe students will get depressed. Seniors should still have some senior events just with more caution. Try to have most normal school year we can with just cautions.
275	The biggest part of what my kids missed this past spring was the personal interactions with their teachers and peers. We need to have a way to re-create this.

276	I am concerned about both lunch time and recess. Splitting lunches more would cause some kids to either have to wait longer before they could eat, or some would eat so early they would be hungry again before the end of school. The amount of children from multiple classrooms eating in the gym together would not necessarily allow for much social distancing, and while recess/outdoor time is a much needed thing for kids, social distancing will be much harder, and playground equipment may not be as well sanitized between each recess.
277	The method of education delivery in the Spring was a failure.
278	I hope that there is a commitment to adapting sports and other social activities to the pandemic challenges. I am concerned that the easy path is just to cancel all extracurricular activities and I believe that will diminish learning for students and impact their future and transition to adulthood.
279	The students will learn better if they have both in- person school and an online school.
280	If face masks are required in school, I believe it would be best to continue remote learning. Face masks on younger children will only encourage them to touch their faces more thus resulting in the spread of disease.
281	Student expressed concern with lack of quality in learning; did not feel HS grades provided good insight to how well student did.
282	Children need structure and routine, socialization, and education. Has A/B days been considered, where they are in 3 classes a day, this might allow for proper sanitizing, handwashing time, etc. or passing periods in phases.
283	I'm very concerned about the lack of information regarding the possible effects COVID-19 will have on children/youth. With that said I believe that it will be near impossible for the school to enforce social distancing...especially since their are adults that are refusing to comply? I worry about escalation, conflict, and the spread of the virus in close quarters. And the poor teachers....ugh.
284	I believe it's important because I feel it's hard for my child to learn as much as she would in school at home. Due to being back at work full time. I think going back to school is in her best interest
285	I am VERY concerned that we would consider reopening when the issue is still the same if not worse than it was prior to closing in the Spring... Nothing has changed vaccine wise and more have died and is now effecting kids of all ages. My kid being younger doesn't understand why he wouldn't be able to hug his teacher, friends, etc. Having these rules on kids his age isn't something that would be beneficial or that would work. Expecting him to be in a safe environment where he wouldn't have to follow the additional rules is what should be done. Tele schooling needs to be the option for already crowded schools.
286	Access to challenging curriculum with teacher guidance.
287	This is a year like none other and for all staff and families to try to understand and go into the year with an open mind and heart will be critical.

288	If they choose online, they need to think about the fact that only 1 chromebook is issued per family. I myself have 2 biological kids starting next year, but I also have 3 step kids. So they share 1 chromebook with 4 kids this school year but next year,all 5 will share 1. Work will never get completed
289	Thank you for all you do to support our kids...

291	I think instilling new routines such as consistent hand washing (before and after eating), coughing in elbows, using tissue to blow nose followed by washing hands, etc. I realize this is time consuming but important health skills/knowledge for children. Also maintaining personal space.
292	I feel it is important for all students and families to be taken care of and have precautions during this time. My son is special needs and absolutely needs one on one interactions to learn but at the same time he is unable to keep a mask on, so what will be the exceptions? How are parents to return to work if at the same time they have to be the teachers here at home and transportation to and from school? Some of us have had a difficult time financially doing this...
293	Education is the key to success. We need to provide our kids the proper and needed education in order for them to have a brighter future. This will start by simply following the rule, like wearing mask, social distancing, etc..
294	All students will not be on the same level. Not all kids can get the same understanding of work without any in person teaching. Some kids may be behind.
295	I know this is challenging and unprecedented. I think you for thinking through all the different parameters and figuring out how best to educate the kids in these difficult times.
296	Students need to have more face to face learning and be held more accountable for their work.
297	Don't put fear into our children. We understand it is important to stay healthy and follow state guidelines but allow the students to them to live and don't stress. No fear mongering.
298	I believe an online platform similar to those colleges use needs to be used if students are required to do any sort of distant learning. The multiple places that my students needed to go this past school year was not only unorganized, but extremely frustrating and resulted in many assignments being missed
299	Social interaction is what we miss most. How can we ensure students are keeping a safe distance?
300	The schools need to draw a line in the sand with the state. Look towards providing families of sick children with more options so they can work, but not send a sick child into a classroom. THAT IS THE PROBLEM, not healthy kids interacting normally at school. Wash hands, look at sanitary measures, but until there is support for parents of sick children, the schools will never be able to support kids properly again in the climate of we fear we live in.
301	Preschool special needs children need to be in the classroom with other students as much as possible. Social skills cannot be taught online... health and safety is a priority, but IEPs must be prioritized.

302	Students will be attending school with cloth face coverings from home, however the school should have disposable masks available for student use in the event the student loses their mask during the school day. If a student is not feeling well, and needs to be absent from school, the school should allow the student to continue lessons online from home without being marked ABSENT.
303	I am sad to say, I do not believe returning to school this fall is realistic. One can wish all you want, I mean I do, but I believe it will be a disaster because the kids will bring the virus home, which will infect the parents. Then the kids will have no parents for weeks or forever because they are too sick to care for their kids. Believe me I want my kids to go back to school, but the risk is too great. 304	My children had an extremely difficult time with remote learning, and the majority of the time and it quickly became impossible for me to manage all three and provide the support they need for remote learning.
305	The high school is overcrowded as it is. There will be limited space during passing periods and lunch.
306	Having the feeling of the normality of school. With having to wear face masks/social distance..I just want them to feel comfortable and not like they are trapped.
307	Children are better focused with an in school environment. Children are also more resilient to sickness than adults.
308	I vote for in person instruction as well as maybe a few days a week as a home school as part of the plan
309	I think the plan to turn to school this fall is a bad call on the school's part. The virus is still going to be around and some people aren't going to follow the health codes. You guys say it's because you know kids don't like it in their home, but what good is going to school if you have a chance of catching the virus and dying. Then the school getting sued, it's a slippery slope
310	Reasons stated above.
311	I feel my child has not been or will not be learning through online lessons. My son is special needs and needs that in class/ face to face interaction in order to learn. He is not able to sit in front of a computer screen for longer periods of time to do his interactions or lessons because he needs hand over hand methods on some things. Also how are parents supposed to work and stay home to teach their children, or transport their children to and from school?
312	Health and safety is important but children need to be in the classroom full time to get a proper education.
313	Please follow the American academy of Pediatrics guidelines issued June 25, 2020 regarding prioritization of in-person learning for children at school.
314	I'm not scared of getting sick or being around others.

315	I believe students should return to school in the fall with precautions in place. Not all parents can stay home to instruct their child due to work requirements. There needs to be a consistent schedule for kids of families where both parents need to be at work during the day.
316	I will not send my child to school if she has to wear a mask everyday for six-eight hours. If it's a few days a week with outdoor breaks with no mask and less kids overall, I think that's more reasonable.
317	My kids struggle with online as I know most of their friends did as well. They need to be back in school where they can actually be learning.
318	NO fans in stands for sports but let them play, including Cheer :)
319	Please challenge DOH and OSPI to review the knowns and science behind children spreading the virus. Schools should return to as normal as possible with extra sanitation as it did the last few weeks before being shut down.
320	Availability of making friends with all of the distancing rules.
321	With a changing world like we are living in, I feel that the schools need to adapt as well. Holding kids accountable to self teaching and existing testing seem unrealistic. If our kids continue to be secluded and confined away from their peers it would be good for the curriculum to acknowledge and support peer engagement.
322	Teachers "trying" to teach online. Most just posted assignments and then disappeared until the next week's assignments were posted. A real home school option needs to be provided.
323	This is more politically driven than science driven and our schools should open due to LACK of evidence that they need to close.
324	Teachers, staff and district to be on the same page and organized as possible. Too many websites, Apps, links made it confusing to determine what lessons were to be completed and when. Ms. Ellingson was fantastic and seemed to be more organized than other parents teachers I spoke with, so I am thankful. But would love to take this experience and learn from it to become more organized in the future to help us working parents out more.
325	I work as a noon Assistant at another elementary school. If we do the hybrid model, how am I going to continue to work on the days my daughter is home?
326	More consistent structure, expectations and feedback from instructors is needed. Also check-ins with missing work would be helpful until students really get comfortable with what is expected of them.
327	Is it possible to use a plexiglass shield at desks (resembling a mini cubicle) so masks/shields could be removed while sitting in seats in classroom?
328	Control the spread of the virus. More action by our government to impose restrictions.
329	It is critical for students engaged in sports and pursuing college opportunities be given the opportunity to continue training and competing. They can not lose opportunities because our county limits sports training while other counties and states allow them. It's already tough getting signed to a good college. Please find ways to ensure our good scholar/athletes continue to find ways to continue their pursuits past high school.

330	I have children with electronic addictions and found they were doing other things on their chrome books. It was very hard to try and monitor their work when I had 4 students and myself all doing school online. All of my students needed more time to do assignments than what the district required from families. I had to sacrifice my elementary student to doing just the required time because some of my other students were required to complete assignments and they went well beyond the required time.
331	The Google classroom was a wonderful platform, very organized and easy to use. It was a bit overwhelming having so many multiple subjects, especially trying to track things like PE and library.
332	We hope CKSD will provide homeschool parent support information or resources in an accessible way. Those of us willing and interested in homeschooling our children could provide relief to the schools by keeping our children home, and added support could top the scales for us.
333	Having enough staff onsite
334	My student will not be returning to elementary school this fall. We will be partnering with barker creek for at home learning. I'm not convinced any measures can be taken to prevent the spread of covid at school; there are simply too many people in a small room for that to be possible.
335	Get back to work and some normalcy
336	What happened if there is an outbreak? Does the entire school get shut down?
337	The kids are not going to follow the rules at first..not in a spiteful way. Just because they haven't seen their friends and will be excited. This is going to be so important for them to fight the urges to hug people, but it's going to happen. I just hope staff members and parents are ready to be their constant reminders of why things have to be this way. And have open communication about it.
338	This needs to be a partnership with students, family, the community to make this a safe transition back to school in the fall.
339	I like the OSPI emphasis on prioritizing in person instruction for elementary and special education kids. I hope that CKSD creates a plan that takes those priorities to heart.
340	I think all kids should be at school. They need the social along with the academics in the school buildings. There are others ways to protect the students without having to wear a face mask the entire time, like the plastic dividers between kids. The desks can be closer together, students can still communicate and see each other, and they won't be breathing in the bad air from wearing a mask all day.
341	While on-line learning was convenient and 'safe' I think the mental health of my students suffered from lack of personal interaction and instruction with peers and teachers. We they miss the community of school.
342	First of all, wash hands very often! When I volunteer, I barely saw kids washed hands right way, even before lunch. And I want every kids and staffs wear face covering at school. Also safety screen on all kids desks.

343	we believe student can return to school if the safety can be possible for them to go back to school
344	Don't jump the gun on going back because of pressure from parents.
345	The biggest loss is social interaction. All my kids have had. Hard time with this. Especially my kindergartner who has regressed socially. We look forward to getting to go back to school!
346	If sensitization products are needed I believe it should be added to the school list.
347	Keeping students engaged and interested. Also, I do not believe that total isolation is a healthy thing, our students need one another.
348	I believe student interaction no matter what is important as long as health requirements are being followed by everyone.
349	We experienced issues with teachers who were not willing to adapt their teaching style to the needs of the students. I.e math teacher refused to host any google classrooms or learning labs which are both hugely beneficial to students.
350	The children need school, parents need school, teachers need school, please reopen. I will volunteer to help sanitize if you get a plan
351	I don't see how returning is possible between the buses, parent traffic, and school schedules.
352	My daughter has cyclic neutropenia, which means every few weeks her body doesn't make part of her white blood cells to fight off infections and viruses like it should. Every February she has had to go to the ER with a high fever and viral infection. It is scary. Last February she had a fever of over 105, and they couldn't tell us what kind of virus she had. She also had viral pneumonia when she went to the ER too. She missed a few days of school and was put on antibiotics. Thank God she recovered. I am terrified if she returns to in-person instruction that she will end up in the hospital fighting off the virus. What will the schools do for immunocompromised children like her?
353	Thanks for your hard work.
354	Teachers NEED to post a weekly syllabus of things that will be required to do.
355	I hope that in wanting to safely return, that high attention and priority is still given to students having positive social interactions with one another. I fear the effects of a sterile environment on my children, both intellectually and emotionally. I know that teachers will do their best in this regard; I hope that will be supported at a higher level as well.
356	My concern is that my kids will not receive the social interaction, due to the new guidelines.
357	Would prefer a full online option. Knowing the challenges that the district and youth face with facilities I would be more comfortable with my son and daughter learning from home.
358	I have two middle school kids. It is important to our family that if there is a hybrid model that they both are attending school on the same days. I am a district teacher and unable to change my schedule. This is my biggest concern to make sure they are together and not on different schedules.
359	Please please please petition to change the mask guidance for young children.

360	I highly recommend adopting a college-like atmosphere for classes as they have been utilizing the distance learning system for many years. Consider a 1, 2, or 3 day/week schedule for each class with at least 1 week periods of homework.
361	I believe the socialization, consistent schedule and excellent teachers are so important for elementary aged children. The upcoming school year will be the last elementary school year for my daughter.
362	I hope in school learning can continue at least part time as being fully isolated was difficult for my daughter. Online gatherings were okay but not the same as being around friends.
363	Parents need easy access to class information. I never knew what assignments my kids had or if they did them.
364	The schools say they have best interest for the kids but want them to wear masks and take police away. I guess a child getting shot at school is less important than covid
365	Students tend to not have basic hygiene common sense. Will need a bathroom monitor to make sure hands are being washed and washed properly.
366	Catching up on learning
367	I really am concerned that many HS students will not comply with the mask requirements and some staff may not have time or decide it is t important to enforce it
368	I just miss the social aspect for the students and challenges.

373	Just patience and lots of disinfecting. Kids still need that social experience. We really hope they can return our kids miss their teachers and friends
374	You need to protect your older teachers and our students. How you can keep kids 6 ft apart is beyond me. Actual space is an issue. The lack of State testing is a concern also.
375	I have special needs children that need social interaction to practice social skills and special education. They can't get this from home and online learning.
376	Yes. During the time we have already had remote learning the student i work with was having really bad fits/ breaking down over either needing to do there work or not understanding it. I could tell that was not helping him properly learn what his teacher sent. I'm not sure if anyone else had issues with there kids likes this but if there was a way to allow the teachers the ability to help the students understand that this is still school and needs to be done/ remain calm and ask there parent/guardian for help properly like they would with there teacher. At least this was the hardest aspect with remote learning for me and him.

378	To make sure the pandemic is over. Or no vaccine no school.
379	My boys just moved here from Maryland, so they will basically have to adjust to a new school and in-person instruction. I wonder if there will be childcare available and how that will work as well for working parents?
380	There should be testing at the schools so if there is cause for concern we dont have to find a way to get it done.
381	A lot of students learn by watching the teachers mouths, is it possible for teachers to use the face shields or masks that have a clear plastic in the mouth portion? This will be very beneficial for students that might have a hard time hearing.
382	I'm concerned about the emotional part of going back to school. My son is already nervous about going to KSS as a 6th grader. My daughter is a very social person and misses her school friendships. She will be going into the 2nd grade and I'm concerned about how all these precautions will effect her social and emotional state of being. I am concerned about a rotating school schedule for both of my kids. My wife and I work full time and childcare is a struggle for us.
383	This may be redundant, However, for many families not comfortable sending their children back to school, an online learning is what we find fitting for now. Thanks so much!
384	The home options were very difficult for essential parents. It has to be supported more by teachers and less by the parents.
385	What is the districts plan for snacking, drinking, and lunch time for our kids? They cannot have this taken from them so how does the district plan on keeping contamination as low as possible.
386	How are you protecting kids with special needs?
387	If students are not allowed back in school in the fall or if there is a hybrid learning format, the teachers need to prepare relevant lesson plans instead of checking in with students a few times a week. This past spring quarter, I spent more time reading extremely long emails from teachers than actually having my daughter engaged in learning. Additionally, other school districts in WA and around the country figured out how to provide relevant learning content during spring quarter and CKSD is still trying to figure it out. I'm disappointed!

397	It would be nice to have Adequate time to prepare for the changes that will be coming. When will be know what school will look like?
398	There has to be options to print out class work instead of straight on the computer! It's nonsense to put a time limit on a subject while doing it on a computer as well as trying to navigate a page. Things take longer for us on a computer and we usually end up on the computer for much longer than we would like. It's so draining for both mom and child. Packets and print out option please!!!!!!
399	Have better communication between student and teacher
400	We do not like online or at home school
401	As much as I would love for my girls to be able to be back in school for the fall here are my concerns. First would be how would they determine how many students to a class? Would they have to hire more teachers? How would social distancing for kids apply? The reason why they go to school is to learn and also to be able to socialize with students in their class. Would this be a burden to the teachers since they would have to keep an eye on the kids. Another concern would be will the kids be wearing their face mass properly? Giving parents the option to do just remote learning at home. I'm concerned now especially with the rising case of this virus.

402	Make sure the guidelines are followed from the state and try to get the students back in class since the online school is a joke.
403	Please do not enforce the face coverings for elementary. Please make it optional. Please figure out a way for my daughter to feel safe and normal. I am worried for her psychological health and the lifelong impact these guidelines will have on her.

416	For our student, playing the violin in the orchestra is her most motivating factor for school. We hope you've put real thought into how to continue the outstanding music program that Olympic high school has.
417	I think a hybrid should be offered. Core classes online and electives and classes that students need extra help in person in order to make smaller class sizes. Then split those into am classes and pm classes. Ex: high school student A has am PE, orchestra, and science then does pm online. Student B does online in the am and has pm classes.
418	I would like to see a parent orientation night so that everyone completely understands the expectation of teachers, parents and students for the upcoming school year- in person or zoom meeting.
419	I would like to add that kids will lose their masks, forget them, take them off in crowded places to eat and other close activities, and some kids just won't listen in general. Look at just the cafeteria and bathroom hygiene from last year; do you really expect to see a significant change in that the following year? A lot of kids (in all grades) don't and won't take it seriously and will do gross things on purpose, like germs didn't exist before this. So can you really trust thousands of students to ALL listen to the rules when they didn't beforehand? Some kids don't even know how to wash there hands.

422	If virtual class is part of the curriculum for next year, I would love to see teachers teach a lesson instead of review what the kids have already done at home. Also virtual meets are hard for kids that have sensory sensitivities. My child had a hard time bc so many kids were talking at once. He would mute it and only participate when he was called on. He was not engaged and often asked to skip the meets. A teacher did do a call about habitats and it was a smaller group which was better. I understand this was new to the teachers and us, as parent teachers. The school and teacher did a good job supporting and helping in such short notice.
423	Please consider pausing band and choir this year. I would not let my child participate because it's a known high risk situation.

424	<p>Again, I am concerned with social- emotional skills since the academics are good at CKHS. Will there be lunch? What will it be like? If NOT- then can more social time be built into lesson plans or advisory? I would be honored to be on an academic focus group. I will also nominate my (junior CKHS) daughter to help! She is looking to connect and give back within our new community. Technology has been age- appropriately integrated for her since kg. We just moved here from a high school (Jan 2020) that was teaching "reverse curriculum" and problem- based learning as well as traditional and hybrid models with lots of flexibility at the high school level- before Covid. The importance of personal relationships was an emphasis encompassing all of the social- emotional factors that affect student learning and equity. Students were to self- learn and use teachers as "coaches" rather than pedagogues. This process (self- learning, time management, scheduling, seeking help, communication...) was taught intentionally and is a valued life skill. This even allowed students to potentially find more current info and freed up teachers to help those who were struggling. There were regularly scheduled 1:1 mentoring and goal- setting appointments so each child was honored to be at the pace where they were in that moment. Class time was often MUCH shorter and 90-100% efficient. Teachers would video tape a lesson and model success in math (no mask!), for example, and then the students would do the homework and take a formative quiz (had to pass 70%+ or repeat the content). They could either move on to the next unit or schedule a consultation with the teacher to review the content. Before the summative test, a small group would often review with each other and/ or the teacher. In this model the goal was mastery of state benchmarks at a "c" or better. This is somewhat similar to the Pearson Connexus that CKHS uses. Labs were done in small groups by appointment. Students helped other students and grouped in small cohorts (6-10) of similar academic abilities which occurs naturally by the high school level. Many of these ideas could translate well to the Covid requirements. During spring of 2020 my daughter most missed people and (safe) interactions!</p>
425	<p>I would be in agreement with having students split their time between home and school. Also spacing out lunch times and or giving an option eat in class instead of in the lunch room. Having temp checks in the mornings before entering school, I would even be willing to volunteer.</p>

427	<p>If a hybrid is possible, parents need a safe place for their children who have aged out of childcare, but cannot be home alone. There are no "teen centers" that are available in the CKSD. Closest is in Bremerton.</p>
428	<p>As incoming PTA president for Clear Creek Elem, I would love to work on a way to hopefully provide masks for our students.</p>
429	<p>I would love as much as the rest of us to send the kids back to school. However, cases of Covid are rising and we are still learning so much about this awful virus. What is the rush? I understand there are circumstances that don't allow for ideal learning environments. 430	I work in a DLP classroom, and I don't think it's plausible to think we can keep masks on our classroom kids.

450	The masks are going to take focus away from teachers teaching. Kids will be kids and making them wear a mask will on cause problems, with both personal and health. Teachers will be busy making sure the kids keep them on instead of teaching
451	Though our family has been very happy with central kitsap we are leaning toward an online school for our children for the 20-21 school year. If CK can offer us an online curriculum we would appreciate it. I do believe if parents have the ability to keep their children home with a district approved and provided curriculum then they should "homeschool" to alleviate some stress by having less children on the premises at one time. We were very happy with the administration at both of our children's schools, however we felt that our son had more contact with his 3rd grade teacher than our daughter had with any of her teachers. (We understand the 3rd grade teacher had 20 students while middle school teachers had 60-100 students).
452	I believe our family is leaning towards online learning for our kids. If CK can offer that, it would be wonderful. If not, we may withdraw them and enroll through an alternative learning source.
453	Returning to school and physically being there is important to being a successful learner.
454	These measures will produce children who are sociopathic germaphobes. If the measures proposed are too draconian, we will become official homeschoolers and withdraws our children and encourage everyone in our circle of influence to do the same.

455	HS teachers need to be consistent in posting assignments, due dates, etc. There were too many Google classroom, Academy classrooms, etc that needed to be checked and rechecked daily to see if new info was posted, etc. If info was posted by X day at X time, then a kid could check once and then get started on their lessons for the week. Updates to assignments could be listed by X (mid week by X time.) No updates, a post still made stating that no updates at this time. Too many inconsistencies teacher by teacher...
456	Most families do not have the option to entertain anything other than opening schools under normal conditions. Most, also, do not have the capability to provide home support for distance learning. Many families that I've seen do not want to force their children to wear face masks due to the extra distractions. I understand the district is in a tough position right now but the best option is to return to school in a normal capacity.
457	All children deserve to have access to free and appropriate education in the least restrictive environment. Masks, social distancing, removing music/choir and changing the entire environment just adds to the unnecessary fear and toxic stress. Trauma informed education should be the goal - not add more trauma to education.
458	Parents who share custody and don't agree on sending the kids to a school environment somehow have to suck it up or go through litigation to have a voice in their child's safety. Shameful! Don't force parents against each other like this. Kids should be safe.
459	I honestly am worried about the number of students' parents who are stating they will find a way to make sure their students do not have to wear a mask. Medically speaking, there are a very small number of reasons why a mask cannot be worn. Developmental delay, frequent panic attacks, schizophrenia/significant mental illness are the most frequent ones. Asthma, anxiety, PTSD are not considered reasons for an exemption. As a medical professional, I strongly urge you to help these students find an alternative way to be taught outside of the traditional in-person schooling if they refuse to wear a mask.
460	Please allow options for families that are concerned about sending their kids to a school environment that although may be more safe physically but may be more damaging mentally. Also a decision sooner rather than later would give families ample time to think about the options and make the best decisions.
461	It will be helpful if a decision is made soon on how the school year will look so parents can plan accordingly.
462	Smaller class sizes and no masks
463	I am deeply concerned about performing arts and sports. 483	While I do not have kids with special needs, those children are going to suffer the most. Parents cannot stop working to assist their kids online learning...mortgage and rent still has to be paid. Asking parents to choose between home education and providing for their family is ridiculous. We are a dual military family. I will deploy before the beginning of the school year leaving my husband alone to his military career and potentially "home/internet" schooling our 4 children. No one wins in this scenario.
484	I think the hybrid would be a good way to go honestly.. But i think it needs mostly geared to the seniors so that they can get the support they need to graduate. And be able to walk in a graduation ceremony. It was truly heartbreaking to see this year seniors go through what they did

535	Share plan Online plan ahead of time if school is closed due to outbreak of COVID 19.
536	Lower class sizes, sanitize children, restrict items being brought in, have uniforms or disposable clothing covers at the school for kids to change into when arriving, adjust restrictions for face masks.

539	I believe that kids need the structure of school and the Academic support Of the school staff in person.this online learning is not the same.
540	Clear communication, at least as much as possible with the state regulation changes. Parents will do their best. I feel it's crucial to have in person school due to the families where both parents have to work. Most families cannot financially support one parent staying home.
541	Maybe more of a suggestion for online learning - elementary- teachers can stream a small group of kids at a time (evenly) - they go over lessons, etc. that group gets offline and does their work for the day. Next group of kids ... Same concept for middle/high schoolers. They can stream their teachers during whatever schedule (keep it how it is now). Kids can be graded on the same stuff - participation, understanding, tests, etc.

547	If children are not able to return to school or are only able to partially return I would like to option to have physical copies of school work. It is a lot easier to help my young child with a physical copy. To turn these in daily I am open to the idea of taking a picture of the completed work and emailing it to the teacher or turning it in weekly. Also my child is in a home with two working parents and has been in childcare the whole quarantine period. It feel like the amount of time required to complete school work did not reflect that some children are in this scenario and need help every step of the way. I was not able to keep up to date with the homework and also feel like my child did not benefit from the online work.

552	I'm concerned about the fall schedule, as this affects my ability to find a new job and still be able to drive my student to school and be available for on-line learning support (special needs student).
553	I believe flexibility for families is key for everyone to feel safe and accommodated.
554	Have really strong plans, and tools, for these is mental health.
555	I don't feel all children can learn from a online only program. Children need to be educated in person by qualified teachers.
556	I'm concerned of maintaining the proper cleanliness and kids not following the PPE rules and maintaining their own proper hygiene.
557	I think you guys are on top of it! I know not everyone will be happy. Good luck!
558	I think another important thing that we can do is stress hand washing. Little kids rush to the bathroom and then rush back to class without washing their hands.
559	I'm just concerned what the school day will look like for kids, whether that's shorter In-class instruction, or no recess. It's hard for kids to really wrap their heads around what's currently happening in the world.

564	We are out of district and drive our child every day. We moved her districts because CK is known to bring opportunity and success. If school does not return back to a normal schedule there is not point in me driving across town for a hybrid schedule for a couple hours a day a few days a week.
565	If school remains online, daily attendance should be assessed so older students are accountable. Without this my student was checked out a bit.
566	I'm worried about the increase of COVID-19 numbers with kids going back to school and my kids getting exposed to or contracting the virus.
567	We really need to look at how to support the student holistically. Families are struggling and cannot bear the brunt of taking on all the teaching while trying to keep a family afloat. It is too much for them to do it all.
568	They challenging way too breath with a cover over face. How will they do during outside? Obviously they have to take mask off during lunch. Is this really protecting the children's health and well-being or setting them up for future illness?

569	As a parent of a K and 1st grade student, I worry about them missing out on the social interaction and development. I also worry about the anxiety level with all the precautions. It seems unrealistic for such young children. I hope there will be compassion and patience with them.
570	Both parents work full time and need a schedule for our children/family and a return to normal instruction.

572	I definitely believe that everyone's health and safety come first and I do understand that there are multi-generational homes that become more at risk. Should students be in contact with the virus and bring it home. That being said, I also think that if we never expose ourselves to any kind of germs that our bodies will never be able to fight anything that comes down the line because that is how the immune system works.

We will have four children in school next year and even with one Chromebook and our home computer, that would be difficult for our family. Our middle schooler has more work so it was not possible for the other kids to use her computer. We made it work with two kids sharing our home computer, but I don't think we can manage with three on the same computer. If the district can't issue extra computers (I would understand if that's an issue due to budgeting) could you please let us know that as early as possible so that we can look into buying a Chromebook?

597	Please take in consideration children with severe food allergies and addressing food brought into areas where food is not usually brought. Also, I am very worried about my child transitioning into middle school this year and not having any preparation due to the circumstances. There has been very little information given to parents regarding this process. I just question whether or not it is realistic sending children to school wearing masks and trying to have them social distance.
598	My son only got one sentence of feedback from any of his middle school teachers. We had him do all the projects, essays, activities, and he even created a video. 602	I think any way to return to more normality is paramount, not wearing masks if we can find ANY way to provide breaks, recess for elementary students (countless studies on the importance of this), social time to try to make up for list skills in this area, and LOTS of written instruction because hearing someone talking through a mask with no visual cues is difficult and not engaging.

659	<p>It's fine that the school district is making an effort to be proactive about sanitizing the school throughout the day. BUT! It is absolutely RIDICULOUS that kids will sit 6 feet apart and be required to wear masks in school. The University of WA maintains that this virus, Covid-19, has been going around WA state since August of 2019. My entire family had very mild symptoms in late February / early March and my BOTH my kids went to school when they would have been contagious, unbeknownst to us. When we asked our doctors office if we could be tested to see if we'd had it, they told us to stay away from hospitals and quarantine at home until symptoms were gone, even though I, personally, had had *direct contact* with someone from my church -- someone I share a microphone with on stage -- who had been officially diagnosed with Covid-19, who also had extremely mild symptoms... and she was over 50 and had type 2 diabetes. (She's doing well, by the way and fully recovered in early March.) It is RIDICULOUS to assume everyone in school has a weak immune system and/or lives with someone who has a weak immune system. There is NO reason to quarantine the healthy. ONLY those who are scared of getting the virus and those who live with or have a weakened immune system should continue to remain home for their schooling. Students and their families, those who have already had the virus and/or those who have normal immune systems (as is the majority of humans - 90% of us) need to be allowed to go back to school, like normal. If required, fine, let the kids wear face masks. But don't be surprised if my kids come to school with see-through masks, as we've already had this disease and have built up antibodies to it. 663	<p>Behavior is really my biggest concern. Our kindergarten students have been so challenging these last few years. The COVID-19 measures will make it so much MORE challenging to develop relationships with kids. They are going to be so stressed out by all of it. How can we help them without getting close to them? We keep saying the focus is on SEL...but we need concrete plans and systems for helping our struggling students.</p>

664	We are both teachers--we know this is hard. I think first and foremost is clarifying the most important ways to limit spread--do they need to be 6' away if they are all wearing masks? This will affect much. Second--how do we get FOX news watching parents to support mask wearing/science so that as a Silverdale/CK society, we are all on board, helping us to stay in school. I think education/information sharing is almost as important for our parent population as sanitizing buses, for example. 668	Please see above. I come from West Virginia and poor counties there are delivering online teaching. I have friends there who are teachers and administrators and they are making do with what they have and for the few who don't have access they are working in other ways to catch them up - not holding the rest back. CK has used this as an excuse to not deliver anything? What a horrible response from CK. Parents are upset but afraid to speak their mind. Go back and take a sample of what your teachers delivered. A few were outstanding! A big thanks to them but many were not. Have some oversight.

689	I don't see how limiting kids in classroom learning decreases the likelihood of contracting the virus. With working parents, these children are going to have to go to daycare on the days they aren't in the classroom. This is exposing them to more/different kids then they are exposed to in their class. So the likelihood of them bringing back germs from daycare back into the classroom on the day they have in-class learning increases, so in fact you are complicating the tracing of the disease if one should catch it.

705	I believe small open houses would be very beneficial to help students see and learn how school will operate and how classrooms will be set up. I'm concerned my child will be completely unwilling to go to class if she's not able to meet the teacher and/or other kid beforehand with a support person (such as parent or grandparent) with her. 732	<p>To accommodate all students next fall, students can log in at their allotted time for each class and watch the classroom presentation. With students logging in from home and in person, if a student was ill, they could see the lecture later recorded in the online classroom. The teachers waivered between "Meh, whatever" to "OMG how much more are you going to pile on?"</p> <p>We never knew when communication was going to happen. Some teachers were horrible at responding. Some teachers were sending correspondence in the middle of the night. Some teachers would give an assignment just hours before it was due. It was all over the map. I personally think where you give each MS & HS student a laptop the teachers should have had daily check ins and live chats with their classes during their normal class hours. 760	Most of the parents are not able to focus nor provide a full time support for online learning because everyone has a job. The parent and student will struggle in distance learning.
761	Kids need schools, place to learn social skills, even if for 1/2 day in-school instruction and 1/2 day online to allow for social distancing.
762	I want my son to be at school, but I don't think it is healthy to wear face coverings all day. In addition. How do you interact with HEARING IMPAIRED individuals? This is a very real issue for them right now.

770	Offer an online/in person hybrid schedule...then have the students attend different times/days for classroom and the rest online
771	I know not only my kids but I am sure there will be others who will have a rough time with masks....can we have someone show different types of masks and techniques to help others come up with a solution for there kids?
772	We have no support network and both parents work full time. If the students are sent back part time and the teachers are sent back full time, it creates a transportation problem for us that we do not know how to solve.
773	I am concerned that the extreme divisive nature of our community and society over topics like wearing masks will spill over into the high schools. You cannot force teens to do what is best for all at times. So how do we assure our daughter is safe to attend?
774	Our kids are not going to want to go to school and wear a mask all day long. How would they eat lunch? They would have to take the mask off to eat and that defeats the purpose.
775	(In-person) Restructuring access to classrooms, office, bathrooms, lockers, cafeteria, and hallways as a whole.
776	My kids need socialization and physical education with their peers. The 3 months of "stay at home" took a toll on their mental health. I want to send them back to school mostly because I want them around real live people again. But I'm worried the requirements from top down will really negatively impact the learning environment.
777	West Sound Academy in Poulsbo, WA released part of their return to school model. I encourage you to view it so we can tip off of their ideas and be as cohesive as we can with education across our county. Their staff and board have already thought through safety and distancing models that are thoughtfully crafted. It was posted on their Facebook page this past week on June 16th.
778	Kids need more than just academics. They need to learn social/emotional skills and how to be successful in a classroom. Virtual school does not meet those needs.

779	My children will not be returning to school as long as face coverings are a requirement. 2 of my children have asthma and already have a hard time breathing. One of my children has Sensory Processing Disorder and will completely lose his mind if he has to put an elastic band of a string around his head or ears. 785	Since this is my daughter's Senior year, I hope and pray it will be as "normal" as it can be with the regular senior events happening - prom, senior trip, graduation, etc.
786	We love our schools and our district. The current social situation seems to present scenarios that may be overwhelmingly difficult to manage for all involved. We know there are many doing their very best to solve this complex puzzle. We are at the place that we are also actively exploring all options for our kids to ensure that they can have the best learning experience for the next 6 months to a year. Normally that includes the beauty of them being connected to the rest of the community on a daily basis, but we are coming to grips with the idea that this may not really be an option in this next season.

787	In order for online/hybrid education to be effective, teachers MUST be connected to their student. Students need to be given the opportunity to meet in groups in platform that allows for group meetings. This will allow the student to also remain connected with their peers. Also outside learning as much as possible would be excellent. More outside playtime for younger grades. Double recess time (at least) for K-5. Most of these kids have not played with peers since last March - they need to learn how to get along and socialize again.

793	I can't imagine what you are up against, I hope the community is supportive and understanding as we attempt a new normal. I really appreciate all of the work that is being done to make this work. I am concerned for the anxieties of the kids, coming back after so long, and a possibility of going back to home learning at any time. Trying to adjust, just to have another change. I'm hoping there is more support staff to help with the gap in learning as well as the social issues, mental health issues and home problems that may have greatly worsened since all this started. I know it isn't the schools job to fix everything, but I imagine you are going to see a lot of additional issues with the students coming back
794	being prepared if things change quickly and schools have to close again, being ready to quickly make changes and adapt

795	Need a consistent schedule. Need teacher face time & accountability. Need Parent Connect to be prominent on home page of website.
796	The facilities should also be addressed. Lunches should be brought in ready made to avoid lines. Turn off drinking fountains. Evaluate the HVAC systems. If possible install HEPA filters if not already installed. Evaluate common areas for use and limit use to a small number at a time. Limit use of paper and close library. Use electronic texts. Strict enforcement of no sharing materials. Teachers have education in teaching, so bring in some engineers and virus experts for changes to facilities. If sports are provided, only have an audience during phase 4. Otherwise video the games and play on public access TV, youtube, or similar. The school will need at a nurse. We need to know what kind of an impact the new school schedule will have on our jobs. We can't plan until the district has a plan.
799	My straight A student completely shut down this spring. He went into a depression and it was very difficult getting him to want to do his school work. The emotional impact taking all things that make him him was very glaring. Hopefully that won't be the case in the fall, but I am worried about things he likes to do not happening, like choir and acting.
800	Return to school as NORMAL. Covid poses minimal threat to most, especially our children. But the trauma of isolation and limiting all of their social/emotional outlets will have lasting consequences.
801	I get that student health is important, but so is their education. I think this spring showed us distance learning did not work well at all, and I feel kids will just continue to fall further behind if it's attempted again this fall.
802	The plan needs to be released before August. If rotating schedules are going to happen, parents need time to find child care. This is the most stressful part about the school reopening— the uncertainty with childcare.
803	I think that he's not doing well in Math, he can't grasp all the internet learning through Redbird.
804	public safety is more important than in person instruction.

806	I am concerned about the health of teachers/staff. Also I am concerned that parents who are anti-face covering will undermine student compliance at school.

I am concerned that PE, Music, Band, Orchestra, and recess will not be allowed, which are also vital for student growth and health. I believe that Google Meets should be mandatory and at least twice a week, and should incorporate at variety of uses, i.e. directing a lesson, book discussion, small group instruction, and just simply chatting with classmates.

826	Concerned with student emotional and community growth if too much distant learning is the norm.
827	I honestly don't believe kids are going to comply with the social distancing measures and as a result, may be the catalyst for an outbreak of the virus. I also believe that parents of high school students should be given more information about the assignments that are due from the teachers. A weekly summary of what is due would be nice. I had to rely on Powerschool reports of bad grades due to missing work in order to be able to tell what my daughter was supposed to be doing. I had no involvement nor insight into her school work at all. This was very frustrating as a parent.

Face masks should be avoided if at all possible. I do not agree with covering my child's face for over 30 hours per week. My child should have had 45 minutes a day yet it took us about 2 and 1/2 hours to complete these assignments. A friend's child should have had 1 1/2 hours and was being assigned 3 hours a day. I was aware of these time limits but other families were not. It's important that teachers respect these guidelines in order to not put unnecessary stress on families especially ones where parents are trying to work from home and crisis teach at the same time. I am also extremely worried about what my family will do for childcare if we have to go into a hybrid model. I don't know what options are out there for families who have two working parents.
948	I recommend adopting some sort of a cohort model for in-person classes. Having something along the lines of a track system where track A attends Mondays and Tuesdays at the school and then has online instruction Wed-Fri, allowing Wednesday to be a sanitation day and then having Track B at the school for in-person classes on Thursday and Friday would minimize contact for all students and staff. Further, consider eliminating in-person PE. Or at least, eliminate PE that involves close contact with others.
949	Homeschool has been incredibly challenging. Online learning is especially hard for kids with A.D.D, and for kids that would prefer to be on YouTube than on educational sites. I can only imagine how difficult it has been for families that are struggling and students with special needs.
950	Masks should be mandatory Temperature check and symptom screening should be in place for students to enter school each day Teachers should move between classes of students as much as possible to minimize contact cohorts, rather than students moving classes My concept of ideal format to maximize safety and instruction: 2 cohorts of students. One attends in morning. 3 classes. Learns all class and gets homework for the following day. Goes home for lunch and does their homework from the other classes in pm. Second cohort arrives after their lunch at home. Attends 3 afternoon classes then home. All kids would go to all 6 classes every other day and each class would get homework for the day they do not have in person instruction.
951	I would like to see more involvement from teachers and actually providing instruction instead of just writing email with list of tasks kids have to do.

952	While academics are the most important aspect of school, I have heard not mention of extra curricular activities. The social and athletic these activities teach are also important to students developing into adults. I am also concerned about children wearing masks all day. This is talking about 6+ hours of breathing through a cloth that will get nasty throughout the day and potentially lead to an increase in sick students (cold,flu)
953	I know the importance of wearing a mask, but hoping that they'll have a chance to take it off in intervals and breathe fresh air. I prefer more videos (of their teacher actually teaching) and feedback from teachers when they're learning and/ or refreshing a skill. It seems that the end of last school year, they were expected to learn from a video and not have real interactions with their teachers. If they do go back to online, I still your dad the teachers should do videos to teach and still be in constant contact with their students. Another thing is if they do go back to just online, they should post assignments early, instead of having the students keep checking back online all day for work.
954	I believe those who are not immune compromised should be able to attend and those who cannot have access to online homeschooling options
955	I don't think they should go back, there will be a second wave. We need to keep them home where they are safe!
956	Kids being together and interacting are so important
957	I do not like the idea of my kids being in a face covering all day.
958	I'm concerned that my kids will fall behind yet are missing out on social interactions, relationships and teacher/ student interactions. That being said being at higher risk I don't want my kids bringing home illnesses or getting sick themselves.
959	Weekly communication from each teacher to the parent about what is expected during the following week and was assignments were missing the previous week. I would like know where sanitizer will be available for each kid or classroom. I would like to know about bus disinfectant rules. I would also like their to be rules about mask like ensuring there is no mask with decoration that changes colors if you touch it. I think this is unsanitary to play with. I think each kid should be provided with a chromebook. Teaching my kids is no problem with guidance the only thing I'm concerned about is how to be financially stable if they are home for another year.
960	I'm ALL for a modified school schedule. I hope there is at least some face to face time.
961	Reasonable expectations on teachers. Reasonable expectations of this online learning, there is no supporting evidence to suggest online learning is as effective as in person for young children.
962	I'm concerned about spacing during meal times and band/music. Also concerned about parents keeping kids home when they are sick.
963	How is it safe for students to wear masks 8 hours a day ? How will they stay 6 feet apart in a class of 30 to 40 students ? How will the bus which is already packed work ??
964	Hopefully time is spent working with kids making sure they don't fall behind and insuring that the students are helped to get caught up if necessary.

965	Basically it is wrong to force young children to wear a mask, I will not send my child to school when he can barely keep it on for 10 minutes before having a hard time with breathing in it.
966	I am satisfied with alternate days for in person classes. I am curious how choir will be offered. I would like to see student credit for exercise they get outside school. PE is also going to be a challenge. Getting all the credits to graduate may need to be adjusted.
967	To be as upfront and honest to our families as possible. To make it doable for all... students, families and staff. Thank you.
968	Despite our low cases in Kitsap, it is not safe for schools to resume in person in the fall. You cannot control who students and staff interact with outside of school, increasing the risk when coming back to school, possibly with symptoms that haven't shown up yet, while infecting other kids.
969	Kids need to get back to some normalcy! If the rest of life cannot be then school should be!!!
970	STUDENTS NEED SOCIAL INTERACTION AND "PLAY TIME" !!!!

972	I suggest an ABC/XYZ schedule. Half students attend on ABC days & the other on XYZ. This will allow all students to have interaction with teachers & friends. Work would still be remotely on days not in school, but would help with student accountability.
973	My child's education is very important as homeschooling isn't an option for us.
974	sports? What is happening to sports and how can we do more this summer to be ready for fall season
975	Thank you for working so hard to figure out how to keep us all safe. We all know it isn't easy, and there will be pushback regardless of the course that is eventually chosen. Thank you for trying to figure this all out.
976	Look up the health concerns on breathing too much Co2 when wearing face masks...this cannot be the norm.
977	Each individual school should share their clear and concise guidelines before school starts so parents are prepared and can help prepare students. Each teacher needs to contact parents with clear classroom guidelines and how they intend to encourage safe practices with students.
978	Myself and my husband are both essential. It's very difficult to keep both of my children on task, keep the toddler away, and show up for every zoom meeting etc. I hope there's a safe way my children can attend because it became a lot for us at home, as I'm sure it did others
979	Focusing on core classes I believe are most important at this time until they can return to school full time. I am grateful for electives but unless there is a better platform to do them it is very difficult.
980	If any form of online learning the district needs to be consistent with grading requirements and hold teachers to those requirements.
981	Paper options for elementary

982	Thank you for all you do and for asking us for feedback. I know this isn't easy and you can't please everyone. You are appreciated.
983	I think structure is very important for children so a set schedule and set of expectations each week is important (in reference to online learning). I don't believe the way instruction was done for the spring helped the children learn—it was just repeat material or not challenging. We need an environment where the teachers teach (live virtual classes perhaps) if doing at home learning.
984	I know you said that face coverings will be mandatory. What if a child refuses to wear one? What about repeat violators of the rules? Staff at CKMS is not sufficient to ensure everyone is adhering to the rules. How are they going to wear a mask during PE or band or choir? Too many variables without any sort of plan in place.
985	Spring 2020 at home learning was sink or swim. Some students and families swam, some sank. The grading was very forgiving. While this was appropriate for the crisis, this is not going to be sustainable. Grading will have to be more objective and merit based, teachers will have to be more clear in their goals and perhaps less voluminous with their assignments. Students will need routine, set expectations, teacher /tutor support, technical support, feedback, collaborative interaction, and a host of things that cannot be accomplished online or at home for all students (sport, art, band, labs, etc.)
986	I think if students are going back part-time families with multiple children should be on the same schedule.
987	Let's be safe but not over react. Things were a bit overblown in my opinion. I would really love for the district to find a way for the kids to still be able to participate in some kind of sports. The physical activity is so important plus it makes for better performance academically.
988	Parents who need to work and students who need instruction by an educator every day
989	If students are unable to return in person, much better engagement with teachers is essential. Also, teacher-parent communication would be important.
990	My only concern about face coverings in school is that they could be a safety issue if there was any sort of emergency on campus that required identification of students. Safety from crime or violent acts is my only concern about face coverings in the school setting.
991	I currently take online classes for college, with little to no interaction from teachers and it is my least favorite way of learning as I am basically just learning from reading a textbook. I hope this same style of learning will not be what my kids have to endure in the fall. I don't learn nearly as well as I used to in a traditional classroom, because of lack of teacher support.
992	I want my child to be reasonably safe from contracting diseases, but still be comfortable in school and not have to focus on excessive requirements that detract from the school experience (social, educational, etc.). Increased hand washing, disinfecting, and screening of sick children seems reasonable to me. Wearing face masks and keeping children six feet apart seems like an impossible task and a distraction.

993	Please be more thoughtful of dual essential personnel. Online schooling does not work at specific times, because the Navy daycare does not have access to these systems. Prefer home packets!!
994	Science shows masks are doing more harm than good.
995	I do not want the district making children feel guilty or that they are jeopardizing others by not wearing a mask. Masks will not stop COVID19. I will pull my student out of the district if he is made to feel like that.
996	Childcare
997	With a two parent working household, the 9 hour day ends, dinner is then prepared and cleaned and then parents have to start the next "job" of turning into a teacher. Kids are miserable, parents are equally as miserable.
998	I worry that the continuation of remote learning and isolation would have a very negative impact on the mental health of a great number of students.
999	I think each school should have flexibility. They will need to discover and implement which method and practices work best for their population.
1000	Just a better remote/distance learning plan especially for the non-techie teachers.
1001	it seems the amount of participation in remote learning in high school was very minimal. Teens need social interaction, adult instruction, continuous feedback and correction which is in person education and not online learning. Just because they don't need daycare doesn't mean they don't need in person instruction. I feel online instruction isn't preparing my student for college if presented the way it was this spring.
1002	Give the kids letter grades based on performance not on some arbitrary thoughts and numbers SPI made up. Stop penalizing kids that are doing their work and rewarding kids who could care less.
1003	K-1 students may benefit from 1/2 day at school and then some on-line learning. Expecting our K-1 students to social distance and wear a mask all day is to much to ask of 5 and 6 year olds. Please consider age appropriate school days for our 5 and 6 year olds!
1004	My foremost concern is health and safety of everyone from teachers to all the students. If my student can return to in person school without risking her health and the health of everyone around her, that would be great. Otherwise, I am still comfortable with distance learning.
1005	Online education needs far more teacher led interaction than it had this spring, everyday they should get some feedback or direction from the teacher face to face on the screen. This can be small groups or whole class, but they need more interaction. Like a morning meeting that sets them on track for the day or helps them with self paced weekly goals etc...
1006	I had just brought up the question of testing for my student to determine if an IEP is required. I hope this can happen over the summer.
1007	I am very nervous about consequences of having 6 year olds where masks all day and any punishments that will happen if the child can not comply.
1008	Stand against these over reaching standards being set that are not backed by real substantial data.

1009	Flexibility of rules is desirable.
1010	IF remote learning is a requirement, I highly recommend having only certain classes being taught online. MATH should NEVER be taught online. IF remote learning is required, then on "at home days" the students / teachers should show up to "class" in a scheduled online meeting (ie, zoom, etc) at the same time their in person class meets. If student / teacher does not show up to the online class at specified time, then they receive an absence. Several schools across the nation still held their classes each day (M-F) at their specified time, with 10-15 minutes between classes. Each teacher taught, each student engaged in group setting. THIS IS TEACHING! This is NOT what CKHS teachers did.
1011	Taking every kid's temperature before they even get on the bus, or at least before they set foot in the school. Hand sanitizer stations available everywhere Issue them face shields as they don't restrict breathing.
1012	I don't want school to be a scary place. My daughter has LOVED preschool and there were no restrictions at that time. I just don't want her to be scared. I want her to be in a classroom that's loving and safe for her. She is our first child in elementary school. We just want her to love it.
1013	It's ridiculous to return to school if they have to wear masks. We've all seen the lack of hygiene in middle school. This is not a solution. If masks are still required in public, then we should have the choice and stay home and healthy, but the teachers need to be teaching their classes and hosting times with video to teach all, then allowing open help time for rest of class time. They need to be testing with IS or Mr. Bachlund BEFORE they assign kids work they are blocked from doing. Don't give a website or app to do a project that a child can't access. Do you homework. They do. You should send out a separate request for contact info outside of survey. I want to be contacted, but surveys should be anonymous. This jeopardizes the results of a survey.
1014	Just wanting to share a heart felt 'Thank You' for everyone working on this challenging task.
1015	I am not concerned for my children's safety at the schools. I believe they are healthy and can handle viruses. I understand that there are other parents who feel opposite of that and I can respect their concerns. I feel that the school district can provide increased sanitization of the high touch surfaces in the schools like they were providing in February of this past school year, prior to the school closure. I do not want my students to have continued exposure to chemicals and would prefer handwashing stations with soap to chemical hand sanitizer. I believe that students at all levels are capable of helping with class and school cleaning and it could be a privilege to leave class early to help with sanitization of public areas or have class helpers to wipe desks etc. I also want to see a change in the phrase 'social distance' to something that more appropriately describes the safe physical distance that we are aiming to achieve i.e 'physical distancing' or 'healthy distance' or 'safety circle'. Being social is important to keep us mentally and emotionally healthy and we don't want the kids to think they can't be social in all the other ways besides being up close to someone physically. Working in groups also helps develop ideas and skills of cooperation.

1016	Only that online learning has helped my child in learning the material.
1017	Start slow home learning was difficult.
1018	I think it is important for the kids to return to school even if it is part time and part time in line. They need to socialize both with their friends and those they struggle getting along with... Life skills.
1019	Very clear instructions that the kids can understand would be great. An info graphic type thing would be great to have, to print out at home and remind kids what they'll need to do daily before school.
1020	Vaccine! People who don't believe this is real undermining our communities health and well-being is a big concern for me. Politicizing this is harmful and wrong. Protecting our kids needs to be at the forefront.
1021	Students need to feel safe but all the hype surrounding COVID is creating a lot of anxiety and emotional distress that the kids don't need. They need more emotional support and less emphasis on COVID19
1022	Schools needs more nurses to take temperatures. It shouldn't have to be a secretary. Also more custodians & kitchen staff.
1023	Make sure older children in middle schools schedule lines up with elementary school siblings schedule. Provide one chrome book per child instead of per family. Alternating between 3 kids took 5 to 6 hrs a day and is near impossible for full time working parents.
1024	Are you going to alter the transfer requests? If tons of kids from other schools and districts are making it hard to meet local kids' needs then I think transfers should be minimized. Also, there should be an "other" for question 3. I am most certainly not keeping my kids home because there's no vaccine. I will likely pull my kids and homeschool over having some or most of the week be online instruction.
1025	My children and both my husband and I have struggled very much with at home learning. I feel in person instruction is the best option for my children's education. At home learning was a traumatic and mainly frustrating time. I don't believe my kids benefited or gained anything during the closure which concerns me if the school were to close again. I know some things are out of our control but it seems unfair to the students for restaurants/stores to be open, not practicing any type of social distancing, yet schools are struggling to reopen or establish how in person instruction can continue in the fall. I feel education should be a priority over a store that sells furniture. I really hope the schools are able to figure out a plan that will work because it's breaking my heart watching my children struggle through things they would have gained from in person instruction.
1026	I feel that if we have to do hybrid classes teachers can make work packets for children to do on days out of classroom and create videos (via youtube, google, etc.) to provide further instructions if needed.
1027	Hoping our children don't have to wear face masks.
1028	Social and emotional needs of students... Sports, band/orchestra, and extracurricular activities play such a key role in their development. How and when will these be addressed?

1029	My child would rather work at home due to the changes of wearing a mask, social distancing and worry of getting COVID
1030	I might homeschool, but would still like my kids involved with elementary school. Can you offer classes like middle school and high school for homeschoolers to come for part of the day?
1031	Unless I'm positive it is safe, I'll probably be keeping my child home (like most of my neighbors are already planning to do)
1032	I don't feel comfortable sending my son back
1033	I think there should be an online only option for any student who wants it- at least until there is a safe, effective vaccine that is widely available.
1034	No
1035	I hope that there will still be an option for social interaction as that is so important!
1036	We need 100% in person learning. I do not believe my child will graduate with in home schooling.
1037	.
1038	Class sizes need to be limited along with limited students during passing periods. Possible clusters of students who stay between two rooms to help minimize exposure. A/B days if a hybrid model in which half the student body attends one day and the other half completes online work. Teachers who need to stay home due to personal/family reasons should be allowed to do the online portion of learning while other teachers can do the in person teaching.
1039	We receive wireless internet at our home but it is spotty at best. After several attempts at getting on to do coursework in the springtime I finally gave up. As well the projects that were asked of my child in the springtime were not reasonable and took way too much time.
1040	I'd be a fan of smaller classroom sizes on a rotating schedule. Half the class attends Mon and Wed, other half Tues and Thurs. Instruction would be more one on one and effective and we could lessen the number of hours required for school. Simplify! Schools are focusing less and less on reading, writing, and arithmetic and too much on non essential extras. They're taking over jobs parents should be doing. If schools would simplify and just do school instead of daycare, sex ed, etc, then parents would have to step it up and what kids need most are a good home with responsible parents. I know that's the ideal, but Schools do too much. Simplify and inspire kids!
1041	No
1042	I am concerned about my son being at home trying to do schoolwork on his own when I have to work. I am also concerned about him having to wear face masks all day. While I know they are supposed to help prevent the spread of COVID, I also don't feel they are beneficial for their respiratory health. I am also very concerned about the students not being able to have social interactions with each other. I feel like if my son is going to have to be home at all during the school year it would make more sense to just enroll him in a homeschooling model. I really appreciate you all for getting our input and taking it into consideration when making the decisions. I know this is not easy to navigate.

1043	I don't believe there needs to be so much coddling. These times can also be used as a means to encourage people to have fortitude and personal responsibility for themselves and their families. Life is hard for every single human for different reasons. Suck it up. Let's get back to school.
1044	Our young child is going to need as much consistency and predictability as possible. And a lot of academic support.
1045	I hope the district is more warm and connected with parents verses being quiet about information and only allowing one voice to be heard. It would have been nice to hear more from the school and principal. Parents should feel like part of the learning community, especially if we are asking parents to do more homeschooling next fall.
1046	I am in support of providing additional supplies to teachers to supplement cleaning needs.
1047	You run a great school district. I'm very happy with the education you give my children. Keep your morale up. We all need you!
1048	the virus is not bad at all. people need to stop being scared.
1049	Not stressing the kids out over the virus any more than they already are. Many children are now experiencing social anxiety because of the mandatory social distancing and a stressful environment is not conducive to learning.
1050	Have you done any research on how the 5g signals are extremely damaging to all living things? Let's talk about that
1051	We should be staying home until we know for sure this is under control. There are not enough eyes to ensure the students follow the rules.
1052	Will there be a month or so of catching the students who didn't complete all school work from the spring
1053	I am also concerned about a loss of interest in previous work/subjects/sports/extracurriculars or other things that kids had to miss out on during this time. I want mine to still want to participate, but the lack of engagement is showing that they are losing interest in old hobbies/activities.
1054	The kids must have time to have social interaction.
1055	some children need the classroom structure for success. I have one who is not a self starter. These past few months have been difficult to say the least.
1056	If limited bus service happens the pick up drop off waits are going to be insane! I would not put my kids on the bus unless they are socially distanced and all passengers are wearing face coverings. Had sanitizer available during the disembark would be a plus. I do not envy the state and district having to figure out the best way to make this work.
1057	If the only significant change the CK school district is planning on making is having staff & students wear masks, then you are woefully failing. What other options are being considered? What is being done to reduce the class sizes? What other alternatives are being considered? There needs to be more done to decrease the risk to staff & students besides simply having them wear face masks.

1058	That not all children learn the same. For my children, they had a difficult time completing their work because there was no instruction. It was read this and answer this. Some needed more help than others, so I feel like they may be behind as they return to school.
1059	Work schedules with unknown child schedule. Childcare issues, busses.
1060	As I mentioned I am concerned for my kids learning when we look at the possibility of at home learning. My husband and I both work full time. Having one of us try and switch to a night shift would be a hardship on everyone and all relationships in the household.
1061	What is important is that my son continue to receive higher education no matter what it takes. I realized my son did great with online instruction and required work than when he was in a classroom setting. He actually prefers to continue online school. I may consider home school if he is required to return.
1062	For our family a mix of in-person and online learning is going to really put a financial burden on us due to the rise of child care. I think there should be a program to offset those costs if our taxes are not paying for full time in person education.
1063	Hand sanitizers on walls in halls/ in classrooms and maybe additional, portable washing stations - I really think emphasis on hygiene is going to be the best approach. I'd hate for them to go back in the Fall, see half their peers, not be able to go to football games, have their desks situated 6ft. apart and with screens around them...I worry about what that'll do to these kids in the long run. It needs to look as "normal" as possible and if that means there's a hybrid approach - a mix of in-person and online - then I'd rather go that route. I will not feel comfortable sending my kids to school if they're expected to wear masks all day, everyday and discouraged from interacting with their peers. If so, I'd be more persuaded to have them home schooled at that point and get them enrolled in outside extracurriculars.
1064	Online/at home options are impossible for working parents. We would homeschool if it was an option, but we cannot afford to. It is pointless not to have students in-person at school if it simply means than now all the students will be gathered together in daycare instead of school. The proposed schedule to notify parents mid to late August is simply not reasonable. Our livelihoods depend on being able to make plans. If there will not be school, one of us may have to alter our career, and we need notice. Please at least release a Plan A, Plan B, Plan C now based on specific criteria so that we have an idea of the specifics of what is actually being considered.
1065	Our children will not return to full-time school until face coverings are no longer required. They will also not be getting the vaccine, so if that is a requirement to remove masks, they won't be coming back at all.
1066	High needs students don't get their needs met with distance learning.
1067	No actually we homeschooled or older children in the past. They did excellent they graduated from college in three years and they're productive citizens. Homeschooling will work a lot better than school with mask and teachers with mask which is very unhealthy all day.
1068	I wish we could have some kind of information about sports for next school year at some point.

1069	I believe it will be more risk for younger kids K-2 to attend school. Social distancing and wearing face mask is harder for younger ones to follow safely.
1070	No
1071	Face Masks are not going to be helpful. You have many students who will not wear them correctly and I believe that we have bigger issues to worry about than face masks. My son will struggle with a mask all day. Please take the time to think about the how this virus is really affecting the school age population and advocate for our children. I am so disappointed in how much our schools have let the media dictate their decisions. We do not have to follow OSPI guidelines.
1072	Schedule is as big a factor as anything for us. Getting a fixed schedule with as close to normal as possible. Schooling from home not only disrupts the work day, but is very difficult on the students.
1073	Have you read the APA article on returning to schools with " a golden age of play" to allow children to be children without an inappropriate focus on 'catching up' on academics. We first need to be successful in assessing the happiness and mental health of all students which well then impact their NIH
1074	I believe that it is important that children have some interaction with in class learning. Even if that means a partial day of in class education. I know that the Guidelines can be difficult for children to understand especially for the younger kids. I also understand that not every family has the same resources and will be able to provide these resources to their children. Some children in our community may not have access to resources that would be essential to online learning.
1075	I've got nothing. I just hope for a good turnout, in school or online.
1076	Hand hygiene and proper sneezing/coughing techniques need to be instilled. If you just plan to put face coverings on a bunch of children this will not help. They will constantly have their hands on their face due to the face mask. I wear a face mask over 12 hours a day at work, and it's hard for us adults to stand it but now we expect children to have this on for hours a day.
1077	It would be helpful to have an outline of assignments for each week (containing information from all classes). The multitude of separate Apps (different for each child) and different places to look for assignments was overwhelming. Ideally this can be streamlined into Google Classroom, with a front page for parent information for the week. Giving a week overview would better allow flexibility for families.
1078	There are still SO many question marks ... as a parent, but more importantly as a staff member of CKSD, I look forward to clear, executive plans as soon as possible to ensure success.

1079	Hybrid model: minimize days/time onsite with distance learning.Example: half days for Some grades/ kids or only come in for specialized classes. Spread out kids over day/ week to decrease numbers in building at anytime. Allow flexibility in model so families can choose what works for their family... Allow those that need to be at school building (special needs/ those who choose to be there) use it and allow others to learn from home to decrease numbers on the various campus. Most of all maintain face covering, distancing and cleaning protocols to decrease risk of virus transmission.
1080	Adults have a hard time following the mandated rules. I have a difficult time seeing how teachers and school staff will be able to manage keeping the children safe while managing their daily tasks of teaching the children at the same time.
1081	Normalcy is vest for returning to school.
1082	SPED students should also be required to wear masks.
1083	Keep learning the focal point of education. Teach our kids how to critically think not what they should think. Stress keeping hands clean and off faces. Masks can stay at home.
1084	Would like the option of online learning even if schools do reopen for in school learning.
1085	If online is the way they plan to return to school, more communication with teacher would be nice. Weekly or every two weeks giving parents an idea of what they student should be doing in the class to better help them stay in track.
1086	This years experiment provided very little education value. If that's the model we will withdraw our children from public school.
1087	If students keep with online learning, I hope that teachers learn to teach this way. I wasn't happy for the fact that I reached out to teachers in classes where my son wasn't performing. Teachers should reach out to the parents and not just the students
1088	More worried on special needs children. I have some attending school for prek and 3 rd grade and middle school. Have a kindergartener that will be his first time ever and very hyper active. Just wondering how they will they get them to wear a mask without bothering them
1089	it would be very upsetting to go back to school, and not get to talk and interact with my friends
1090	Safety
1091	I think there should be options for returning to school without repercussions or exclusions from Certain programs. For example, I am pregnant and was told to self isolate because I am in the high risk group. My kids are in the montessori program. If we are unable to come back to school in the fall because I am in the high risk group, I would hope my kids could still be in the montessori program or could come back the following year without being kicked out of the program.
1092	I wish I had good answers. I do feel strongly that schools should open, with special consideration to kids who don't have supportive home environments. Secondly to that, I want to see what will be decided to assist in the growth of kids with disabilities, as they heavily rely on school programs as well. Thank you for all you provide to the children of the community! Our first concern is everyone's health and safety.

1093	Parent and teacher communication needs to be better. Google classroom needs to be revamped. It was confusing and hard to keep up
1094	My child is a type 1 diabetic and I am extremely concerned that you guys want to start back in the fall.
1095	Let the kids return to 100% in person learning. They cannot be successful learning at home. No amount of online learning can substitute for face to face learning for elementary thru high school
1096	Teachers need support too! They are being asked to do so much more now. Planning lessons for separate groups of students with differing schedules and access to technology is simply asking too much. Hire more teachers, support staff and/or assign smaller groups of students to each teacher to manage. Provide childcare with tech access for all the children whose parents need to work during school hours.
1097	Healthy children should be allowed to attend school as usual. Kids who are sick or high risk/high risk family members should have online options. Speak up that these special guidelines are not practical and will cause more harm to more people. I have three children in the district and they will not be attending if masks are required. It's no way to live life for HEALTHY children.
1098	My daughter is an only child at home and really misses socializing with her peers!
1099	I would love for as much in-person instruction to occur as possible.
1100	I think it's important to allow students a recess time, but I'm concerned about my active little boy running and trying to breathe through a face mask.
1101	Flexibility and freedom are great in an emergency but the truth is the more curriculum and classes are prepared/scheduled the easier it is to convince a middle-school aged child that this is still important learning.
1102	Other parents allowing their children to attend school sick.
1103	I think we should just accept that students get sick. When they do keep individuals home. Every family has different comfort levels so providing options instead of a one size fits all may be the answer. Allow normal in person instruction for those that want it, provide OPTIONAL online learning for those who don't feel comfortable sending their kids to school. Please don't force the online learning.
1104	I am concerned my kids will be behind. Having the unplanned for online school this past spring made it feel like an extended summer. Harder to keep the kids motivated.
1105	Providing teachers with the appropriate disinfectants so they are not required to purchase their own supplies to keep their students healthy.
1106	In person is so important. They need to be social!
1107	For me it is the hand washing. I don't thing is was required enough this spring when COVID started to hit Kitsap.
1108	I am really struggling with sending my children to school in a mask and knowing they will be expected to keep socially distant from other staff and students. I feel this is a recipe for disaster.

1109	In the use of distance learning there was a lot to track. I watched my child have to open eight different browser windows to get to one assignment. There was nothing provided to parents on assignments, topics being covered, nothing that felt like I could help my student during this new process.
1110	It will be hard to make sure my students are doing all of their assignments the way it was set up last spring. I work full time and wasn't off. I and my husband aren't home to verify our High school students are doing the online meetings. Also I am concerned about kids going back to over crowded conditions and getting sick. I know the cleaning crew will do their best but I just don't think it is safe yet. I work at a clinic in town and we aren't running at full capacity yet. There are also sensitive populations that shouldn't be put in danger. I hope the online learning can be standardized and fixed so it can best be utilized until there is a vaccine to protect the kids
1111	These are unprecedented times. Not sure what else to say.... I know you are all working hard to help these kids. Thank you!
1112	Disinfecting and cleanliness
1113	Both parents work so I need them in school with transportation at least before school.
1114	School should provide both online and in house options based on student learning needs.
1115	better communication between district / teachers and students so that we don't have multiple google meets during the same time. Chemistry and Asl can't be in 2 classes at the same time.
1116	I want to ensure safety (vaccine) and adequate testing in our area.
1117	The social aspect that kids are going to miss if they aren't in school
1118	If we return to an A/B schedule, my child will still need full time childcare on days he is not in the classroom. I plan to sign up for Y kids before/after school program, but we will also need care for online learning days. Will Y kids still be in the building? If so, where?
1119	This is a challenging time for everyone. If the district decides to go hybrid or online, child care support will be needed for many parents to enable them to work. How will the district assist these people?
1120	Students need to be students. Please let them. They need social interaction, recess, sports, music, etc. please don't take away their childhood.
1121	Please let the kids come back to school. If needed use teacher's aides to have 2 groups in the classroom to help our kids. Please don't penalize our children's learning any longer by leaving them out or instituting online teaching.
1122	If students can't enjoy the social aspects of school it would be better to continue with some form of distance learning. Maybe a system where they went for a few hours on Monday to get their weeks work and get any help/tutoring they may need. They would return Friday to turn in their work and have the opportunity for help

1124	Allowing parents some leeway in making the best choices for their families. It's not appropriate to apply a one-size-fits-all mentality to anything human services related.
1125	We should be safe and cautious, but offer as much as possible. Also have a plan if we need to do a shutdown on short notice.
1126	I'm worried about physical education and recess. Time for them to play and socialize. My son needs more interpersonal skills and growth with other kids more than academics at this stage.
1127	Families and Parents must set the expectation of face coverings. While they're at school, it must then be enforced and have consequences. Parents can pick their child up from school if child refuses to follow rules. It's our responsibility.
1128	I think it will be challenging to maintain social distancing requirements unless the school limits the number of students per day. Schools will have to offer multiple staggered schedules.
1129	I know a lot of people are vocal about their disagreement when it comes to requiring students to wear masks. Please know that there are still a lot of us who understand you all are doing your best in an unprecedented situation, taking REASONABLE measures to protect the health of students and community members. My biggest concern is for students with disabilities/special needs; students who have food insecurity; students who are high risk for being victims of abuse/neglect; students who don't have emotional or learning support at home; and students who are otherwise disadvantaged and needing face-to-face support from educators the most. Please please please don't focus efforts on the "average" student (and I say this as the parent of average students), but focus energy on supporting the students who are likely suffering from this current crisis the most. We're so thankful to be part of this district as we believe it to be the best in the region, and I sincerely hope that CKSD continues to make us proud by serving the greatest needs among our students. If there are opportunities for parents to volunteer (from home, virtually, etc.) or otherwise support educators and students, please let me know.
1130	Online instruction is not preferred, but we will get through it.

1132	Nope
1133	To keep up open communication between the school and families in regards to properly returning to school for the safety of the staff and students.
1134	students need to not only be safe, they need to feel it. High school students watch the news, they know this virus is expected to be there unchecked by vaccine until sometime after January 2021
1135	We really need the kids to go to in person School but we also need to think about the fact that how many children are actually going to wear masks and is it going to be more harmful than good to send them back
1136	Removing the social growth aspect of school is going to be detrimental to students. We really need to consider what is reasonable and what is not especially with elementary aged children.
1137	Students must wear masks and wash hands before lunch and between classes.

1138	The WHO had already stated that asymptomatic people and surface areas are not a risk for COVID as previously thought. Our children should be allowed to gain herd immunity by attending school without face masks and social distancing. Living in a sterile environment will only further decrease their immunity and leave them susceptible to every new virus and bacteria that comes along
1139	I wish we could find a better way than face masks.
1140	Working full time is going to make homeschooling after work difficult.
1141	If schools do go back in person, I hope that sports where students are traveling to other schools and counties will not be happening. They would be having to ride the bus where you have shared air circulating, going to places where the covid count may be more as well as having those students and parents from other places coming to our school facilities. I feel like that would make numbers climb a lot more and although it makes me sad because my children do participate in high school sports, their health and wellness is more important. I also worry with schools starting up if they are in person that kids who are sick will still be at school. I know of several instances last year where parents sent their kids to school knowing they had a fever, one son in my daughters class brought her son knowing he might have strep throat until he was checked out to go to his doctors appointment at 1 (and was later determined he did). Hopefully temperatures will be taken at the door, but even that can be masked by parents giving Tylenol to their kids.
1142	Obviously, public health needs to be at the forefront. But a workable plan to provide quality education and one-on-one assistance is also important. Balancing the two may be tough and take some different approaches.
1143	I truly hope and believe returning to school this fall is the way to go. Children need that routine, interaction with teachers friends and a healthy learning environment without distractions at home.
1144	Children will not adhere to safety measures. Adults Will not sanitize well enough. Frustration and stress will be felt and cause for a very difficult learning environment. Worst case-our children will be exposed and some may not recover. As a parent of a high risk child-that is my greatest concern-is it worth the risk? I hope decisions by the leaders will be made based on what is right and not based on pressure from others. I have complete trust that the decision to return to in school learning will be made only if they can say the risk is minimal and worth it. I put my children in your hands.
1145	Physical education should not be done with masks on. How will speech services be done?
1146	Temp checks if in person. Live streams with chat at home. Access to materials the school might ordinarily provide.
1147	In school learning is better since it is more help then home
1148	Back to normal. There is more to a child's education then school work, but how to act in public and how to interact with others. Teachers need to be back in the classroom instructing students (their job), and parents supplement at home (our job). Don't let fear consume your judgement.

1150	hand sanitation stations in each room and outside for recess.
1151	If our school district decides that it cannot instruct all students in-person due to distancing requirements and such, how can those of us whose students would normally be the first to be told to work at home online (no IEP, good internet access and devices, no 504 plan, not a minority, etc.) make sure our student receives the necessary in-person instruction? Even though some of our students are not identified as requiring special education, many have not thrived during the online instruction and are falling behind both educationally and especially with social abilities. Our district has been adamant from the beginning that they will only provide instruction on an equitable basis, therefore, we are completely catering to a small minority of students and not providing the required education for the majority of our students. This was evident during the first three weeks of this stay-at-home order where our district did not provide any instruction to our students and then after that, it was barely educational. As a parent, a PTA President, a tax payer, and a community member, I have listened and found this is a problem for many families. We need to make sure all schools are accountable for the instruction and ALL students need to be given proper instruction!
1152	Ensuring I/educating on hand hygiene, screening kids prior to entering the building for any sick symptoms. Parents are likely to send a child to school sick due to them having to work and/or needing to work
1153	I worry that if there is a need to regularly tell the kids to remain 6 ft apart at all times, this will be more stressful to kids than not being in school at all. Socially distancing is a very difficult concept for young children, especially when they are around other children.
1154	Please put social and mental health as a priority, socially distanced interactions and communication with classmates and teachers over computer use.
1155	Perhaps a cadre of retired teachers could somehow be used to reinforce some kinds of learning at school, using all precautions. There is a great deal of knowledge out there in the community, if it can be tapped.
1156	I think it's important to make a decision regarding fall sports soon, so students can plan for whether they will play school or club in the fall.
1157	Many kids who don't learn well from a parent need someone who went to school to teach them. Also, kids with behavioral issues such as ODD will listen to a teacher but not a parent or caregiver for school.
1158	What if instead of the mask all students are required to wash hands and be screened for symptoms at the beginning of each school day?
1159	100 percent safe to do so.
1160	Probably very hard for students to adjust to social distancing.
1161	Clubs, sports, music, PE, Art, electives are huge positive motivators for students returning to school buildings this fall. The students really missed out on this in the spring. Most kept up with core course work but they'll need these areas for balanced mental health and motivation in their core subject areas.

1162	Concerns: 1. AP students, already feeling behind for 20/21 year. 2. Overcrowding in general already at CKHS & lunchtime 3. What happens when a student has to be quarantined due to a covid exposure while the rest of school carries on in building? 4. How will kids know what to do for High school & beyond plans - are these still a grad requirement? 5. Will filters on chromebooks be less strict to allow proper research & work completion - ie, AP capstone research, college related searches (scholarships, school pics, online tours)
1163	Face coverings need to be optional NOT mandatory! There is no way that they will wear them all day in an in school setting nor will I be productive for them to be getting in trouble for this.
1164	What scientific evidence supports wearing face coverings in such close quarters? The newest information i have read was that a face cover does not help inside 6 feet and doesn't necessarily prevent the spread. It would be better to continue hygiene education and require all students and faculty to work from home or take time off if they start to get sick.
1165	The at home learning experience was difficult for my son. Both parents were still working (essential employees) so we had no time to manage him and his progress. I don't feel that the teacher management was enough. I also had a difficult time checking on whether he submitted assignments, as most classes were not posting anything in PowerSchool. If it wasn't for 2 teachers sending weekly emails advising what my student was missing I would have had no idea.
1166	Face masks aren't safe for children as they cannot safely process the amount of carbon they are being exposed to. I am more concerned with violence towards children and the new Mandatory sexuality education our Governor passed through.
1167	I think every avenue should be pursued to have kids be full time at school. It was a challenge for us in the spring, and I don't see how most families will be able to accommodate a hybrid or online model. What if both parent's work? Or our single parents?
1168	Maybe bring back portables to accommodate the social distancing requirements.
1169	If you will be isolating children, constantly taking their temperature, and masking them, I will pull them out. I will homeschool and I WILL NOT do it through the district so the district will NOT get funding. The district and this state will be failing to provide a learning friendly environment. A stressful, fear driven, sterile environment where children are kept from being able to socially interact with one another, is not a learning environment I will put my child in!
1170	I don't expect elementary school kids to realistically social distance, wear masks and not touch their faces
1171	Math and science MUST be taught in person!!
1172	It would be beneficial to have covid conversations about risk and age based on science. Not the risk of catching it, but the risk of death.
1173	I believe in person regardless of masks or no is vital to my students growth as a student and as a kid.

1174	What are the expectations of compliance?? If my child wears a mask all day, will there be enforcements right n place to keep others safe? Seeing as students can destroy school/ teacher property or ruin the class climate with defiance and outbursts, what will the school admin do to address kids/families who refuse to cover their faces??
1175	I like the idea of the online learning until we can vaccinate our children. Thank you for taking these precautions and reaching out to the parents!
1176	Y'all are in a pickle, and we understand you have to do what is best for all. Yes, I would like my children to return to school, but we understand the effects this may create.
1177	Remote learning isnt working well with my child. Sports was a huge motivation and now he doesnt want to try.
1178	Please, do not put unnecessary fear into my children. I will support the school district as it supports the quality of education my student recieves. Thank you.
1179	Safety is always on our mind as parents, but our child's education are important as well. We will try anything the school puts out so that our child can go to school safely.
1180	DONT DO IT
1181	I worry about exposure because so many students come to school when they are not well.
1182	My oldest son experienced a bit of depression that we believe was due to not having the normal interactions he would normally have with his peers. He struggled with this more & more the deeper we got into quarantine. My son NEEDS that interaction at school.
1183	Our kids experiece and mental health.
1184	Sports is crucial to those that use sports as motivation
1185	If you do a hybrid model, the digital worksheets are a huge pain to work with. A more streamlined model not requiring log in to several different programs would be better.
1186	I feel strongly that my kindergartener and my 3rd grader do as much in person learning as possible. We can support at home but the complete teaching at home is a huge struggle for us as we both are still working. My 7th grader just needed some support from us but was able to keep up for the most part on her own at home.
1187	Allowing them to have PE and music and recess, but not wearing a face mask during those.
1188	Some students may have a hard time breathing with masks on. Especially for long periods of time. And how will students eat lunch?
1189	Info as soon as you have it for planning is essential. Activities are also important for growth. A way has to be found to add sports and activities.
1190	Without a vaccine, we do not have any plans to return in the fall it just is too risky for our family.
1191	I think that unless we are ready to return to school normally, with normal disinfecting procedures but no face masks l, we should just stick to online learning, but with more FaceTime with their teachers so that they are actually getting regular instruction so that assignments are more understandable.
1192	I think that a staggered schedule with a mix of in person and online learning will be best. I think that both math and English classes should be taught in person.

1201	My major concern is the kids being allowed to be kids. I'm worried the expectations for first graders to social distance and lack of recess
1202	Don't keep changing the rules. Don't panic. Do not allow politicians to drive your decision making. EQUITY Is the District united or is it building by building. It needs to be made clear.
1203	In deciding if in person education can happen. I plea to not flip flop days/weeks every other. Keep consistent each week. EX) M/T in person and W-Fri online learning and for the other half of class M-W online learning with Th/F in person. This would allow the teachers one full day (Wednesdays) for complete online preparation or follow up and all students would have the same schedule each week. For working parents and parents of other children having to change so often would be nightmarish.
1204	I have been reading the posts online from upset Navy wives and as a Kitsap resident, CK schools graduate, parent and employee for the the past 30-years, I am happy the District is exercising caution during these times. Please know there are a lot of community members who are supporting the District's efforts to keep our community healthy and safe. Additionally, I am most concerned for our low-income students who may rely on the schools for food, books, and technology access. 1225	It is important for my child to have social interactions with other kids. I can't imagine them sitting at a desk all day long.

1230	My kids need structure. Online classes do not support that and I saw a huge lack of progress. They are not excited about learning and to be honest did not always attend online classes. There is too much freedom with online classes. They don't pay attention.
1231	My son was very involved with the Robotics team and is awaiting information about whether the club will be able to meet. It's very important to him.
1232	This is mostly a concern but during certain classes such as PE, Band, Sports, and Lunch, it'll be impossible to keep face masks on, how will that work?
1233	Family First. It needs to be consistent and sustainable We have 3 kids in 3 different buildings
1234	Face coverings Proper hygiene Avoid big crowd
1235	Dont give in to parents thinking they know what is best. Listen to the professionals.
1236	Will us parents be getting information on what to expect next year? How will they get exercise will no after school activities or recess?
1237	I support the safety recommendations, while also feeling like wearing masks all day and not having the usual peer interactions will be really hard on the kids.
1238	I think have students 6 feet apart is going to be very difficult given physical limitations of classrooms. What about moving classrooms for music or PE? For older students how would you move from room to room for different classes? Math, English and Social Studies could all be in one room, but science requires specific equipment.
1239	Ensuring that everyone wheres a face mask and follows cleanliness guidelines safely so that they can reunite with their friends
1240	More frequent sanitation on floors, stair ralls, door knobs, and all touch spots like desks etc, and more basic cleaning.

1242	I don't feel like kids or teachers or family members will be safe returning to school in the fall. I absolutely would love my kids to be back to in person instruction, they need it, but I don't feel like it's safe. You can social distance at school, but once kids and teachers leave the school, you have no control over who they are around, if they social distance outside of school, or if a child's family is even taking the virus seriously, resulting in more exposure in the end, more chances to bring the virus to school before symptoms even start showing. I have a high risk asthmatic child. Sorry, but my opinion is that it's just not safe yet, even if cases in Kitsap are low.

1244	Teachers must take online classes as seriously as in person classes
1245	I have concerns about immune compromised kids and how they will be able to handle whatever may happen.
1246	I'm not opposed to online instruction if there is a clear schedule and guidelines and expectations that are followed. Both parents in our house work so it was challenging to make sure he was competing work online. I think regular parent/teacher communication is essential.
1247	Making sure there is enough physical activity time to get wiggles out and be able to focus on work
1248	Education of proper hand washing. Find out how many families actually have a thermometer or one with batteries. Push to stay home of fever or cough.
1249	I hope that we can reopen but with specific precautions to make sure we're following the health regulations.
1250	Please do not let the students come back until they are vaccinated and have proof. It is such a scary time right now.
1251	I believe it's important to not allow sick children to attend in person class. I'm saying any upper respiratory infection needs to be isolated at home until symptoms are resolved. This will keep in class safer for students and staff... children with upper respiratory infections can hopefully do school work at home full time until symptoms resolve.
1252	We rely 100% on bus transportation. Should the school districts decide not to provide it on a regular basis, our children will be unable to go to school.
1253	Catching up from last year. Counseling support for my struggling student.
1254	It seems as though they are going to cause fear in the public as long as we let them. I realize this is a public school and we are at the mercy of the states decisions maybe it would be a good idea to send him to another state for his education in the fall. This is frustrating!
1255	How will teachers and staff ensure students are taking proper social distancing precautions while at school?
1256	I feel elementary aged students benefit from seeing the expressions on their teachers faces. It is a huge part of their social & emotional growth, and to gain encouragement from teacher smiles, etc. I feel it better for the students if teachers wear face shields instead of masks.

1257	We need one, consistent message. Teachers in the same school and teaching the same curriculum need to all be aligned, doing the same tasks, using the same programs. Teachers need to talk to one another. There needs to be accountability from students for exams. So much cheating went on with the online learning, students were not held accountable for their own knowledge. All exams need to be in person, not online.
1258	facemasks should be optional. more strict about kids not attending school if sick maybe requiring temperature reading if showing illness symptoms.
1259	Do not, it is a double edged sword. This virus is bound to make a comeback in the fall, why start school in person then?
1260	I am worried about the district not taking sick students seriously. Now if a child has a fever, they are told 24 hours with no meds, fever-free. I have seen kids back in the classroom the next day. There needs to be a "medical suspension" that is enforced. Otherwise, this is all pointless.
1261	Trying to enforce hundreds of highschool students to wear masks will be quite interesting, and I feel it will be a distraction to faculty.
1262	I have NUMEROUS concerns about returning to school in the fall. My concerns are mostly regarding preschool and early elementary children, their teachers and care-givers and how our district can navigate keeping students, teachers and families safe, as well as offering relevant and substantial education to ALL of our students, regardless of socioeconomic status.
1263	I know schools cant socially distance at full capacity in a manner which complies with cdc regulations... Give us the plan - and DON'T change it - asap. Immediately is preffered May need teachers to change rooms and keep kids in one classroom all day. May need porta potty sinks in classrooms. May need half students 2 days a week - split schedule: A day on Monday and Tuesday, Wednesday to deep clean and teacher plc, then B students on Thursday and Friday. Thanksgiving week is all online.
1264	Protect my child
1265	I believe while it's important for kids to remain socially distanced that school shouldn't feel like prison to kids.
1266	Everyone and most things need to be flexible.
1267	The online classes went well at home. She just needs a clear path and expectations to know what to be working on. There was some confusion on how many credits she needed which became a problem when time was running out in the semester. She has catch up to do.
1268	Learning for kids who are more movement oriented. How can that be worked into a school day that may not have recess or pe?
1269	Better judgement by those who care for the needs of our communities children
1270	There needs to be a lot of review for things they did over the shutdown.
1271	It is imperative our children return to school and return to learning a curriculum in person that is structured and supported by a teacher in person. The home based learning that was utilized at the last portion of the school year was nothing more than busy work and some teachers were not overly supportive and/or helpful.

1272	we are an immunocompromised family. Some parents don't care if their child is sick, or can't afford to take time off to keep their child home if they are sick, and my, along with other immunocompromised families suffer.
1273	Let's go for it! We will do whatever it takes to get him back. We love you all! Thanks for everything!
1274	Even though, kids may be "behind", I hope schools focus on helping kids feel safe and welcomed back to school in the fall before worrying about trying to make up for lost learning. This has been a challenging time and continues to be. Kids need an adjustment period.
1275	I think if adequate precautions are taken returning to school it can be manageable.
1276	That if kids are sick that they go home or stay home. Kids need to wash their hands and do what they need to do to keep themselves healthy.
1277	Kids really need a lot of grace. The energy it takes being around other people is a lot for this age group! I'm much more concerned about my children's emotional/social growth at this point.
1278	Please don't send all students back at elementary level; send half one week and the other half the next. Also having a.m. and p.m. kindergarten would cut number of students in half, and be best for youngest learners to social distance.
1279	How will there be enough substitute teachers?
1280	Maybe if there could be one lecture per week in each subject and then the rest of the weeks work, in that subject, is based on the information that was talked about (given) in the lecture. The lesson plans would have to be more broad and the rest of the week would be fleshing out what was talked about. It will definitely be more challenging for the oral learners. My high schooler, daughter, is doing just fine working from home on her chrome book. She will adapt beautifully to whatever learning environment she is given. Her primary concern is that she misses her friends and wants to go to school to continue seeing her friends.
1281	Making sure students can collaborate even if it is at home
1282	I think no matter what the district decides there will be people who are unhappy with whatever is decided.
1283	Kids need to be doing some of their learning at home online and some at school! It would be nice if there was a program to help pay for internet and gas if they will be home for online learning and if we will need to drive them to and from school.
1284	Let's get these kids back to school!
1285	I don't want schools to open too early. Numbers are still climbing and the county is looking into Phase 3. I think the worst is yet to come and we, as a district, need to keep students, staff and the community as safe as possible.
1286	Being flexible with staff, students and families.
1287	.

1288	Just remember that people's memories are at risk too. I know that students health are important, but if the school year is changed dramatically I will never have a real senior year. The way I see it is that numbers are going to go up when things start to open up anyway and any Karen that is afraid that their child will catch the virus will take proper precautions or take their kid out of school. Also have you ever seen a whole highschool of kids listen? At any opportunity they will do whatever they want. Schools can't reinforce the 'keep the case on the chromebook rule', think about that with something uncomfortable and distracting directly on their faces.
1289	I am concerned for the children with underlying conditions, for those with family with underlying conditions at home. I'm not putting all my hope in a vaccine, but in time to learn more, to find more therapeutics and ways to support people with Covid.
1290	I need more chrome-books so each child has one. I have 4 need 4 more. I would prefer to do online school until the COVID 19 and requirement of masks is removed but I need more computers.
1291	I believe in keeping kids and staff safe, but I also believe mental health is very important. My kids and so many others I know need to interact with other kids.
1292	Students shouldn't be pressured to be at the current grade level in the beginning but teachers should workout schedule to make sure they are at the right level before school ends
1293	I believe in person instruction is not only vital for the student but the teachers as well as it allows them to acclimate to each student
1294	I'd like some scientific studies shared on the required PPE for students so we can purchase the best for our kids.
1295	Social interactions with peers and teachers
1296	If online learning is used there needs to be weekly or multiple meetings per week with the students. One every 3 weeks is not good enough.
1297	Instruction needs to fall on teachers to the children. If the expectation is for parents to teach then there is no incentive to attend your school. We could choose any other program.
1298	I think video lessons of the teacher would be very helpful. These last few months we were just given workbook assignments and the teacher was available for questions via text. I am very concerned with how kindergarten will work. Expecting children that young to wear masks all day, stay 6 feet away from peers, with no recess seems very unreasonable to me. Making a 9 year old wear a mask all day is unacceptable, making a 5 year old is impossible. Depending on the final course of action I may need to homeschool my children this year. Shorter days with an online component (or fully online) would work best for our family, even if that means extending the school year to meet the required number of hours.
1299	I dont think that the new model will work. My child fell behind due to long distance learning.
1300	Special needs students and the mask issue. Inability to wear one.

1301	I will have a 2nd grader and a new kindergartner. Both my husband and I work. My schedule is a bit more flexible. My concern is that if a hybrid model is in place, I would appreciate the understanding that a sibling is involved and all siblings try to attend together (meaning if some children are going to school in the morning and some in the afternoon, try to place siblings together) This may allow a 2 person working household to participate in work outside of the home while children are at school and remote work while home.
1302	I believe kids should return to in person learning in some fashion. It's challenging with lack of or poor internet in many areas and kids learn so much from their peers, socially and emotionally. I also do strongly believe students should be screened every day for temps and other symptoms before being allowed to stay in class each day.
1303	N/A
1304	Our family was so thankful for how the schools handled online learning on such short notice.
1305	I don't think we should make our children socially distance from each other or wear masks. I think this virus will be around whether they wear them or not. I think a healthy immune system is built by exposure.
1306	Another concern that would come if bus service is not available is the pickup and drop off at the school. It is already a mess during normal operation. But if all parents have to do it, then it will be a disaster. I have heard that the kids may be on an A and B schedule. If this is to occur I would hope this would not happen on an am and pm basis. This would be extremely difficult for those parents working full time, and would require more childcare options.
1307	I believe that my girls were able to get their work done from home and can do it if they have to again. My boys had a very hard time with doing any kind of work from home and they need to be in school. With that being said if the school district can not provide a safe environment for my boys they will not be able to come back to school for their physical safety.
1308	I'm a full time working, single parent and I need the consistent childcare and social interaction that school provides. If we can't go back full time, I'd rather figure out a full time childcare, instead of a part time A/B schedule. So much depends on childcare and transportation.
1309	6-12th grade social emotional well being. These kids need their teachers, friends and in person school support system. The social emotional toll that distance learning has taken on adolescents is not being taken seriously enough. We need to not only consider their physical health but their mental health as well. It is equally important.
1310	I emailed teachers and counselors with no reply back. How can I trust that my kid will will learn if the teachers don't support the kids
1311	We should be back to school at 100% with precautions/common sense health practices,etc. until reason dictates otherwise. (no virus = stay in school, virus returns = stay home)
1312	I think it may be helpful to explore 1/2 day options to decrease the amount of students in the building at one time or at least provide that option for some students.

1313	We support whatever the school district decides to do, however, I feel so many teachers did not care about online learning, or didn't get it. My kids rarely had google meets, hardly ever interacted with their teachers, and weren't "taught" anything, just given podcasts to listen to or questions to answer. There was a big missed opportunity for learning with the technology available to us. Because a few kids may not have had internet access, everyone had to suffer. CK can do better, it was very disappointing how they handled the situation.
1314	I do not think it is healthy to wear masks all the time. If sick kids/adults stay home they should not be needed maybe an infared thermometer like the casinos use would be good to monitor temperatures.
1315	I think school should closed till next year
1316	How are we supposed to have PPE when we eat lunch? I'm stumped on this one...
1317	When over 1 million masks have been sewed and donated by volunteers to medical professionals, I wonder if the school district couldn't request volunteers to make masks for children. They could agree on the design and have masks made with stipulations as to suitability.
1318	Kids can come back to school for in-person and do it safely.
1319	I don't want to see students get jerked around in the fall by opening schools and then having to close them when we have a massive spike in cases. It would be better to focus on making online learning available to all students then to have to jump to online school again in the fall after an attempted reopening.
1320	People are and will be stupid.
1321	Social interaction, getting back to a healthy routine, being more physical and moving around. Sports.
1322	I believe when it comes down to it that this needs to be on the parents to make the right choice for their child, and as a school district you should be open and MORE THEN WILLING to help accommodate ALL situation come the 2020-2021 school year! If one child needs in person learning more, make sure its an option! If one family needs a mix of in home support and a few days of in person learning, work with them make it happen! And even if someone is out of your normal "district lines" but say they just want to keep their child safe learning at home but just needs to be a part of a certain class or program to help their child succeed, then considering everything these kids have already had to change and adapt to, make it happen! This will by NO means be a "normal" school year, so don't treat it like it is!
1323	I don't want my child bullied because of the mask. The political polarization has resulted in a hostile climate for individuals who elect to wear masks and I can easily see that translating into the school environment resulting in some kids bullying others for wearing them.
1324	Please let them physically go to school.

1325	It is not possible to open schools with all the guidelines that have been recommended. It will cause emotional and social trauma to kids to isolate them at school and have them fear being near others. Especially when the rest of the community is opening back up. Give parents a choice to go back without restrictions. Make them sign a waiver so they recognize the risk. Then the legality of the issue is taken care of. If people want to do distant learning then let them. But don't open schools with all these precautions. It is not going to work.
1326	I think expecting all students to comply with face coverings is unrealistic. I also think social distancing in a very full school is next to impossible. I don't feel that returning to school under these circumstances is the most responsible solution. If the students and staff can't go back to school without face coverings and go back to normal then they should stay home.
1327	Teachers need a better resource to teach! Our teachers were amazing over the past three months however they didn't provide much instruction; mostly just assignments. If online education continues, I would love for more video-like instruction from the teachers.
1328	None
1329	Children's mental health has been truly impacted by the social isolation. I feel they need the opportunity to socialize and live a normal life.
1330	We have an only child that just finished 1st grade. Interactions with kids around his age is crucial to his social development. We also are a family of 2 working parents trying to teach him things without any lesson plans or foundations shown. The Red Bird program asks questions without going through the lessons and showing the basic new concept of what is being learned or how to do it. It's the whole "sink-or-swim" mentality. Because he is farther along in math than the rest of his class, his teacher can only provide minimal help. The videos that were published by the music teacher were great, but singing along to a video by yourself just isn't the same.
1331	Children will be exposed to each other during lunch, no matter where they are. Because mask will be taken off.
1332	Kids need other kids and different people to help hold them accountable that's what makes good adults.
1333	They should not feel like it is a punishment to be around people or their friends.
1334	It's virtually impossible to have kids wear masks all day and if so make available to those that bad not have or forget.
1335	My kids need social interaction with other kids their age
1336	Hopefully it can be as normal as possible.
1337	Please don't validate the extremists. Anti-mask is just anti-vaccine in another form. It's selfish, not science driven and detrimental to our communities.
1338	No further information needed.
1339	IF learning is online, it CANNOT be done by the normal CKSD teachers without significant training. Current curriculum IS NOT conducive to online learning.
1340	Do not require masks Let the kids go to school They need exercise and interaction with their friends. This is not healthy for them

1341	I believe a hybrid model is best but I have concerns about my children wearing masks for long periods of time and breathing their own germs/carbon dioxide and not getting sufficient oxygen circulation for proper brain function.
1342	School is really important as for me kids are more comfortable if they do their school at home. For school kids are more focused and their schedules are organized with all the activities more on learning with teacher in person. For what I heard some of my family friends kids they know they got lazy to follow instructions online work.
1343	I believe in keeping the school clean and sanitary but I am also HIGHLY against having my children wear masks for 6+ hours a day to go to school. I hope CKSD and OSPI can find a way to accomodate this concern. If not, I will likely choose to pull them out of CKSD and home school them.
1344	I believe education sould continue at the school. I work full time and do not have the luxury or opportunity to stay home with my child and homeschool him. I do not want my child who already has to work harder to fall behind and struggle . If school doesnt resume in person than my son will not be getting the education he needs. That scares and infuriates me.
1345	Teachers need to take their time in getting kids caught up from the previous grade & not quickly jump into their standard curriculum for that current grade. Kids will only fall farther behind & feel inadequate if they can't understand what's being taught if they haven't been caught up on what they've missed.
1346	I think that school should go back to normal.
1347	Social emotional concerns and the effects of trauma should be addressed before academics. Build relationships first.
1348	If we have to do online schooling again I would prefer the use of 1 education platform instead of having to navigate multiple. This may have been easier if I had the chromebook but I dont know for sure.
1349	I am worried about my kindergartener education start if not in person
1350	Social distancing as much as possible and sanitize as much as you guys could. Thank you.
1351	I believe that if we end up having to alternate days with online and in school instruction then families with more than one child at the school need to be taken into consideration. Both children attending on the same day would be the most beneficial to us as a family.
1352	Students need space to take their masks off and breathe and exceptions need to be made for specific stundents
1353	I worry about my son's social skills more than academic growth.

1354	The COVID restrictions/requirements will prevent my children from having the normal experience of school. The restrictions will be distracting and will take away from the learning environment. My children are very uncomfortable wearing masks and this would interfere with their ability to focus or enjoy school in any capacity. The imposed restrictions will make school a bizarre and unnecessary experience and for this reason we will choose to home school independently of the school district as long as these restrictions remain in place. Children cannot expect to be masked and continually kept 6 feet a part from their classmates and friends all day, every day. This type of environment will grow tiresome and their desire to be at school will likely decrease for many.
1355	In person learning to some extent is necessary for not only learning but social skills and mental health for kids.
1356	Classroom to teacher has always been high and in this environment is unsafe. The numbers are increasing exponentially which is also unsafe. By the time school starts back up with people already relaxed on the phasing and kids being together. It is u safe to put our children back into schools until there is either a vaccine or matters are taken more seriously
1357	How does the district plan to enforce children's use of facemasks? What happens when they are all sent home for not wearing them properly?
1358	I feel that masks should only be worn when out in the halls. I feel that students should be allowed to remove masks while in class to help with staying focus. Not only that but at times it does become hard to breathe while wearing a mask. Also P.E and recess will need to be taken away if they are being required to wear a mask. I for one will not send my child if they will be required to wear a mask during P.E or recess.
1359	I think certain high-risk classes should be cancelled this school year (PE, choir, music). If possible, I think it makes sense to keep students in one class and have the teachers change rooms to limit the number of personal interactions each day. It may be hard to schedule classes in a way that suits that, but I think it's better than having over 1,000 kids playing musical chairs all day. I think it's important to make sure kids have masks available. My son is in another school district and struggled a lot with school at home. He requires more structure and motivation from someone other than his parents and I am confident he would have failed most of his classes if the grading weren't so lenient. In person instruction is important, as long as reasonable safety precautions are in place.
1360	Kids are physical and will probably hug, kiss, hold hands and I'm concerned about how these things will be responded to.
1361	I think they need a review of the material before beginning a new grade .
1362	I am concerned younger kids won't want to keep their masks on and will spread more germs. I have a 4 year old we wanted to get tested to start kindergarten early but now we are waiting. I am afraid she will be too far ahead when she starts kindergarten when she is almost 6. I don't want her to be forced to skip kindergarten. I am wondering if she can be tested to start early and be home schooled.

1363	If the district caves to science denying Karens the way vaccines have been given a pass for some my kid will not be attending and I will never again vote yes on a district levy. If you can teach your kid to keep their pants on you can teach them to keep a mask on.
1364	I believe that students should not have to wear a face mask and if the parents want them too then they should wear one.
1365	I believe that some students and their families did fine. Other families did not do fine and could have used additional support. Having multiple caretakers, divorced parents (who do not communicate well) and both parents working helped to make things very inconsistent. If remote learning becomes necessary again, identifying at risk families and figuring out a support system for them may be the only way to achieve student growth.

1369	We need to get back to learning. If we continue to be "on line" there needs to be Live classroom times where the teacher is teaching and the student is participating in real time. Issuing a weeks worth of assignments with no to little direction is not acceptable.
1370	I don't think teachers deserve the extra stress of dealing with children and masks.

1372	All students need to be safe, protective guidelines need to be followed, staff need to feel safe and you need to make sure your staff are safe too.
1373	Breaks from masks and being able to have some kind of PE type activities.
1374	I only support a return to education as we knew it should we progress through the current pandemic and meet all requirements to clear all phases of reopening.
1375	I'd like to see pre-recorded instruction for classes like Math if classes are online.

1379	The last four months of school this year were a complete waste of educational time. I'm concerned that they're going to be behind in their grade appropriate skills
1380	in person instruction and social interactions are vital for emotional wellness. sports as can be don safely are also vital to many kid's wellness.
1381	I am a full-time working mom with a spouse who works outside of the home. I have very little concern with my kids returning to the classroom. My biggest concern is if there is homebase learning how is the school district going to support full-time working parents of multiple kids in school? Working full-time does not leave much time to teach during the day so what is the district plan to support children in this situation?

1382	Please allow elementary students to bring home their school chromebooks if their is any type of virtual learning. In the event CKSD needs to go to all virtual learning, please encourage teachers to do some hands on or paper projects to reduce the amount of screen time. However school looks next fall, there needs to very clear communication and expectations from teachers, schools and the district. There also needs to be consistency within the district. This spring, students' experiences were very teacher dependent. Also please follow the guideline of giving at -risk students priority to be in the building if not everyone fits.

1391	It didn't seem like the teachers were teaching very much in this remote learning environment. It seemed like the learning was provided by videos and websites, not the teachers themselves and yet they are still responsible for the teaching.

1393	Our state government and educational oversight have absolutely lost their mind or they are cooperating with an agenda. If I didn't want my kids to have any risk of getting sick I would not allow them out of their bedrooms ever. If this was ebola we are dealing with, maybe I would feel different. 1402	I think it will be more dangerous, children that have been left to thier own devices back in school environment will be less disciplined or less able to adapt. I believe thier will be frustration leading to outbursts and some of them will be violent. Some of the children will not have had any education in over 6 months, these less fortunate will likely be the most frustrated when they return to school.
1403	Having a variety of options will most likely be key, but if ANY online learning is part of the program - consistent (across subjects/grade levels) curriculum & expectations is a must. Allowing flexibility for families with working parents will also be critical.
1404	Siblings need to be/must have the same schedules if hybrid
1405	I believe the emotional effects of masks and social distancing are more of a concern for my children than Covid-19.
1406	"Federal guidelines advise that states wait until they experience a downward trajectory of documented cases within a 14-day period before proceeding to a phased opening." 1407	I intend to keep my student out from school. Please have a choice for parents to choose remote learning. As you are well aware it will be extremely difficult to make the students wear masks all day.

1408	I would like to see my son at least have 1 day per week with in-person instruction, and the rest virtual online learning thru our school district. For example I have my sons 3rd grade McGraw Hill my math workbook, have his teacher do google meet live video class, the kids can follow in their workbooks while the teacher teaches. This could be done with all subjects. The teacher may need a white board at home to show students things in writing. Hopefully what I wrote makes sense above. As far in-person school, i feel there would need to be people monitoring in class, in the hallways, making sure students are following social distancing, keeping masks on, someone wiping down things frequently during school. After school heavier duty cleaning down of all areas. If the child has a mask on, if they touch the mask before they have sanitized their hands, than they would have to remove it, sanitize their hands, put on the new mask. 1413	My child will be going into the third grade. To expect kids to social distance and wear face masks is unrealistic. They won't even be able to play on recess. I think you should continue online learning until they can go back to school and have contact with other kids in a safe covid free environment without having to wear face masks.
1414	None
1415	Find a way to make school happen. Our daughter will skip kindergarten. First year in school.
1416	The students that got an incomplete for a class this spring, how will that effect their classes for fall? How will they make it up? Will they be that much further behind?
1417	I hope that schools use the most straightforward, common-sense approach to reopening. Cleaning and sanitizing along with social distancing shouldn't be too hard -- but complicated schedules and draconian measures like limiting students' daily movement goes a bit too far, in my opinion. There is no way to eliminate all risk, and trying to do so creates more harm than good, in my opinion.
1418	Socially and emotionally children are hurt now, and I want them to feel confident and safe for their learning.
1419	Teachers and staff need to lead by example, and students who not comply should be removed. Also, having an all online option for the families not ready to return is critical. I would encourage no band or choir as we know them to be super spreader events.

1420	Thank you for sending this survey. I understand that there are a lot of hard decisions that need to be made. I would appreciate as a parent to know a month in advance what the schools have decided to do in the fall, so I can prepare for my kid's education and consider other options if needed. On a side note I strongly oppose using face masks in schools for many reasons. Thanks again for sending this survey.
1421	It would be great to be able to see what assignments are due (we set up the daily report, but it wasn't clear and I found it hard to follow). I also think having the meet sessions are CRITICAL for each class at least once a week. They need interaction, even if it's just to play games with each other (Kahoots)
1422	There needs to be a large stash of back up masks for student and staff. Self or school checks of symptoms. Who will wash school issues masks? Will there be extra workbook and activities to expand my child knowledge base? If the schools need to close again, will there be a better plan amd system in place?
1423	not enough student accountability. No teachers to talk to, having to zoom with too many unsupervised children that felt this was their moment to act out, wasting the time of the others
1424	I worry a bit about my oldest who is just going into 9th grade at the high school. Going to hgh school is daunting as is, but adding all of the unknowns can put unwanted stress or anxiety on them. So if there was a possibility of having clearer information on what is going to be expected of them for each class sooner rather than later and with much more communication from the district, the school, & Teachers, it would be greatly appreciated to help ease those feelings. My other child who is going into 2nd grade also needs the communication and clear expectations. But I am hoping that the teachers will have a good plan in place for their students rather than what they had to do in March which was at the drop of a hat come up with a plan. In the beginning I think they did what they could for the students with the time and information they had and as time went on they developed a groove for the online teaching. So if they can take what they developeed and expand then I think they will be ready for whatever comes their way this fall. I also think that maybe the schools or principals could put out a message/video in August to all the families of them doing a walk through of what they are coming back to or what a day at the school will look like just so they can have a visual to help ease them into the new normal.
1425	As much flexibility from the district as possible for the students.

1426	I feel wearing a mask all day is not the healthiest idea but I also believe wearing them helps contain the spread of droplets etc, I dont see kids keeping them on all day though. I dont see the social distancing idea working very well , as there are so many kids and not enough space. I feel like if we have to stagger times they will be getting less learning time. I agree eating lunches in the classrooms is a good idea to avoid any unnecessary exposure to other students. One of my biggest concerns is if there will be any flexibility in the absence rules. As we get back into cold and flu season I'm sure there will be a lot of parents who just let their children go to school because they just assume it is a cold and dont want them to miss school and neglect to think about exposing other children. Will we be granted more excused absences being allowed? I myself have asthma and am afraid that my child might get exposed or bring it home so any sign of sickness I will keep him home but I dont want him falling behind or getting in trouble for missing too much.
1427	Need to come up with better options than forcing students not to engage with each other and wear face coverings all day.
1428	I believe teachers need to provide more and better personal instruction in online learning. I also believe teacher should rely on their teaching ability instead of YouTube, khan academy, etc.
1429	He needs to get into his school, meet his teacher, locate bathrooms, lunch, and other places he will need to know. He's so afraid he will get lost!
1430	Should students return to the physical classroom in the fall, we are hoping that there will be homeschool options and support for those of us who wish to keep our children home.
1431	I understand needing to follow state and federal mandates to open and run schools safely and successfully. However, potentially taking away electives such as music, band, choir and physical education will produce a severe deficit in student academic achievement and motor skills development. Electives are necessary to promote learning, develop and fine-tune gross and fine motor movements and skills. This generation of students will eventually be adults in which our culture and society are going to be greatly disadvantaged by limiting or eliminating these activities. Please consider some form of online learning for band, choir and music. Help physical education teachers plan and execute an appropriate way for students to learn, move and develop their skills. It's vital for long term health.
1432	If you are evaluating an A-B schedule, I hope you would consider leaving kids grouped by their peer class. (Juniors & Seniors on A Day and Freshman-Sophomore on B Day)
1433	Social interaction is such an important aspect of public schooling and will be a huge loss of the benefits that public school provides.
1434	We need to train parents on the core 4 that CKSD will use. Parents didn't seem to know to check on Google Classroom, for example. Perhaps that has to do with the many pivots the district announced. We really need consistency from the start. While the community was generous and accepting of our learning curve, they most likely will not be the next time around. We can do better!
1435	Follow the CDC guidelines and practice good hygiene

1436	What will happen to the children who have both parents working full time and will need childcare if schools aren't open fully? Will the childcare providers like Y Kids and/or Champions have the tools necessary to keep our kids up on the school work that will be put out by their teachers if there is a hybrid or distance learning model in place? This is my biggest concern.

1438	children need to be aware of how serious the spread of the virus is. Maybe do hourly hand washing, wipes downs etc. bathrooms need to be cleaned at all time
1439	I think that face coverings is a great idea and possibly smaller class sizing, or if doing o line maybe allowing some type of class group activities weekly would be a great alternative
1440	Disinfecting. Proper online options for those that want or have to use it. This last time it was "optional" but was way to simple. Each of my kids had different expectations and both were so far below where they were that we opted to not do it. We invested in an online program/application called IXL. It's not the same interaction as a classroom but I'm also not a teacher.

1442	Please allow parents to make the right choices for THEIR children, if you want to send a child with a mask, great, if you don't, that's great too, let's include everyone. Majority of Kitsap does not wear masks and in Central Kitsap, we have very few cases so clearly there is no proof it works or does not.
1443	students will need a lot of support transitioning back to school and learning how to follow health regulations while back at school. Counselors will be needed to help students dealing with anxiety and depression.
1444	Its very important for them to continue coming to school for their future success
1445	These kids and staff deserve to come back to school as normal.
1446	We can't make it feel like a prison and take away recesses, time with their peers. Masks all day in unrealistic. Have homeschool options ready for those families who want to go that route for the next year.
1447	In addition to the unrealistic and unhealthy goal of forcing children to wear masks all day everyday, I am also very, very concerned about any implementation of "anti-racism" Marxist education being brought into the curriculum.
1448	If you want to continue the distance learning and online you might want to think about creating social groups or even study groups online that students can join in on and maybe even something for parents that can support each other.
1449	Focus on learning
1450	I believe in person schooling should be allowed and those who are uncomfortable with sending there children to school can keep them home. I will be sending my kids to school.
1451	I feel like Special Ed. Pre-k is very important to have in person class, online is mostly just small interaction while the kids need speech as well and the social interaction with children their age.

1452	Ckhs was already overcrowded and that issue has not been addressed, even without a pandemic. You allowed too many out of school and district transfers at the expense of running a safe and enjoyable school. My student wants to do Running start in the next year because the school is so overcrowded. In several classes she wasn't allowed to use the restroom during class and did not have time to go between classes. It was too crowded to walk quickly through. She's a 4.0 student athlete who is not trying to get out of class. Also, the emphasis was on giving 3+ hours of homework, vs learning the material well was an issue that continued into the closure. Some classes were beyond the required standards and just throwing material at them, even during the closure. I'm not sure how the teachers will adjust to doing a hybrid model this fall when quite a few were not very tech savvy with instruction. At RMS, she had teachers that were already making the transition. Please use a better online platform than just throwing things on google classroom. And do not combine google classrooms across grades and classes like you did at the start of the closure. It was a nightmare. Some Teachers/classes even in the same subject, like Spanish 2, were ahead or behind each other. Not fair to the students to navigate a google classroom for 9th-12th English department with 9 different classes and teachers posting. To do that for a few weeks and confuse students was really crazy for them to figure out.
1453	Social interaction and a sense of self is a huge part of a child's learning and growth. Do not take that away by putting in place unrealistic expectations for virus control.
1454	I think it's important for children to be with other children. I think it would be a good idea to do 50% in school learning and 50% online learning.
1455	it is irresponsible to assume that school will reopen in the fall. we should make distance learning available to all students immediately and permanently.
1456	Not sure how well young children will learn online
1457	Na
1458	Please give parents time to prepare and plan. Letting us know a week before school starts would feel unfair.
1459	Students have suffered emotionally and struggled. I strongly believe our kids need to return to school in the Fall.
1460	I want to say I appreciate all of you at the school district taking the time you get feedback. The teachers need to be 100 percent on board with whatever happens. If they feel confident I think the kids will too.
1461	That you let kids go back
1462	I feel my kids maybe behind due to last minute arrangements for school then trying to find what works for them
1463	Half days will not work with working parents. A hybrid schedule of full days there and full days home would be better but still a challenge.
1464	Get back to in person training
1465	They need to be back

1466	Please provide options and choices to students. Every kid struggled this Spring, in their own way.
1467	The kids also need to be able to interact, to play, and have fun together.
1468	At this point my family is not comfortable sending our children back to in person learning for school this Fall. There is far too great a risk still looming over Kitsap County with more cases popping up daily. I truly hope that an online option will be available with the same elementary teacher we had this last 2019-2020 school year. I believe adding a new teacher into this confusing mix of trying to figure out the new norm would present an even greater challenge to students and parents alike. I appreciate the hard work that has gone into finishing out this school year as well as figuring out how to open up for fall. But our family will only be using online or homeschool options until there are no active COVID-19 cases in Washington State. Thank you.
1469	I think there needs to be clear expectations of what is expected way BEFORE school starts. My child may need to have the opportunity to come to the school to see and experience the expectations before school starts to help alleviate anxiety issues and confusion issues. We need to have clear understandable information to give to him so he will know how to navigate through the "new" school day. Again, with the possibility of coming to the school before school starts. We usually have a day to see where his classes are and walk around to familiarize and be prepared. We will need that still and to see and experience in advance what the new expectations are.
1470	I understand many parents want children to return to school due to needing to work. Personally my family is in a position that this is not a need. I would prefer my children to be safe. I feel no matter what the planned precautions of the district I see them not being successful. I have decided to home school my children the first half of the school year. We will re-evaluate towards the end of the semester.
1471	I would feel better if there were a vaccine first
1472	In person learning
1473	Look at Acellus. They are WA state approved, have all grade levels, online, and then have teachers available as resources for extra instruction. Or worst case scenario have kids who must be in school go but limit the amount by offering online to others.
1474	We are really looking forward to getting back to school safely!
1475	it's important for our students to not be scared and learn to work together.
1476	The kids need to be in the classroom as much as they can. If people aren't comfortable, keep your kids home and home school.
1477	Will there be fall sports? My daughter plays volleyball and is wondering if there will be a season?
1478	Be easy on the kids! Not have such high expectations for course work to be completed for those who are still essential workers

1479	Mental health (while important) takes a backseat to an actual physical threat of a deadly disease. A hybrid method would be the most effective way to balance both concerns. But until there is a proven, effective, and scientifically approved vaccine, PPE should never, under any non-emergent circumstances, be removed.
1480	Hand washing stations or hand sanitizer stations should be installed in addition to other precautions. I also think that the school district should host an open house/forum so that parents can see the precautionary measures that have been put in place and ask questions.
1481	If online is a must for next year I believe it is very important to have more teacher instruction online. Not just assigning homework for them to do.
1482	Any return to school for students should have strict procedures. That all students and staff wear face coverings. Face coverings should cover nose and mouth. 1490	My biggest concern is lack of health/safety standards enforcement. I believe clear standards and leadership is needed to make sure any plan is adhered to by staff and students.
1491	If students are divided into groups to attend at different times or different days, I am concerned that the people in my student's group will not take COVID as seriously as we do and therefore will not be taking precautions like we are, thus increasing the risk of spreading the virus. I almost feel like groups should be made up by how seriously families are taking this and how cautious they are being. I know we are following all protocols and precautions but I know others are not. 1494	Sports and other programs are very important to the kids and whole community. Don't just give up on bringing them back. You might be surprised at how all are willing to make changes to make it work. Thank you all for your dedication to our kids. Your care and genuine love for them is what will ultimately enable everyone to weather this storm.
1495	I feel like children might be a bit behind because they were not able to cover everything with the online learning
1496	I want my child to return to school as normal as possible not to be treated like everyone has a plague.
1497	Teachers need to engage more through zoom or MS teams for learning
1498	Nothing specific but we do genuinely appreciate how serious CKSD is taking this pandemic. It is obvious to us that the kids are the first concern.
1499	I believe staff will have great challenges trying to keep children (especially the young ones) masked all day. I also think it will be hard for many children to hear or understand teachers who are wearing masks.
1500	Communication, communication, communication. Start sharing ideas/plans early and often. The old saying people have to hear something 3 times to remember is still true. This last march was a disaster and continued miscommunication and misdirection will only exacerbate what been lost.
1501	Please do not have our children go back just because you feel pressure from some. Health is number 1 for staff and students. Staff are older in many buildings or are caretakers for their parents. Risking staff health is not reasonable.
1502	Seattle city has said they will have normal school days, if they are in stage 4. Why is this not being considered an option for our district, which has had significantly fewer cases of COVID?
1503	K-5 needs to be back in school full time. In many families, both parents work. If this group of kids is not back full time then most will be going to daycare which will put them in contact with kids outside their classroom and will provide more opportunities for them to bring the flu back to the classroom. Older kids can be left at home alone. One thought - would it be possible to offer a remote learning option for students who can or need to stay home? Have a teacher(s) assigned to a remote class. Instruction can be done through Teams. Some kids have been thriving on home instruction or have parents that are home during the day. That would free up more room for kids who need to go back to the classroom.
1504	If we have to go Hybrid, can we do one day on, one day off? That would be easier for families than having one week on, one week off.
1505	I believe a split schedule would be the best thing for the students. Half in school/Half online as long as the online learning is set like a classroom setting and attendance is mandatory.

1508	I am excited for CKSD to issue their decision so we can start planning. Whether it is distance, hybrid or in building I believe it will be suitable for my child.
1509	I wanna come back
1510	Temperature monitoring at the classroom during the morning greeting would be wonderful
1511	I believe children need safe social interaction with their peers in order to thrive. Their mental and emotional health depend on it in order for them to become healthy, contributing adult members of our community.
1512	Expecting kids to wear masks for 6 hours and stay 6 feet away from others will be hard for kids in the best circumstances. In our buildings we have many children and families who do not follow the rules . With Covid, the natural consequences of these rules not being followed are life and death,. I dont believe it is possible for schools to keep kids and staff safe. We have a high risk family member in our home and I am extremely concerned about exposure my daughter will have at school.
1513	I understand that it's a delicate balance trying to follow the state guidelines and provide a solid learning environment for the CK children. I'm thankful to the CKSD staff and teachers for trying to do what's best for our kids.
1514	I'm not a trained teacher. I didn't go to school for it and neither did my childcare sitter. My children require structure and someone who knows what they are doing. If I wanted to homeschool my child, they would be homeschooled. Not enrolled in public schools. My kids need to have a relationship with their teacher and interaction with other students. My hope is that school returns but is also sanitized as often as possible and that parents follow guidelines should they or their children become ill.
1515	Child care is what I believe will be the biggest challenge. Especially for those who have aged out of before/after school care. Some of us do not have the luxury of having family members/friends who can watch our aged out teenager with ADHD, ODD, Depression, Anxiety etc. I believe there should be something put in place for those group of kids. Bremerton district has a Boys and Girls Club. We have nothing. Even if there was a shuttle of sorts to get these kids to the Bremerton location, that would be a temporary fix. Or partner with the YMCA in silverdale? Something.
1516	None
1517	I believe making this new learning experience as normal as possible is important. Kids need socialization and need to be amongst their peers.

1518	Again, I think online learning is a good adjunct to classroom learning. I am not a parent who thinks that homeschooling or online learning exclusively can replace classroom learning. There is a reason why we have trained educators. And so many things can be missed when learning happens outside of the classroom setting. I already mentioned assessment for possible learning disability. Other things that come to mind is socialization. Most of my son's social interactions with peers happens when he is at school. And what about handwriting, something that is not really stressed that much anymore as people opt to text and email. Teaching a child how to write is best done in person. I believe the same can be said for teaching a child how to read. Perhaps for the older children in middle school and high school the online learning might work better. But for the younger children in elementary school I believe it is best if they receive their education primarily in the classroom. They need more supervision, guidance, and reinforcement/affirmation that is best delivered in person and in the classroom.
1519	I think there should be a tiered system for kids returning. I think kids with IEPs/special education needs and whatnot should be given top priority for in class time, then kids who need more one on one time, and so forth. My daughter did mostly well with distance learning and while I hope she is able to move into a maybe 50/50 role, I would gladly give up in class time to someone who might need it more. I just don't know how that makes since.
1521	The district going over board with precautions. Primary kids Developmental needs not being taken into consideration.
1522	I want to send my daughter back to school in fall, if schools reopen. But I am worried about transportation. since we live close to school, I'm worried a bus will not be offered to her. We might be down to 1 car by then and walking to school is too dangerous for us. But if busses were limited to snow routes, that would work for us (if it had to happen)
1523	First of all, student & staff safety is most important. Then, consistent learning in a platform/way that provides growth while still allowing for the flexibility of every families unique needs (whether that is online, a hybrid model, or in person). And lastly— socialization and peer modeling, plays a critical role in development of young children, and should be incorporated into schooling, in whatever way that takes place, if at all possible.
1524	Hybrid models should take into account siblings. Having students on opposite schedules would create extra stress on families.

1528	I hope you don't expect the kids to wear the masks all the time.
1529	We need our kids back in school with the environment as normal as possible. If hybrids are the only option kids need all lessons available for live instruction. Record them and post to site for kids who can't be there. Offer time for questions within live lesson and places where kids that cant ve there for live can ask. Then address them individually and on the next days lesson.
1530	We should not be returning to school this fall if there is not a vaccine available. It's irresponsible and dangerous.
1531	I think that it is necessary to "go-over" and touch base again, maybe even teach, the students lessons that were supposed to be learned during distance learning. We rely on school to help and now not only will it not help but my kids won't get their academic help they need making them suffer more than anyone.
1533	Health and safety is my main priority. A big concern is the lack of mask-wearing in our community. (At stores, in public places, etc.) Please enforce this for staff and student safety!
1534	I think the distance learning model was very difficult for certain personality types, I had one student that did well with scheduling herself, they other not well at all, the different teaching styles between teachers was a challenge for both students.
1535	Return as normal. This is getting out of hand the amount of hurdles students are facing.
1536	CDC says .02 covid death rate. Too much hype and hysteria for nought.
1537	Kids will have a hard time growing socially without seeing other kids smiles/facial expressions. Or maybe it will be fine. Hard to know!
1538	I worry for the teachers and staff. The children can be staggered, but they are there all of the time.
1539	We are nervous about schools opening before it's safe to do so. We have considered switching to WA Academy in the fall, but if activities open up for the students my kids don't want to miss out.
1540	They need interactions with there peers. How much mental health problems do you want to create?
1541	These young kids may not be able to understand where their anxiety is coming from and focus will be harder. I hope teachers understand this and extend deadlines. I hope there will be something for them to tie themselves to the school if sports is not available.
1542	The teachers need to be more involved with meeting with students and having the student see other students

1543	I do not think it is reasonable to believe young children (early elementary school) will be able to be consistent with face masks. Additionally, this is not something I want to force on my child. It is difficult enough when she has to wear one when she goes with me to the store. How would lunch time be handled? Will days be shorter due to CDC guidelines advising against libraries, cafeterias, gyms, etc.?
1544	I'm concerned about the social aspects. My son is a home it introverted and misses his friends dearly
1545	Students need to be the #1 priority. Do not make decisions based on health conditions of staff. They may take a leave of absence. Children will keep falling behind at a greater rate is they do not get back to in person learning....socially, emotionally, and cognitively
1546	My daughter and son will be new to the CKSD and i want to make sure they do not feel isolated from their peers.
1547	Please let us come back!!
1548	There needs to be a balance between online and paper pencil work with accountability for both. I'm concerned about my kindergartener learning to read when he teachers mouth is covered. I'm going back to work and finding childcare if students are only in person part time is a concern for my family. How will there still be a kind caring welcoming environment when everything seems so distant and sterile.
1549	I feel in-person instruction would be socially very beneficial for my student, even if school operates at a hybrid level.
1550	What are the plans for kids with special needs or have IEP classes that need extra help.
1551	Please consider the web-like nature physical contact. Each Kid comes to school having had physical contact with the people on their homes and social communities. While some families are extremely careful maintaining social distance from those outside their household, others are throwing public birthday parties for their children. It's essential that the school maintains the recommended CDC guidelines for public gatherings and not succumb to the few noisy parents who will, no doubt, present themselves about how we are all overreacting.
1552	If my child will not conform to wearing a mask, or the only option is homeschooling, I will need to quit my job in order to provide schooling at home for my child. This is my biggest concern.

1559	If there is a hybrid model the students should be grouped based on their academic success for example the top 20% of the class should be grouped together.
1560	Children need social interaction to grow. Please allow our children to get this ability. I feel my student would have excelled more if they were allowed to come back to school and not just used the online models implemented this year.
1561	I think finding a way for some type of socialization is important based on the personality changes I have seen with my children.
1562	Continuing to give 1:1 attention and instruction when students need it academically or to feel safe at school
1563	If we are to return in the fall the district needs to look into providing schools with plexy glass dividers for desks. The district needs to think of the health and well being of not just students but the staff that teaches them. A vaccine is not out yet and they want to send our students back to an environment where social distancing is hard. An option would be the students that can handle distance learning let them. While the ones that need face to face come in for instruction with proper ppe and distance!

1564	I think that the district will have to be somewhat lenient with staff to run their kids home etc if hybrid model. I also think especially middle and high school students would have to be on somewhat of a same schedule as younger siblings. It wouldn't be able to be a A-L comes this day and M-Z another. There would have to be a way parents could give input based on caregiving and things that work for their families or ones they care for. For example, I watch a family of kids after school and I have always been their transportation so it would be highly important the middle schoolers and the elementary are on the same schedules to limit daycare needs. It all sounds so complicated and you can't make everyone happy, but I believe we can make it work if everyone is willing to work together. There isn't enough daycare in the area that can keep the social distance so if parents had the choice to keep a couple of close families together that can keep those numbers down to rely on older siblings etc it would be extremely helpful. This is a long shot but just an idea, maybe offer some sort of elective credit to middle and high school students who basically are tutoring elementary students through their online work, it's incentive for the older sibling/family friend etc.
1565	I'm most concerned about the way assignments are given and handled via online. This was a total mess for my middle school child. Extremely confusing and
1566	ALL teachers, remain consistent across the board. Woodlands teachers sent packets with gifts for completing Google assignments. Some teachers barely communicated at all. Make it tough to motivate when one kids teacher is so amazing and gives personal feedback, encouragement, sends packets and the other kids' teacher doesn't do any of that.
1567	I think the extra emphasis on hygiene and cleanliness should always be practiced and hope it continues pandemic or not
1568	Instruction over the spring fell very short of my expectations as a parent. With few exceptions teachers just seemed to be winging it. I hope you're better prepared for the fall.
1569	I worry about the impact on district employees, like myself, if the students are not in school. How are we supposed to come to school and teach if are children are not there and they are too young to be left home alone? Honestly our county has had 11 children contract the virus and after seeing all the children out at stores during this time I really don't think the low number is because we were not in school. I believe the district should do everything they can to get the kids back in school. As an employee I have seen how many children have not participated in the online instruction and I feel if we are not in the buildings in the fall even more will not participate. The social emotional toll it has had on even my children who did participate and have a stable home life far out ways the risk of the virus in my opinion.
1570	I saw the OSPI recommendation is for students to wear masks. That is a recommendation. I would urge CKSD to disregard this recommendation and allow students to not wear masks if they choose. Otherwise kids with medical reasons for no mask are singled out and there is a strong likelihood of teasing and judgement. Not a safe learning environment.
1571	Keep reminding kids to have good personal hygiene.
1572	Deciding on what is best for the student and how they benefit more.

1573	Realize you need to follow state guidelines but will state that we are really concerned with our children's education if we need to move towards more distance learning.
1574	As much time as humanly possible fir primary aged students in the school.
1575	I just really hope that everyone enforces and follows guidelines for staying safe and healthy. Teachers have so much to do as it is, I hope they get the support that they need to effectively and efficiently run classes in person and/or online.
1576	I highly don't recommend my child not going back to school in the fall. I'll hire a tutor to come to the house and do homeschooling if need be. I won't support my child wearing a mask all day everyday to school, missing social interactions and activities like music, recess, etc.
1577	My thoughts don't matter because I don't believe in doing something to make others feel better. We all know masks are not stopping COVID19. Mask use may actually make me reconsider picking up my job, or at the very least I will ask for less hours. Wearing a mask will make depression and anxiety on my part worse, and I will not do that to myself for a job.
1578	Schools should run as normal without special precautions for a virus that is only harmful to elderly then younger children and adults.
1579	Protect students and teachers and staff at all cost.
1580	I believe that there needs to be a mix of in person and online support for the school year to help kids be successful and return to some semblance of normalcy. I am also concerned about not having school sports... this is disheartening to know that my children will not be able to participate in sports
1581	My child has a auto immune condition and I do worry about sending her back due to this. I want her to be able to go back to be with her friends. As she misses school and being with friends/teachers. She learns better in person then over the computer. But if that's the option we are going to have to do with her then that is what we will do. But I'm hoping the conditions for school to return in the fall work and we can send her back.

1583	vaccine needs to be available prior to sending students back to school
1584	Can we please have a separate survey for SPED students? Their needs are different and the students in my daughters class have zero issue with social distancing.
1585	I would rather my kids stay home to be safe
1586	I would like the option to choose a remote learning option each trimester as needed.
1587	I understand that this will be a difficult decision. This season is challenging for everyone. I am a full-time working single parent. Getting everything done is hard - no doubt about it. However, I would rather do remote learning again in the Fall to ensure that we handle this pandemic as swiftly as we can while protecting the most vulnerable.
1588	I want them to return but maybe just a couple times a week. Also, how will the rebecca law come into play if they are sick or worried about them being sick?
1589	My biggest fear is that our schools will feel like a prison.

1590	I am having difficulty with the intense focus on elementary schools. While I understand the need for the little kids to return, why are we looking to bring back the littles who have the most difficulty with PPE and hand washing? Why not start with HS and MS where kids are older, can wear masks without too much trouble, and can logically practice social distancing in most cases. Likewise, discipline relating to abuse of PPE and handwashing standards can be straight forward with the older kids. Start there, and work our way down to the grade schools. I am concerned about the preparedness for our high-schoolers for life and further trade and college without the excellent standard of education CKSD has historically been known for. Certainly second semester was a tremendous learning curve for all the teachers, and I don't fault them for that. 1600	Social interactions are very important to the growth of a teenager and school is a huge part of that. My teen has been very depressed and deems himself as having very low value because of the Social upheavals.
1601	Social distancing in any school will not happen because kids can't stay away from each other. Having kids come to school in small groups rotating throughout the day might be an option.
1602	Would like to see the school atmosphere as close to normal as possible.
1603	Please consider doing classroom time. My son misses school, his teacher, his friends. Everything was stripped away from him including sports. He doesn't have anything to look forward to. Children need this interaction and is an important part of growth and development. I feel it will have a negative effect on him if we don't send kids back to school.
1604	Kids need to return to school this fall. It's detrimental to there psychological growth by interacting with other students and teachers.

1605	Same as mentioned above. According to the CDC, the MORTALITY rate is .26%. That means there is a 99.7% recovery rate. The face covering and social distancing is absurd!
1606	No masks, no online learning.
1607	People already aren't following cdc guidelines on wearing masks to protect others returning to school without a vaccine is risking the kids and the teachers health.

1609	There might be in our county at least one child die from COVID19. This will be terrifying to some.
1610	If part time in person schooling is implemented, I would prefer full days as opposed to a short period each day, e.g. one or two hours here and there. For example, students can go Monday, Wednesday and Friday one week, Tuesday and Thursday the next. Consideration should be given to working parents. Not all kids have a retired grandma who is standing by to provide child care.

1619	PLEASE do not overwhelm them with work! My students both worked 5-8+ hours each and every day!

1620	Social-emotional health and interactions with peers and teachers are vital. Afraid the district will be forced/choose to go back into full-time online on a whim. Need to balance student emotional needs and health concerns without swinging too far in favor of one. Sports should be offered again, if not full contact, such as tennis. Would prefer HS be back full time for those who want it, with hybrid or online available for those who want that. Use block scheduling if needed to lessen transitions.

My kids are always asking what to expect, it makes us feel safe and confident. The less we know as school approaches, the harder it will be on everyone! What will lunch and music and PE and recess look like? Will class size be affected? Will families be provided with face masks?
1625	Parents need to know what the kids are doing for each class. Parent involvement at home is what will help kids succeed.
1626	It was impossible for me to look at 4 chrome books, try and figure out each child's teachers classroom (I have 3 in middle school, so multiply each child by 6 for all their classes, it was impossible) then my kids telling me that "it's not what the teacher wants, my teacher doesn't do it that way" I could not support my kids because it was like trying to learn each teachers methods and ways and then trying to teach my children the skills and help- they just wanted their teachers. Teachers need to be on line live each day and that would have helped. 1629	As my son is a running start student. My biggest concern is as it has always been, communication to the RS students. They are often forgotten in communication and Not looked upon as still part of their high school community. Sports for many is the only tie and they are in the dark about school activities.
1630	Canada's premier children's hospital has mandated no masks for children going back to school. A French study - that Denmark and Sweden have used to create their guidance- shows little to no spreading of Covid from children. Districts need to assess their vulnerable staff and allow for family leave act, families with vulnerable students already have a vigilant take on all possible health risks. 1633	I do not feel like our children are safe to reform to school this fall and it is unreasonable to expect elementary school students to socially distance and wear masks all day.
1634	As a single mother that works full time with 2 children, not having them back to school full time will create an enormous amount of stress. Child care costs are not feasible and neither is being able to work with them with school during the day. It's also not feasible to come home from work and try to make them focus on school work while trying to make dinner and spend time as a family.

1644	Assuming that we do need to have at least partial at home instruction, we need a solid learning platform with lots of communication from the teacher.

1671	my children need teacher-student / student to student interaction and they need educational simulation.
1672	Sports & outdoor activities & learning should be encouraged
1673	I think the district is going to need a plan to hold all families responsible.
1674	Read above comment! Stand up for our kids and be the example for other school districts!!

1675	Students need to be in school as much as possible with transportation provided. It would be amazing if a full homeschool option was available (as that might work best for some) to help lower the numbers so the kids that need to be in a classroom to learn can be in the schools more frequently.
1676	Students not being able to adapt to all the ridiculous guidelines

1689	If distant learning needs to happen I hope there is more structure and consistency for middle school children.
1690	The mental health of the kids needs to be considered. Ideally there is a way to return to in person instruction in a warm but safe way. Kids need to interact with each other and to have physical activity.

1699	I realize that you all "must" abide by directives from the state health dept., however it is ridiculous that students are not in classrooms. 1700	I hope that we will have guidance on what to expect by early August so families can adjust work/care as needed with enough notice to employers/childcare.

1702	Our kid will do best if the program is regular and structured, so she can depend on it. No surprises.

1705	I need my kids to go back to school. But not with masks. If they cannot attend we will need a sufficient method of instruction that will not be dependent upon me 100%. I need to get back to work.

1706	As long as teachers realize that every student didn't have the same experience, or ability to do work, and they are willing/able to work with the students to catch up it will be fine. I think more helpers will be needed to aid in that process.
1707	CKSD needs to recognize that different schools will have different needs. KSS social distancing measures may be easier to uphold than other middle schools. 1708	Kids are not getting sick and our county hasn't had a huge outbreak. Just open school as normal and get back to your real job which is educating kids.
1709	I wish there was an option that included staff/students who prefer not to wear a mask could attend together. And the an option for those who prefer masks can stay together. Just a thought maybe to be considered.
1710	The technology based, interactive learning worked well. Even with a return to classrooms, I hope this can continue.
1711	Just let kids go to school and stop the corona caution madness.
1712	I do not want my children attending in person classes if masks are required. I would keep them home until they can resume in person normal
1713	As a two parent working household we have great concern about our children's education and what that will look like. I am hopeful we get more support from the school in the coming year.
1714	If the organization of school and the added stress of following social distancing is taking away from my children's ability to learn I will consider disenrolling them from CK schools.
1715	I have two very different special needs first graders. One in DLP (with 1:1 nurse) and one with profound hearing disabilities in gen ed. Both scenarios have different but serious concerns to returning to school. Daycare would also be a concern.
1716	I need all three of my students to have similar schedules as I work full time and can not ask my child care to be responsible for taking children all over for different class times.
1717	Children are socially distant as is with social media prior to COVID. They should continue to have interaction with another as part of their growth.
1718	If there is a hybrid model or distance learning, teachers need to engage with their students (and be provided a medium to do so) - especially the younger students. They need to be able to interact with their teacher and ask questions. It was extremely frustrating for our younger student to learn without direction or feedback. Parents can't be expected to go to work, and also come home and be a 'teacher'.
1719	My child falls into the at risk category. My biggest concern is that there will be consequences for other students who are not following health safety protocols. I need to know that ALL students will be expected to maintain social distance and mask requirements so that my daughter can safely attend school.

1721	Social learning for young kids is just as important as academic learning. It appears that everyone at all levels is so focused on the physical health aspect that we're forgetting that our kids are losing out on happy, positive memories of their friends and school. They're longing to interact with each other. People need other people. While I would say most educators probably already see this first hand, the longer these kids go without face to face instruction, the larger I think we will see the gap in learning grow between kids of engaged parents vs. those that aren't.
1722	No masks!!!! Find another solution
1723	Online learning platforms need to be clear in expectation and have an "offline" option available, whether it is printed material or something else. They did not work for working parents who have to send kids to established daycare.
1724	I don't see how returning to school this fall will be possible. It's too dangerous. We are safer at home. And I like being at home. It's nice here. We have cookies.
1725	If there is no in classroom instruction please prioritize google meets with other kids for social interactions. Gifted services for the highly capable kids and reading group services for those who qualify would be appreciated as well.
1726	I have 4 students...but was only allowed one issued school chromebook. It was really hard to do on-line school without a device for each student. It would be nice if we could get more chromebooks if we have to online school.
1727	Safety!!!!!!
1728	Communication with parents, kid get away with everything they can. Please tell me what to hold him too.
1729	Availability for athletics.
1730	If I had to choose right now I would opt for at home learning, either from the school or through a homeschooling program. I think once a vaccine is available we will be ready to return to the classroom.
1731	Safety for kids along with staff. Children are germy no matter what
1732	I am just looking forward to my son socializing again and getting school structure
1733	Our youngest is in elementary school. We are a dual working family and we do not have daycare. This is a huge concern of school is not back to normal.
1734	Nothing comes to mind.
1735	I believe that it will be a challenge to get students to wear facemasks. I have an upcoming Kindergartener (high functioning autistic) who I KNOW will fight to keep a mask on, and my upcoming first grader who has asthma.
1736	I think it is vitally important to have SOME sort of in-person aspect to the 2020-2021 school year (and to offer sports). However, if the only way to do so is to mandate face coverings, then I don't think it is realistic to do so.
1737	Teacher preparation for remote teaching must be a main focus this summer and beyond.

1738	If we do have some online learning, it would be helpful as a working parent that teachers update their online planner so I may track what has been assigned, what's missing, etc. The online planner was completely abandoned during lockdown and there was no way for me to see how my child was doing grade wise.
1739	I have no worries about my student returning to school. Please do all you can to make sure an in-person option is available.
1740	The district needs to provide a greater variety of on-line platforms & recourses.
1741	Actual social interactions can be as valuable as education itself.

1743	Our kids need social interaction. They need normal. Focusing solely online is not for children this age
1744	OUR GOVERNOR IS POWER HUNGRY. I DO NOT AGREE WITH MASKS, ESPECIALLY SINCE A LOT OF OTHER STATES ARE NOT MANDATING MASKS!!!!
1745	please let them return to school
1746	Not everyone can safely return to school. If school resumes in person, online learning support is still needed for those who cannot.
1747	I think the risk to the children is low. The teachers are another story, but I will not allow my child to wear a mask for 6+ hours a day. We will be looking at non-public school options if this requirement stands. It has nothing to do with ignorance and not understanding the risks. I understand the risks and so do my kids. It's about living in fear. Studies show this virus doesn't impact the children like it does unhealthy adults. The survival rate is extremely high for kids. I won't let them live in the fear that is being created by a government that seems to get it wrong, more than they get it right.

1753	My children need the structure and routine of the classroom. I am not a teacher, my husband And I work full time. They suffered academically because I cannot give them the education they need. An hour on the computer clicking around trying to figure out what we're supposed to be doing isn't enough.
1754	Students need in person school, events/teams and social events. As well as in person education.

1755	While my laptop was available during the pandemic, it would be better for all children to have access to Chromebooks so that all have equal opportunity and same technology available to them.
1756	I am nervous about back and forth, online and in class every other day. My student is easy going, and she even has a hard time on Mondays after a weekend break. So I worry that every other day in school and then at home will not be good. Please consider how working parents will provide childcare for their students, especially when we do not want our child in daycare daily, spreading more germs with different families.
1757	I don't think it is safe for kids to return to school. The numbers are constantly rising as places open back up. There are kids with younger siblings at home and I'm afraid that if my kid interact with other kids will come in contact and pass it along to his younger brother
1758	That standard testing should not apply.
1759	I will only send my children back to school under NORMAL circumstances. They will not wear a mask, they need interaction with other children, teachers, and staff, they need PE, recess, access to the cafeteria, music programs (including choir and band), and they need extracurricular programs like clubs and sports.
